

CELEBRATION AT WALLOWA

ARRIVAL OF RAILROAD
OCCASION FOR BIG TIME.

Excursion Planned for September 20
—Program Being Prepared by Citizens—Sports Will Be a Feature.

Wallowa, Sept. 10.—The establishment of the town of Wallowa on the railroad may of the world is to be celebrated in a fitting manner, and the citizens of the town are preparing to do the honors of the occasion by extending an open-handed reception to all comers. This big event will take place on Sunday, September 20, the day before the regular train service will be established from Wallowa.

An excursion will be run from La Grande to accommodate visitors from this end of the line. The train will leave La Grande at 7 o'clock in the morning and will arrive at Elgin at 8 and at Wallowa at 10:30. On the return the train will leave Wallowa at 4 o'clock in the afternoon and reach La Grande at 7:30. The round trip fare from La Grande will be \$1.75; from Imbler \$1.50, and from Elgin \$1.

Wallowa citizens are preparing a program of reception which will include an address of welcome by Hon. E. A. Holmes of Wallowa, and a response by Colonel P. S. Ivanhoe of La Grande. Judge T. H. Crawford and others are also on the program for speeches. After these formalities there is to be a musical program at the grove near Wallowa; tables with hot tea and coffee, fruits, etc., arranged with the view of a basket dinner, will be provided. The program is to also include broncho riding and other diversions.

The invitation of the citizens of Wallowa extends to all the residents of this part of the country and to their neighboring towns of Lostine, Enterprise and Joseph. It is to be an event for mutual congratulations of the residents of the two counties.

Many of the prominent railroad officials will come up from Portland and join the excursion from La Grande, among them will be Mr. W. H. McMurray, general passenger agent of the O. R. & N. It is considered probable, also, that many of the citizens of Portland will join in the celebration of this important event.

Assistant General Passenger Agent Jack O'Neil arrived from Portland yesterday morning on No. 6 and was busy the most of yesterday with fixing up the arrangements for the excursion from La Grande. The company will provide suitable accommodations for all who attend. There are several other plans under way for this important event which will be more fully provided for in the next day or two.

Socialists Sore on Bryan.

New York, Sept. 10.—That the attack on socialism recently made by President Samuel Gompers, of the American Federation of Labor, is to be repeated by William J. Bryan in the address to be delivered by the Nebraskan in this city a week from today, is a rumor that has been circulated here, apparently with some basis of authority. As a result, the socialists of the city are up in arms and may decide, if the report proves true, to hold an opposition meeting.

The criticisms of Gompers, in which he intimated that the money to pay for the "red special" tour of Eugene V. Debs was furnished by capitalists, have aroused much indignation in labor circles. It is declared that Gompers wilfully resorted to falsehood in order to help Bryan and injure the socialist cause among workmen.

Socialists declare that the "red special" is by no means the "luxurious palace train" of Mr. Gompers' imagination and that the \$20,000 necessary to cover the expenses of the 10,000 mile tour is being raised by small contributions of the workmen. All such contributions are made public by the national secretary at stated intervals, and the largest sum appearing in the report was \$200.

According to rumor, Mr. Bryan's attack on socialism will not be of a personal nature, but will be devoted to a consideration of the socialist theories in their various forms. He will allege that democracy is directly opposed to socialism and that the republican party is responsible for the great growth of the Marxian party in this country. He will attempt to demonstrate that should the cause he represents be defeated in November there may be a dangerous growth of socialism in the United States during the next decade or so.

One of the main purposes of this proposed address is to disprove the charge so frequently made against him by political opponents in the east, as well as a large element that he contends, does not understand him, that his political doctrines are tinged with socialism. He will attempt to show that what he advocates in government leads directly away from socialism, whereas republican principles and practices tend strongly to stimulate the growth of socialism.

As Mr. Bryan has never fully exploited this theme before in a speech, although he has touched upon it considerably, it is believed that should he put his present intention into force in his New York address it will create one of the sensations of the campaign.

Fleet Nears Albany.

Melbourne, Sept. 10.—Dispatches from Albany, on the Australian west coast, state that the American battleship fleet is nearing that port and will arrive tomorrow. Six days will be spent there, after which the armada will proceed to Manila, a distance of about 1800 miles. Albany is a village of less than 5000 souls and the entertainment of the tars will necessarily be on a small scale.

Town's Centennial.

Forestville, N. Y., Sept. 10.—Many visitors are arriving to take part in the observance of the centennial anniversary of the founding of this village. The principal celebration will be held tomorrow, when an airship flight by Inventor Crosby, will be a feature.

BUBONIC PLAGUE. FROM SQUIRREL BITE.

Los Angeles Child Contracts Disease From Park Squirrel.

Los Angeles, Sept. 8.—A case of bubonic plague has been discovered in Los Angeles. The case is that of a boy named Mulholland, son of a reservoir tender in Elysian park, and a nephew of William Mulholland, consulting engineer of the city water works. Dr. L. M. Powers, city health officer, gave out today the following statement:

"There is one case of bubonic plague in an isolated house in Elysian park. The patient is convalescent. The state and federal authorities have been informed of the condition and precautions have been taken to prevent its spread.

Three weeks ago the boy found a sick squirrel in the park and picked it up.

The squirrel bit the boy on the hand. A sickness followed this which the attending physician declared to be bubonic plague. It was discovered that squirrels in the park are afflicted with the disease.

Prompt measures for the extermination of squirrels in Elysian park were taken and these measures will be actively continued.

No other cases have developed and it is believed by the authorities that there would be no spread of the disease.
