Many Race Horses on Circuit.

A big bunch of running horses from the race tracks at Seattle, Everett, Bellingham and other places further west, is expected in North Yakima within the next 48 hours, says the Yakima Republic.

The runners, which will number about 100, will be taken at once to the stables at the state fair grounds and will there rest up and undergo conditioning for the races to be held here this fall at the state fair, when there will be six days of running races.

The class of animals before the public this year, as indicated by the performances up and down the coast, is higher than has ever before been known. At Seattle record after record has fallen and the work in this respect has been so frequent that eastern authorities have refused to recognize the new marks, declaring that they cannot be true.

Whether this contention will hold or not the fact remains that the most exciting sport ever given in Washington has been furnished this year and will be continued at the track here this fall.

Chicago Editor Buys in Yakima.

Having great confidence in the future of the west, especially that part of it known as the Yakima valley, Ernest Cleveland, associate editor of the popular magazine, Our Day, published at Chicago, today closed a deal with C. A. Alexander of this city, for 10 acres of raw Tieton land, paying for it \$400 per acre, says the Yakima Herald. This, says Mr. Alexander, is a record breaker of prices on Tieton lands. The holding is in section 15 and is considered one of the best pieces of land under the project.

Former Will Visit Taft.

Cincinnati, Sept. 10.—Great interest is being taken in the announcement that Foraker will visit the Taft headquarters this afternoon. This is believed to be an important move in state politics. The outcome is anxiously awaited by the leaders.

FRENCH JUDGE SETS

NEW PACE IN DECISIONS.

Paris, Sept. 10.—In one of the most remarkable decisions ever rendered by a French court, the secretary of the Electrical Workers' union was sentenced to pay damages to members of the union because they were thrown out of work on the night of August 6, when Paris was dark.

The court ruled that electrical strike was called as the result of a sort of military alarm and must be recognized as malicious, since it overthrew the city's economic life and deprived those who wanted to work. There is no appeal from the court.

DEADLOCK NOW ON.

Iowa Senatorial Situation Now Settled for Long Fight.

Des Moines, Sept. 10.—The vote at the joint session of the house and senate today on the senatorial contest showed a deadlock certain, and probably of long duration. The vote: For Cummins, republican, 66; Porter, democratic, 46. The "standpatters" are confident they will control the situation.

FIRE STARTED AGAIN.

Fresh Wind Stirs Embers Into a Fresh Blaze.

Calumet, Mich., Sept. 10.—Stirred by a fresh wind this afternoon the forest fires in the copper district are raging fiercely again. Beacon hill is in grave danger. Two school houses have been scorched. Everybody is fighting the fire.

TOLSTOI'S BIRTHDAY IS

RUSSIAN HOLIDAY

St. Petersburg, Sept. 10.—Despite the prohibition by the government of an official celebration in honor of the eightieth birthday of Count Tolstoi, today is virtually a holiday in all Russia. All classes are celebrating the birth of the greatest Russian philosopher. The government ordered every theater in the empire closed in order to prevent a demonstration. Tolstoi is ill.

IOWA REPUBLICANS

WILL HAVE CONVENTION.

Des Moines, Sept. 10.—The republicans of Iowa will hold a senatorial primary convention at the November election under the provisions of the amendments permitting such a course which passed both houses of the legislature today in the separate primary ballot bill. This puts a new turn on the senatorial fight in which Governor Cummins is the central figure. The deadlock is still one.

DEBS WILL SPEAK

IN HEARST THEATER

Berkeley, Sept. 10.—It is announced today that Eugene Debs will speak in the Hearst Greek theater on Saturday instead of the skating rink. Permission was granted by President Wheeler of the University of California on condition that no collection will be taken. Debs will arrive tomorrow night.

Misappropriated Funds.

Washington, Sept. 10.—Captain Solomon Avery, Jr., the post ordnance official at Presidio, San Francisco, faces a trial on the charge of appropriating funds of the Tenth company, coast artillery. His resignation has been tendered by wire, after he was informed the charge was dropped. The war department decreed that he was to stand a court martial trial on the more serious charge of misappropriating official funds.

French Vineyards Exempted.

Rheims, France, Sept. 10.—As a partial compensation to the vineyard owners for the partial destruction of this year's crop by mildew and insects, causing a loss estimated at \$20,000,000, the government today decided to exempt the vineyards from taxation.

Crops on Prince Edward Island.

An American consular report on the crops of Prince Edward's Island for this season says: The commissioner reports that the grains produced in the province are of superior quality, free from weeds, and well adapted for seed grain. During the same year the value of the island fisheries was about \$1,220,000, making a total of nearly \$13,000,000 as the agricultural and sea product of the province for the year 1907. Prince Edward Island contains only 2184 square miles, but it is said that with more careful cultivation and use of now uncultivated lands its productivity could be doubled, while the fisheries yield from the adjacent waters could be indefinitely increased.
