LEEVE WORK SOON TO BE FINISHED

EMBANKMENT OF THE EXTENSION DONE.

New Levee Wall Over 750 Feet in Length Now Protects the City—Toe Wall and Ripping Soon to Be Completed—Flood Gate to Be Installed at Byers' Tail Race.

The work on the embankment for the extension of the levee to the Matlock island is now completed and by next week it is expected that the toe wall work and the lower ripping will be completed. The remainder of the ripping can then be completed at leisure.

The levee has been extended a distance of 750 feet and the work is now so well advanced that there will be little danger from high water.

The wing wall at the upper end has now been extended a distance of 500 feet and it is now probable that it will not be extended further for want of funds. The toe wall and part of the ripping on the wing wall is now completed.

Several weeks ago it was announced by Councilman Joe Ell, chairman of the levee committee, that the wing wall would be built down as far as the railroad bridges this fall. However, that plan has been abandoned and the remainder of the extension will have to be made some future year.

Most of the repair work along the levee between the Lee street bridge and the Main street bridge has also

been completed and work is progressing rapidly on the masonry under the Main street bridge.

Will Install Flood Gate.

At the council meeting last night a resolution was passed directing that Contractor Betts install the iron flood gate at the lower end of Byers' tail race, the work being done as part of his levee building contract. The purchase of the gate was authorized by the council a week ago.

MILK ORDINANCE WAS POSTPONED

NEW MEASURE NOW WITH THE COMMITTEE.

New Fire Bell Striker to Be Purchased for the City—Repairs to the W. J. Clark Warehouse Permitted by the Council—Fire-proof Roofing Must Be Used in the Repairs.

At the council meeting last night the milk and dairy regulation ordinance was up for its first reading and after being read was referred to the ordinance committee with instructions to report next week. Had the council not had other pressing business on hand the measure would probably have been passed last evening.

The ordinance introduced was identical with the one published in this paper several days ago and it was listened to with close attention by the council. Thus far no objection whatever has been encountered by the measure.

The proposition of purchasing a fire bell striker was again brought up by Fire Chief Vaughan and after the matter had been discussed at some length Councilman Strain moved that the striker be advertised for, the specifications being supplied by the fire chief.

The new striker will be installed when the fire department moves into the city hall and it will be a much-needed improvement.

During the council meeting the fire committee retired to consider whether or not W. J. Clark should be allowed to repair the warehouse which was partially burned during the Christian church fire. After some deliberation they reported that he be allowed to do so provided he use a fire-proof roofing. The recommendation was approved by the council.

Following the close of the council meeting last night the ordinance committee and Mayor Murphy went in to session and discussed the subject among themselves for several hours.

SUB-TREASURY TELLER HAS BEEN DISCHARGED

Chicago, Sept. 10.—Following the announcement that the government will refuse to aid the state officials in the prosecution of George W. Fitzgerald, former assistant teller of the subtreasury, accused of the theft of \$173,000 from the subtreasury, the case was dismissed today. The state officials secured insufficient evidence.

Government officials hold that the trial will now make the recovery of the bank notes more difficult.

Detectives claimed to have evidence that Fitzgerald tried to arrange for the passing of some of the missing \$1000 bills.

The case was dismissed by Judge Chetian after sub Treasurer Bolden-week refused to produce the records of his office as evidence.

THE MYERS QUARREL SETTLED AT LAST

The Salem correspondent says of the final settlement of the sensational quarrel in the Myers family of that place:

The guardianship proceedings brought against Joseph Meyers, the pioneer merchant, by his sons, Henry and Milton, were dismissed today.

The Meyers boys paid off their obligation of over \$50,000 to their father. The loss of the iron box containing their notes has therefore become of little importance.

Amicable relations have been re-established among the members of the Meyers family and, though a family reunion has not yet been held, it is expected that former relations will be resumed in a day or so.

This is the culmination of one of the most sensational family quarrels ever forced upon public attention in Oregon. Because Joseph Meyers, over 70 years of age, declared his intention to wed Mrs. Zenaide Du Rette, his two sons, who had succeeded to the proprietorship of the dry goods store he founded, had him arrested on a charge of insanity.

While the insanity proceedings were pending, Meyers and Mrs. Du Rette were married. Then guardianship proceedings were filed for the purpose of preventing Meyers from squandering his money.

So enraged by these attacks upon him by his sons, Meyers determined to teach the boys a lesson, and sent to Salem on August 20 for his safety deposit box, which contained notes given by his sons, Milton and Henry, for amounts aggregating \$50,000. His intention was to press payment of the

notes. The box was sent by Wells Fargo express, with a stated valuation of \$10 on the box. After the box reached Portland and before it had been delivered to Mr. Meyers, who was then staying there, the box was mysteriously stolen. But Meyers senior demanded payment of the notes, which payment the sons refused unless indemnified against loss by the notes turning up in the hands of innocent holders.

While the controversy was proceeding over the question of indemnity, the facts regarding the theft of the box became public and this brought the family quarrel to a climax.
