FRUIT EXHIBIT FROM WEST END

PEACHES AND PRUNES FOR THE DISTRICT FAIR.

Echo Sends Some Fine Specimens for the Fair Exhibit—After Being Shown Here Three Dozen Jars Will Be Sent on the Circuit of the Northwest Fairs—Columbia Land Company Will Compete for \$1000 Apple Prize at Spokane.

The fruit exhibit for the district fair was increased last evening by a beautiful sample of early Crawford peaches and Hungarian prunes from Echo. E. H. Brown, editor of the Echo Register, who has charge of the collection of agricultural and horticultural products from the Echo district, brought in two jars of the finest specimens yet to be brought to the fair.

The large jars in which the Echo display is being placed were furnished by Dr. H. W. Coe of the Columbia Land company and after the fruit from the Echo district has been displayed at the district fair in this city, about three dozen jars will be sent on the circuit of the northwest fairs as an advertisement of the irrigated section of the west end of the county.

The peaches brought in last evening are from the ranch of the Peimulders, west of Echo, and the prunes came from the orchard of Alex Malcolm in Echo.

The Columbia Land company will compete for the \$1000 prize offered by the Spokane fair for the largest apple exhibited and a special jar will have to be secured for a Wolf River specimen found in the Echo district by the company.

STONE JUMPED BAIL, BUT IS BROUGHT BACK

After trying in vain to escape from the fell clutches of the Umatilla county authorities O. C. Stone will be brought back from Walla Walla this afternoon to face a multitude of charges. Against him now stand an innumerable number of possible complaints for selling liquor and he may have to face more serious charges.

Stone was one of the Echoites recently arrested for breaking the prohibition law and like the others, he was released upon giving \$500 bail. He then went to Walla Walla and fearing he would not return to appear before the grand jury Sheriff Taylor had him arrested by the Walla Walla officers.

When arrested Stone refused to return without requisition papers and these were finally secured. Deputy Joe Blakeley reached Walla Walla this morning after having secured the same from the governor of Washington. He will bring Stone over on the evening train today.

Yesterday an ineffectual attempt was made to get Stone free by habeas corpus proceedings.

He wished to locate at some point in the northwest where he would be close to his wife's former home and Pendleton was found to be the most favorable place.

Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell are expected here soon and it is their intention to start a music store. Mrs. Mitchell is a talented pianist and will also organize a class.
