WASHINGTON REPORTS ON GOOD ROAD WORK.
The state of Washington issued its report recently of the progress made in road building since the first laws were enacted by the legislature of 1905 and 1907.

Two classes of roads have been constructed, state roads and state aid roads. The state pays the entire cost of the former, and the state and the counties through which the state aid roads run divide the cost of the latter.

Since 1905, when the first laws were enacted, 79.11 miles of state roads have been built at a cost of \$159,405.16; 5.16 miles of state aid roads at a cost of \$21,624.93, while about 72 miles of roads are under contract to be built.

Two steel bridges, one of 180-foot span and one of 250-foot span, have been constructed, while a third bridge of 100-foot span is under construction. Five combination bridges have been constructed, varying from 120-foot to 180-foot.

The character of the work done on all roads that have been accepted has been first class, and in no case has the old-fashioned make shift been resorted to.

Protecting the Quail.
The county game warden has had printed and placed in the county and city's office for free distribution among the farmers a large number of notices printed on glazed muslin, prohibiting hunting, shooting or trespassing on the land whereon these signs are posted. He is very desirous that the farmers when they are in town stop at the office and procure two or three of these signs to tack up on their premises. By means of this prohibitory measure Mr. Whitney hopes to prevent the killing of many quail until the legislature meets and laws can be passed prohibiting their killing for a number of years. Failure to heed these notices provides a fine of \$10, half of which goes to the owner of the land whereon the trespass is committed.—Union.

Spokane Pulls for the Congress.
W. H. Ude, traveling passenger agent for the Northern Pacific Railroad company, and H. L. Moody of the Spokane Chamber of Commerce, were in the city yesterday in the interests of an inland empire delegation to the irrigation congress which convenes in Albuquerque, New Mexico, September 23 to October 10, inclusive, says the Walla Walla Union.

It is the purpose of Spokane business men to bring the national congress to the Falls City in 1909 and it is for the purpose of lining up the Walla Walla people to support this plan that the Spokane men were in the city yesterday.

BRYAN MAY COME TO PACIFIC COAST

Col. William H. Dunphy, who is a member of the democratic national committee, expects to leave in a few days for Portland to attend a meeting of the national committeemen and state chairman of California, Oregon and Washington, on September 16, which has been called by National Chairman Mack, says the Walla Walla Bulletin.

The object in calling this meeting is the perfecting of an organization and the development of plans for an aggressive campaign in the Pacific coast states. The fact that the democrats of this section seem to think that Bryan will get a relatively larger per cent of the republican vote in the Pacific states than in any other of like population in the country is responsible for this energy, which they are putting forth at present for the perfecting of a strong organization.

While no definite announcement has been made, it is quite likely that at this conference the advisability of inviting the Comptroller to tour the Pacific states will be discussed. If this is deemed expedient at the coming conference and the national party leaders acquiesce in the plan, it is very likely that the peerless leader will be seen on the coast during the latter part of October and that he will probably speak in Walla Walla.

All Coke Records Broken.
The total production of coke in the United States in 1907 amounted to 49,379,564 tons, valued at \$111,539,126, a total that passes all previous records in the history of coke and is the highest recorded in the 28 years exceeded by 11 cents the maximum rate previously making in this country, being nearly double the output of 1906 and more than three times that of 1897. The increase over the production of 1906 was 4,378,347 short tons, or 12.02 per cent, in quantity, and \$19,931,692, or 21.76 per cent, in value. The average price per ton at the ovens, \$2.74, is greater by 22 cents than the 1906 production.

Will Manage Taft Tour.
Cincinnati, Sept. 14.—It was announced at Taft headquarters today that Arthur Vorys will accompany the candidate on a speech-making tour of the south and west. Vorys is expected to return tonight. Taft will probably start September 23.
