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IN DEFENSE OF CHRISTIAN SCIENCE

The Boston Post of a recent date publishes the following defense of Christian Science by Prof. Albert Farlow. The article is cheerfully reprinted by the East Oregonian for the Christian Science society of this city. Prof. Farlow says:

In Dr. Richard C. Cabot's dissertation on Christian Science and its cures, which appear in McClure's Magazine, and which was reviewed in your issue of August 2, he declares: "For if it is true, as stated on page 120 of 'Science and Health,' that 'health is not a condition of matter but of mind, nor can the material senses bear reliable testimony on this subject,' of course 'the material senses' cannot be trusted when they testify that cancer, consumption, broken bones, or locomotor ataxia have been cured by Christian Science."

In reply to this statement, we would say that the evidence of the material senses, in respect to disease, yields under Christian Science treatment to a higher, better, more spiritual sense of being, consequently the patient does not need to ask the material senses to testify to or confirm the fact of the healing.

Dr. Cabot declares that he has "studied 100 cases of Christian Science cures recorded in the recent volumes of the Christian Science Journal" and that "putting together this evidence and comparing it with" his "own experience regarding the accuracy of his own patients' statements about their own diseases," his "conclusions are, first, that most Christian Science cures are probably genuine; but, second, that they are not the cures of organic diseases."

Incidentally he declares "functional diseases are no more imaginary than an ungovernable temper or a balky horse is imaginary. They are often the source of acute and long continued suffering. Indeed, I believe that there is no class of diseases that gives rise to so much keen suffering." Thus the doctor pays tribute to Christian Science by acknowledging that it heals "real" diseases and destroys an immense amount of suffering. So far, so good.

Every Case a Fit Subject. Proceeding, the doctor declares: "The sharpness of this distinction between organic and functional troubles is somewhat blurred," and "organic diseases are sometimes produced by functional disease" and "such organic diseases are often cured by Christian Science."

Without first experimenting with Christian Science treatment, it would doubtless be difficult to determine whether or not a given organic dis-

ease has been occasioned by functional disorders and is therefore according to Dr. Cabot's theory amenable to Christian Science theory. Therefore, on Dr. Cabot's authority alone, we have established the importance of at least experimenting with Christian Science.

Christian Science Cures All. Every case of functional disease having an organic foundation can only be cured by destroying its organic foundation. Therefore, on the testimony of these two distinguished authorities, the fact is established that Christian Science cures all kinds of diseases, for it is evident that a functional disorder which originates in a defective organ cannot be cured unless the organic disease is first destroyed, for the functional disorder being an effect must of necessity reappear so long as its cause is not destroyed.

Would Have an Equal Chance. Then the organic class would have an equal chance with the functional group. Not very long ago, one medical authority went so far as to declare that many organic diseases were nervous disorders. Such an authority adds still more to the confusion, and we begin to wonder if, after all, our medical brethren know any more about the real nature and cause of the disease than Christian Scientists.

While we make this statement we are well aware of the ability of our distinguished brethren to make a physical diagnosis of disease, and we are not unmindful that in this respect they possess an accomplishment to which the Christian Scientist makes no pretenses whatever except what he learns by observation and experience, and possibly some reading on the subject.

Statement Carries Hope. The doctor declares "Experience shows that when a person has had many doctors, many diagnoses, many 'diseases' or many operations, he usually turns out to be suffering from nervous prostration or some other form of functional nervous trouble." There are a great many persons in this world who have had many doctors and many diagnoses, many diseases, if not many operations, and it is kind in Dr. Cabot to point out the fact that there is hope for them in Christian Science.

TO TEACH EDITORS

MISSOURI HAS SCHOOL OF JOURNALISM

Embryo Editors Taking Entrance Examinations at the University of Missouri at Columbia — University Paper Will be Issued as Mouthpiece of the New Department of Journalism.

Columbia, Mo., Sept. 14.—Many would-be moulders of public opinion, embryo Wattersons, Brisbanes and Bennetts, appeared at the University of Missouri today to take the entrance examinations for the new School of Journalism to be conducted in connection with the state institution. Class work will begin next Thursday.

Walter Williams is dean of the school, with Charles G. Ross, a St. Louis newspaper man, as principal assistant. Fourteen other newspaper workers will assist in the instruction of the budding journalists.

The plan outlined by Mr. Joseph Pulitzer was taken as the basis for the Missouri school, to specialize on courses in English, economics, sociology, political science and some other branches taught in the usual academic courses, so as to give students of journalism what they most need, without burdening them with unnecessary details.

In conjunction with the lectures a daily newspaper, to be called the University Missourian, will be issued. It will be supplied with telegraphic service, and the students will do actual work in reporting and copy reading. The course comprises four years, and the students graduated will receive the degree of Bachelor of Science of Journalism. The course is to take rank with the other departments. An effort will be made to induce students to take a five-year course, which will make it possible for them to combine the courses of journalism and arts and complete both.

Both the Associated Press and the United Press associations have volunteered their service free, while the methods of equipment will be the same as in a newspaper office. Efforts will be made to make the publication self-supporting. This will be through the advertising.

Catholics Will Celebrate. One of the largest Catholic parades in the history of the country will march in St. Louis on October 18, when the cornerstone of the new Cathedral will be laid. This was decided at a meeting recently held of 83 parishes in the arch-diocese of St. Louis and six general societies.

Colored Old Fellows. Atlantic City, N. J., Sept. 14.—A black cloud is hovering over Atlantic City today, occasioned by the invasion of colored folk from all over the land for the convention of the Grand United Order of Old Fellows, an international negro fraternal order. The convention will extend through the week and the visitors will be entertained in an elaborate manner.

DOCTORS WANT BETTER LAWS

WASHINGTON ASSOCIATION OUTLINES PLANS

State Legislature Will be Asked to Pass Laws Protecting the Practice of Medicine—Criminal Practices Are Severely Condemned—Insanity Commission Urged by Speakers.

That the physicians of Washington are aware to the needs of the state is shown by the demands for better laws made by the state medical association in its recent session in Walla Walla. An item from Walla Walla says of the matter.

An insanity commission, to be recommended by the state association or state board of health and appointed only by the court, will be demanded of the next session of the legislature.

At a meeting of the state medical association the plan was endorsed and the association will be united in urging this reform of sanity practice which, it is urged, is demoralizing legal practice and bringing condemnation upon medical men.

Prosecuting Attorney Rapp delivered an able address on medical expert testimony, instead of the subject of indetail.

He urged the abolition of the hypothetical question and the appointment of a commission not of inexperienced physicians, but of men of wide experience in insanity cases, which would have sole charge where insanity would be pleaded, and that a law be enacted making it impossible to try such cases within two or three months, after the appointment of the commission, that the result of the investigation might be thoroughly satisfactory.

Oscar Cain, ex-prosecutor, focused in an address, giving many reasons for reforms in criminal practice, and urging the medical men to demand time in which to investigate before giving testimony in any case.

The association, 190 strong, heartily endorsed the sentiments and referred the papers and recommendations to the legislative committee.

Dr. C. N. Sutter, president, delivered his annual address, in which he urged stringent laws against quacks, the refusal to recognize men who follow criminal practices and an effort to drive them from the state.
