ARCHBISHOP IRELAND IS HONORED BY THE WORLD

St. Paul, Minn., Sept. 11.—John Ireland, archbishop of St. Paul, and next to Cardinal Gibbons, perhaps the most popular Catholic churchman in America, is 70 years old today. All day messages of congratulation, from all parts of the world and from men of every creed and nationality, have poured in upon the aged prelate.

That the archbishop will be elevated to the cardinalate before death claims him is the hope of thousands of Americans who love and admire the simple, democratic churchman who presides over the destinies of Catholicism in the northwest. Although present appearances seem to indicate that Archbishop Farley, of New York will be the next American cardinal, the friends of Dr. Ireland have not lost hope.

In any event the archbishop himself will not be discouraged or cast down. He has never sought the high honor that his friends believe he so richly deserves, and has always sought to prevent the bringing of any undue influence to bear in his favor.

A Varied Experience.
John Ireland was born in the country whose name he bears on September 11, 1838. He came to the United States in boyhood and was educated at the Cathedral school in this city, later studying theology in France. He was ordained a priest on December 21, 1861, and was chaplain of the Fifth Minnesota regiment in the civil war. His abilities as a scholar and theologian have been given wide recognition. Yale University conferred upon him the degree of LL. D. in 1901. Archbishop Ireland is not only a distinguished churchman, but he is also one of the foremost citizens of the United States, in the broadest and best sense of citizenship.

Although an ecclesiastic and a devoted and enthusiastic adherent to the tenets of the great religious organization of which he is a member, no man rightfully may accuse John Ireland of lack of sympathy with what he regards as the rational liberty of modern life. As a priest he is of necessity a profound believer in education.

He is also a devoted friend of free-

dom of the genuine sort, and his life has been conspicuous by reason of his manifold and influential endeavors to share with the masses of the people the religion, morality and social capital of the world. According to his own expression, "the watchwords of the age are reason, education, liberty, the amelioration of the masses."

Strength from Sincerity.
The archbishop's strength is due largely to his absolute sincerity. His vigorous personality, his frankness, his courage and his decided views on many questions have not infrequently aroused the animosity and disinterestedness have never been questioned.

Each passing year has cleared away some of the misconceptions which always cloud the pathway of a bold and able man. Dr. Ireland has succeeded in winning the profound respect not only of those who are with him in his opinions, but also of those who disagree.

Archbishop Ireland has long been conspicuous by his advocacy of many reforms. He was a pioneer in the temperance movement in his church, and the first Catholic total abstinence society was organized by him more than 35 years ago. In his city his influence is manifest in a marked reduction of drunkenness, in the obliteration of plague spots of vice and in a changed atmosphere throughout the entire community on the temperance question. He has at all times used all his influence, both as an ecclesiastic and as a good citizen, to make temperance respectable and to restrain it by public opinion and by wise legal restriction.

A Forceful Speaker.
He is a speaker of magnetic force although he is in no sense an orator. In the pulpit and on the rostrum he is direct, effective, logical and always convincing. Added to this is a gift of humor which comes from his race and is indicated in his fine, homely face—a gift which puts him at ease with men and has contributed largely to his influence with them.

Perhaps his most distinguished characteristic is what has been described as "a sort of sublimated common sense." He sees things in the large, takes small account of individuals, forgets an injury, but never a favor, although the personality of the one who befriends him may pass from his memory. This lapse is not because he is ungrateful, but rather because he is Napoleonic in the scope of his vision, which sees legions go higher and thither, but takes no note of the men who compose them.

SCHOOL OF MATRIMONY.

Kansas Professor Would Avoid Danger of Degeneracy.

Topeka, Kan., Sept. 12.—Educators are interested in the declaration made by Professor W. Blackmar of Kansas university that a college of matrimony must be established to prevent degeneracy of the race. He also declared that the time was coming when such a course would be offered in the public schools.

The purpose of the school would be to teach men and women what they ought to know about married life and would be intended as a preventive of the many unhappy marriages now recorded.

Prof. Blackmar advocated a strict physical and mental examination of all applicants for marriage licenses and said persons afflicted with pulmonary and mental diseases or other dangerous maladies should not be allowed to marry. Careful selection and mating he declared necessary to prevent an increase of insanity, epilepsy and criminality.

RAILROAD CONTRACTORS SPY OUT A NEW LINE.

V. D. Williamson, R. B. Porter, of Porter Brothers, railroad contractors, W. E. Nelson and A. E. Hammond, were in the city last night and left today for Deschutes by auto. Mr. Nelson acting as chauffeur, says The Dallas Chronicle.

These are the men, who, it is said, are checking over the original survey of the line up the Deschutes to see that they are correct, and to learn if the route is such that it is practicable for a railroad. They state frankly that they may or may not build the line.

The surveys extend for 140 miles south from the mouth of Deschutes river. Rights of way have been secured for a large part of the distance. The line is one that commends itself as an easy line into interior Oregon. For the first 50 or 75 miles, however, but little business could be expected because the road would run through a deep canyon with scant productive country adjacent. The men did not state whether they belonged to the Hill or Harriman forces.
