## NEXT PRESIDENT MAY OPEN CANAL

BIG PROJECT MAY BE  
COMPLETED IN FOUR YEARS.

Greatest Engineering Feat of Modern  
Times Is Being Rushed to Comple-  
tion—Ditch Throwing Is Going on  
With Remarkable Speed—War De-  
partment Hopes to See the Finish  
During the Next Administration.

That the Panama canal, one of the  
greatest engineering projects of mod-  
ern times, will be dedicated by the  
next president, now appears proba-  
ble.

Reports received at the war de-  
partment in the last few weeks show  
constantly increasing speed and effi-  
ciency in the construction of the big  
ditch, and it is far from impossible  
that the canal will be so far finished  
four years hence that vessels can use  
it, says a Washington item.

If the hopes of the war department  
officials meet fulfillment, the next  
president will have the honor of ded-  
icating the canal, and his name will  
thus become inseparably connected  
with the gigantic project. Not in re-  
cent years has such fame been thrust  
upon a chief executive of the nation,  
and in the contest between Mr. Taft  
and Mr. Bryan this assumes added  
significance.

In any event, the canal question  
is no longer in politics, and whether  
the next administration is headed by  
Mr. Bryan or Mr. Taft, the work will  
be pushed with all possible energy. Un-  
der the army engineers, the work is  
going forward regardless of season or  
weather. Every report received from  
Colonel Goethals brings a smile to the  
face of General Luke E. Wright, the  
new head of the war department,  
since it bears news of added speed  
and difficulties conquered.

The July report of excavation is a  
most encouraging one. It establishes  
a new record for the rainy season.  
The grand total of earth removed was  
3,168,840 cubic yards, all of which  
except 122,884 cubic yards was taken  
from the canal prism.

This is 108,533 cubic yards more  
than the record for June and 314,420  
yards short of the highest dry season  
record, that of March, 1908. Com-  
pared with July, 1907, it shows an in-  
crease of 2,105,115 cubic yards. This  
comparison with July of last year  
shows that tremendous strides have  
been made in the matter of removing  
dirt from the canal prism in the rainy  
season.

Moreover, the rainfall of July, this  
year, was heavy. The average was  
11.14 inches, as compared with 10  
inches in June, the preceding month,  
and 10.13 inches in July, 1907.

It would be a strange thing in the  
light of the calculations that have  
been made as to the time required  
for the completion of the canal, if the  
administration following that of Mr.  
Roosevelt should see the canal suffi-  
ciently finished for traffic. Yet it is  
not impossible that this will be the  
case, as the most sober-minded of the  
canal officials are coming to view it.

school, which makes the teaching  
force very complete. Short address-  
es were given by each of the new  
teachers, which met with very en-  
thusiastic applause from the high  
school assembly.

The new department of manual  
training which has been added to the  
schools seems to be greatly appre-  
ciated, as there are already a large  
number of pupils who have signified  
their intention of joining one of the  
classes. At present the work will be  
for boys only, but later a department  
for girls will be added.

Thirty-one counties in Missouri  
have reported to the state bureau of  
labor and statistics that they have ex-  
ported during that year 40,371,891 doz-  
ens of eggs, or a total of 484,461,612
