PORTLAND PLANS BIG ROSE SHOW

THIRD EVENT TO BE THE BIGGEST YET

Ralph W. Hoyt is Elected President of the Annual Rose Carnival and Work is Now in Progress to Make the Event a Success—Big Fund for Next Year is Practically All Collected.

Portland's third annual rose festival is to be bigger, better and more beautiful than either of the two previous ones. Every effort will be made by the stalwart citizens behind the movement to raise by public subscription the sum of \$100,000 to defray the expenses of a civic demonstration of a week's duration which shall, in every way, be worthy of the city's magnitude and progressive spirit, says the Oregonian.

Last year it was attempted to raise that sum, but the financial depression of last winter militated against producing a jubilee of the broad scope at first intended. With prosperity and constantly bettering conditions in all fields of industry, it is now felt that Portland man and will reach the goal set for the festival of next year, the date of which has been fixed for the week of June 7 to 12, inclusive.

Last night's annual meeting was one

of the most enthusiastic public meetings of that character ever held, and as has already been intimated, Ralph W. Hoyt, cashier of the Merchants' National bank, was chosen unanimously on the first ballot as president of the third annual festival.

Mr. Hoyt accepted the honor in a characteristically enthusiastic speech and said that there was no other way out of it but that Portland must give a celebration that shall be not only of a national but international importance and that he will do his part to make it so if the rest of the stockholders and directors of the festival and public in general will help him. Led by retiring President C. A. Whitmore, other prominent festival workers bespoke for Mr. Hoyt the heartiest support for his administration. And immediately following adjournment every one of the 30 stockholders present assured the new president of their earnest loyalty, so that the work for the coming year bids fair to start off more auspiciously than it ever did before.

The stockholders met in the rooms of the Rose Festival association in the Sweetland building, with about 25 more than 30 present in person and about 25 more represented by proxies. The report of retiring President C. A. Whitmore and Treasurer Ralph C. Hoyt showed that out of the \$32,500 originally pledged all but about \$1,000 had been collected, and that the festival had nearly \$500 in cash in the bank as a nest egg for the celebration of 1909.

GAS EXPLOSION AT FIRE.

Six Firemen Injured and 11-Year-Old Girl Burned.

Los Angeles, Sept. 9.—Six firemen and an 11-year-old girl were badly burned and shocked as the result of an explosion of gas during a small fire in a plumbing shop on South Main street late this afternoon. Three of the men were blown from the room in the street. Two com-

panies responded and two firemen were sent into the basement to make sure there were no flames there. One of them carried a lantern and the gas which had been gathering in the cellar exploded. The injured men were quickly removed to the hospital, where it is said all will recover.

The girl, Mildred Vajar, was standing on the walk in front of the shop and was blown into the street, sustaining a sprained back.

DEATH FROM FALL.

Only 12 Feet But It Fractures Man's Spine.

Falling from the window of his own room at 212 Alder street at 1 o'clock this morning, Upton O. Hickel, a carpenter, suffered a fractured spine. At St. Vincent's hospital today it was reported that he cannot live. He fell 12 feet, his back striking the pavement with great force.

Dr. Fred J. Zeigler, city physician, ordered him removed to the hospital in a Red Cross ambulance, but little can be done to help him. He is 47 years of age and was intoxicated when he reached his room. Apparently while stumbling around the room he fell through the open window to the street below.

PRIMARY LAW WAS

DEFEATED IN IOWA

Oregon's Example Not Followed by People.

Des Moines, Iowa, Sept. 9.—The state senate today defeated a bill for a primary law modeled on the Oregon law, by a vote of 33 to 13. The bill had a big support from good government clubs and a large part of the citizens, but the party organizations were against it. It was believed from the first that it could not be passed this year.

BOURNE COMES TO START WORK

TAFT CAMPAIGN TO OPEN IN OREGON SOON

Junior Senator Will Take an Active Part in Carrying the State for the Republican Ticket—Taft Clubs Will Be Organized Throughout the State Active Campaign Work to Begin at Once.

United States Senator Jonathan Bourne will reach Portland Saturday or Sunday, according to word that has been received it is estimated that he will most likely reach the city Sunday.

Senator Bourne is coming to Oregon at this time primarily to take an active part in the Taft campaign. What his plans are, however, are not known, as he has sent no instructions to Portland which have reached the public. Whether he will affiliate with the state central committee, or will work with his secretary, John C. Young, in the organization of Taft clubs throughout the state, or whether he will have a still different plan worked out by himself and under his own management and control is a matter of supposition.

It is generally believed that State Chairman Calk and Senator Bourne are close together in desire if not in actual affiliation, but what the recent developments in Oregon as between Fulton and Calk will have to do with the Bourne-Calk association is a question.

Up at the central committee headquarters it is given out officially that there is no factionalism in the republican party at the present time, never has been, in fact, and that all republicans are working together for the election of Taft. What effect the appearance of Senator Bourne in the headquarters with his sleeves rolled up ready for work would have on this peace and amity, so far as the Fulton people are concerned, is a question of some doubtfulness.

It is believed, however, that the senator will give much of his attention to the organization of Taft clubs throughout the state and leave the general work for the state central committee to do.

John C. Young, private secretary to Senator Bourne, who has been appointed state organizer by the National League of Taft clubs, is already hard at work handling the republican clubs of the state together under the general leadership of the National league.

Senator Bourne will remain in Oregon until time for the assembling of congress in December next. While it is admitted at his office that he intends to take an active part in the Taft campaign, in fact, that being his primary object in returning to Oregon at this time, it is not admitted that he intends to mix in the fight over the organization of the legislature. It is contended that the senator has no direct interest in local issues, that he is not up for reelection and therefore has no reason to pay attention to the organization battle.

NEW FLYING MACHINE.

On an Entirely New Principle and Cost \$10,000—Will Fly in Week.

New York, Sept. 8.—Wilbur R. Kimball's helicopter had its coming out at the Morris Park aviation grounds yesterday, and was much admired by a large group of aeronautical enthusiasts. No attempt was made to send it into the air. The machine was rolled around for inspection, and its powerful 50-horsepower motor was set in motion.

According to Mr. Kimball's plans it may be a week or even longer before he attempts a flight, because the machine is constructed on a new principle, and it is his purpose to discover as far as possible how it will perform in the air before he takes the chance of wrecking the apparatus, and possibly ending his own career in the bargain.

Those who inspected the helicopter were divided in their opinions as to whether it will do all that its builders hope it will do. From a distance it looks like a spider's web, with 20 small wooden propellers caught in the meshes. It is constructed entirely of wood, aluminum and piano wire, with a powerful four-cylinder, two-cycle motor, that appears to develop power enough to tear the fragile thing to splinters. It cost \$10,000 to build, and represents five years of study and experiment.

Salem Cannery Output.

Though there is quite a force of women working at the cannery preparing apples and pears, the output is not as large as this time last year, says the Salem Statesman. The total output is several thousand cases short of what it was last year and there is not much of a promise to redeem the deficiency. The average run of a day now is from 180 to 200 cases, each case containing 24 cans. Last year at this time about 22,000 cases had been canned, while this year only about 14,000 is the result of the summer. Last year about 4000 cases had been shipped already, but the total this year is 1300, quite a noticeable deficit. The only explanation of the dull market is that the fruit does not sell well. The cannery will continue to run on the pear and apple crop until some time in October. A few berries are coming in yet, but the amount is small.
