GOLD DUST THIEF NABBED AT SEATTLE

When James H. Beggs was accosted by City Patrolman Hubbard last evening on board the steamer Senator, which had just arrived from Noma, the closing chapter of one of the biggest gold dust robberies in the history of the west and north closed, says a Seattle item.

Beggs was arrested on a warrant issued by Deputy United States Marshal Charles Drechsel, of Fairbanks, charging him with entering the state of Washington with stolen goods.

The real charge is that Beggs had a part of the \$19,000 which "Bobby" Miller had planted two years ago at Fairbanks after turning over to the authorities the major portion of \$78,236.34 taken from the steamer Tanana.

Robert Miller is supposed to be on his way from Skagway to Seattle to meet Beggs and divide up the money.

Crime to Give Away Booze.

John Campbell was arrested Sunday afternoon on the charge of giving a drink of whiskey to D. C. Painter of Tigh Valley, says The Dalles Chronicle. The officers caught Campbell in the act of "treating" in the alley between Second and Third streets and took him into custody.

Campbell was arraigned and gave \$10 bail for his appearance in court yesterday morning at 10 o'clock. He did not show up, however, at that time and forfeited the bail money which covers the amount of the fine, had he been found guilty. It is not only an offense under the city ordinance to sell booze on Sunday in The Dalles, but a misdemeanor to give it away as well.

Campbell is a stranger in the city, or was, rather, for he has undoubtedly disappeared from this vicinity, leaving the \$10 behind.

Grand Ronde Mills Start.

The first of a chain of flour mills in this valley commenced operations, and thereby is commenced the grinding of the output of local wheat, says a La Grande paper. The elevators have been running in these mills for several weeks, and the starting of the mill owned by the Island City financiers in this city commenced operations for this season. The same parties own the other four mills, and they will all be running before the week is over. Ed Kiddle is planning on a trip east to buy machinery for the mill that is to be rebuilt at Island City. His trip is being deferred until the mass of details attendant to the commencement of the several mills in this county are attended to.

CALDWELL PAPER PAYS COMPLIMENT TO PENDLETON

The Caldwell News says of the nationalization of Pendleton Savings bank, now the American National bank of Pendleton:

The legion of friends that Montie B. Gwinn possesses in Caldwell will be glad to learn of his success in Pendleton, Oregon. The Pendleton Savings bank of which he is president, has been changed to a national bank and will be known as the American National bank of Pendleton.

This is one of the pioneer financial institutions of eastern Oregon, having a capital, surplus and profits of over a quarter of a million, and its customers number some 3000.

Mr. Gwinn has met with marked success since he went to Pendleton and his abilities as a financier were fittingly recognized by the bankers of Oregon, by his unanimous election as president of the Oregon State Bankers' association.

JOSEPH McCABE VISITS OLD HOME IN WALLA WALLA

Joseph McCabe, one of the most widely known railroad men of the Pacific northwest, and formerly general manager of the W. & C. R., located here, is back in Walla Walla again for a short visit among friends, says the Walla Walla Bulletin. He left two and one-half years ago when he went to Providence, R. I., to undertake an extensive tunnel contract for the New York, New Haven & Hartford Railroad company.

Mr. McCabe is accompanied by Mrs. McCabe and their daughter Olive, and will remain in the city during the week renewing old friendships. Then Mr. McCabe and his wife and daughter will visit friends and relatives elsewhere in this state and Oregon.

About two and a half years ago Mr. McCabe was induced by President C. S. Mellen of the New York, New Haven & Hartford to resign his position as president and general manager of the Washington & Columbia River Railroad company and go to Providence, R. I., to begin the construction of a mile long, two-track tunnel under that city from the Seekonk to the Moshassuck river at a cost of \$2,000,000.

This contract was begun by Mr. McCabe and his business partner, Charles S. Bihler, July 6, 1906, and has just been completed.

MEDAL TO HARTMAN

SPANISH WAR VETERAN RECEIVES MEMENTO

Medal Commemorating the Heroic Services of the Eighth Army Corps in Luzon Received by George Hartman, Jr., of the First National Bank—Letter by McKinley Extols the Spanish War Soldiers.

George Hartman, Jr., former first lieutenant of the Second Oregon volunteers, has just received from the war department the special medal of honor which was due him as one of the Eighth army corps which served in the Philippine insurrection. It is one of several medals received by local Second Oregon veterans and cure one by writing the quartermaster general at Washington.

Accompanying the medal received by Mr. Hartman was a letter which sets forth the reasons for the granting of the medals to the eighth army corps men and the letter includes the following message which was sent to General Otis at Manila July 1, 1899.

"The president desires to express in the most public manner, his appreciation of the lofty patriotism shown by the volunteers and regulars of the eighth army corps in performing willing service through severe campaigns and battles against the insurgents in Luzon when under the terms of their enlistments, they would have been entitled to discharge upon the ratification of the treaty with Spain. This action on their part was noble and heroic. It will stand forth as an example of the self-sacrifice and public consecration which have ever characterized the American soldier.

"In recognition thereof I shall recommend to congress that a special medal of honor be given to the officers and soldiers of the eighth army corps who performed this great duty voluntarily and enthusiastically for their country."

CAIRS ARE PLENTIFUL.

What Crop Is Moved Much Earlier Than Last Year.

Estimates made yesterday by several local warehousemen and grain shipping firms place the total consignments delivered at Portland and Sound points at from 40 to 50 per cent of the entire yield for Walla Walla county, says the Walla Walla Union. One dealer estimated the amount shipped up to date at 30 per cent, while another placed it as high as 60 per cent.

Owing to excellent transportation facilities which railroads are giving shippers this season there has not been a single case of car shortage reported, although practically every car and locomotive is being used in handling crop shipments. Because of quick transportation facilities the wheat moving season is from two weeks to a month earlier than last year. Heavy consignments of both fruit and grain are being sent from Walla Walla daily, the principal part of fruit going to eastern points, while practically all the wheat is sent to Portland and Sound points for export trade.
