UMATILLA'S PLAN SHOWS STATE HOW

SUPERINTENDENTS STUDY PLANS TO RAISE FUNDS.

Will Ask Legislature for Relief to Insure Six Months School in Each District—Would Lease Water Powers for Schools' Benefit—Increase Inheritance Tax Also.

Salem, Sept. 15.—The conditions of Umatilla county were taken as a basis for the recommendations of the state superintendents' convention as to raising and apportioning school funds.

In discussing these questions the convention unanimously endorsed the recommendations of the special committee of the State Teachers' association.

The State Teachers' association committee took the position that some plan should be devised whereby the irreducible state school fund could be enlarged sufficiently so that it, together with the county fund, would insure not less than six months of school for each district in the state.

They proposed that the legislature be asked to provide two forms of relief: First, a temporary relief to be placed in the state school fund for use each year and a portion of the funds now raised through indirect taxation, the amount to be gradually diminished as the permanent fund is increased. Second, that permanent relief be established by the state taking possession of its unappropriated water powers and leasing crediting the proceeds to the principal of the irreducible state school fund; also that the inheritance tax raised by the state be credited to the irreducible state school fund.

The committee also recommended a change in the basis of apportionment of school funds in proportion to the number of teachers employed and the daily attendance of the pupils in school. They considered this plan more equitable than apportioning according to the school census as is now done. As a basis for their conclusions they took the exact conditions in the counties of Josephine, Lane, Marion and Umatilla.

WOULD USE RECALL ON PORTLAND COUNCIL.

Clarence True Wilson, pastor of the Centenary Methodist church. As a result of this quiet investigation and observation Dr. Wilson has come to the conclusion that there are four of the city fathers who ought no longer to remain in office.

"I do not wish to say who these men are at this time," said Dr. Wilson this morning, "for I consider it a little premature to make mention of names."

At present this leaves the authority in the hands of President Homan, who is absent from the city at the conference at Wenatchee, Washington.

Will Sow on Snow.

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 15.—Rangers on the Coeur d'Alene forest reserves in northern Idaho, have received orders from the department at Washington to gather seeds of tamarack and white and yellow pine, which will be sown broadcast on the snow the coming winter in places where no tamarack or pine trees are growing. Several hundred thousand acres of forests are included in the reserves in Idaho and it is believed by men skilled in woodcraft that this method of reforesting will result in a new crop of timber in from 20 to 40 years, thus adding millions of dollars to the assets of the state beside perpetuating the lumber industry.

The largest clock in the world has been set up on the Jersey shore opposite New York. Its dial measures 28 feet across; the minute hand is a beam 15 feet 3 inches long, and with its counterpoise weighs 700 pounds. The tip of this minute hand will travel 23 inches each minute or one-half mile a day. The hands and the numerals will be outlined in incandescent lights so people miles away can tell the time.

GROWS CORN ENSILAGE ON SUMMER FALLOW LAND.

Walla Walla, Sept. 15.—What is perhaps one of the first of its kind to be used in this section of the state is the new silo built by W. P. Reser on his farm a few miles south of the city. This silo is built especially for making ensilage from the crop of corn which Mr. Reser obtained from 100 acres of his farm land. The ensilage will be used this winter to feed large bands of cattle and hogs.

Mr. Reser has been interested in ensilage as a stock food for several years. His first experiment was so successful that he decided to build a silo with a capacity of 150 tons. This will be filled with corn which is grown on land that otherwise would be used as summer fallow, thus making a great saving in stock food. The food thus obtained will easily last all winter and is fattening for stock, especially cattle.

PRESIDENT DIAZ IS 78 YEARS OLD

MEXICO HONORS HER VETERAN STATESMAN

Birthday of the President Is Always a Cause for National Rejoicing—Despite His Extreme Age President Diaz Is Active and Progressive and Is One of the World's Good Rulers.

City of Mexico, Sept. 15.—Porfirio Diaz, president of the Mexican republic, today reached his 78th year and his birthday is being celebrated all over the republic, prior to the more elaborate observance tomorrow of the 98th anniversary of Mexican independence.

The "grillo," as it is called, is always marked by a general merry-making, in which all patriotic Mexicans take part and his year's observance promises to be more enthusiastic than ever.

Despite his extreme age, President Diaz still retains a considerable measure of the physical and intellectual vigor that has been so largely responsible for the rapid advancement of his country among the nations of the world.

Although he has announced his intention of retiring when his present term expires, a general demand is being made that he continue to fill the office he has so long occupied until death relieves him of the responsibility.

Mexico was still in a state of disorder, resulting from the French invasion and the struggle against the empire of Maximilian, when General Diaz became chief executive of the country.

Able, brave and, above all, honest, his influence was immediately felt and the general tumult soon subsided. Since that time, with the exception of a few minor revolutionary outbreaks, Mexico has been at peace and has yearly advanced in material and intellectual wealth.
