SPLENDID GAIN AT THE ACADEMY

OPENING ENROLLMENT BETTER THAN EVER

Marticulation on Monday Surpassed That of Last Year by 15—Koonitz Hall Filled and Boys' Dormitory Nearly Taken—Convocation Address Monday Night Opened Season—Members of Faculty for Coming Year.

With a substantial increase over the opening attendance last year the doors of the Pendleton academy swung open Monday and work in that school is now under way. For the opening the enrollment records show that 15 more students matriculated than upon the opening day a year ago.

Because of the good attendance and general bright prospects for the school, President Blankney and other members of the faculty are well pleased. Koonitz hall is now entirely filled, and Brown hall, the boys dormitory, is filling up more rapidly than was expected. Last year the total attendance at the academy was 107 and if present prospects continue this figure will be easily passed this year.

At the Presbyterian church Monday evening the annual convocation address was delivered the academy students by Rev. W. S. Seemann, of La Grande. It was an inspiring address.

Aside from President Blankney, the other members of the present academy faculty are Prof. F. K. Nordhoff, mathematics; Belle Weir Wallace, Greek and Latin; Alvin E. Gronwald, French, German and Spanish; Mrs. F. K. Nordhoff, teacher of grades; Mrs. L. S. Blankney oratory and physical culture; Harriet Esther Young, piano and organ; Mrs. Anna-Selkirk Norton, teacher of voice; Miss Bernice Ruppe, assistant teacher of voice; A. H. Johnson, orchestral and band instruments. Mr. and Mrs. Chilson of Ukiah are in charge of the academy ground and of the boarding halls.

STATE FAIR MOST SUCCESSFUL IN YEARS

Salem, Sept. 16.—Never has Oregon's State fair equalled the success promised by this year's show. Even the weather man seems to have ransacked his stock to secure just a little the finest specimen among all his offerings, and although a slight rain has marked the meeting, the result has only been a cleared atmosphere and general freshness.

Interested crowds yesterday morning thronged about the Oregon agricultural college exhibits, where demonstrations in budding and grafting were given. Illustrated pictures were also presented on different subjects, including "Animal Husbandry," "Horticultural," "Engineering," and "Farm Tests," by leading lecturers of the college.

Today is Salem day, one of the feature days of the fair. Thursday is Portland day, which with Salem day will make up the biggest two days of the fair, when the heaviest purses are hung up at the track and when the largest attendance is expected.

Exhibits Unsurpassed.

The state fair this year far surpasses any previous exposition at Salem, both in the number and quality of stock, exhibits and attractions. Horse lovers declare that the speed program was never better.

The people of Salem have entered into a hearty cooperation with the fair board, and accommodations have been provided to handle all visitors. The board of trade has gone into the hotel business, with the assistance of the residents, and listed 800 rooms in private homes.

Boost Spirit Present.

Not only are the college lectures of great interest to the State fair visitors, but those who heard it are still talking about Tom Richardson's address to Oregonians Monday evening.

He delivered the principal address of the evening, the keynote of which was "pull together" for a greater Oregon. The subject was "Team Work in Oregon." The speech was delivered in the usual impetuous manner, with enthusiasm for all things connected with Oregon.

Stock Judging Begins.

Judging of stock will begin at once and should be concluded in a day or so. F. H. Schribner of Rosendale, Wis., will judge dairy breeds. J. P. Stodder of Burton, Kan., will be judge of beef breeds; Professor Carlisle of Colorado Agricultural college is dean of livestock judges; R. E. Jones of Nashville, Tenn., will judge the poultry.

County Exhibits of High Class.

The eight competitors in the county exhibit contest have done splendid work each having put up a display of products which would be creditable as a state exhibit. Because the collections of products are so large and contain such a large variety of fruits, grains, grasses, vegetables, etc., visitors are unable to determine which excels. Only the careful and systematic checkings of the judges will decide the contest. Those who prepared the exhibits for the various counties are: Multnomah, A. F. Miller; Marion, W. A. Taylor; Benton, Frank Groves; Lane, E. W. Warren; Polk, Mrs. F. A. Wolfe; Columbia, W. J. Fullerton; Clatsop, B. S. Worley and C. S. Dow; Yamhill, J. C. Cooper and M. O. Lowndale. Exhibits of products grown on a single farm have been presented by Mrs. P. A. Wolfe, of Polk county, and F. H. Hughtson of Benton.

Excellent Art Exhibit.

Mrs. W. N. Gatens, superintendent of the art department, has made that feature of the exposition much more attractive than ever before by courageously exercising judgment in admitting pictures to places on the walls. Heretofore it has been the practice to accept all pictures offered. As a result, the walls were a mass of pictures, the effect of the whole being to injure the attractiveness of the really good productions. Miss Gatens has refused to admit pictures that are without merit, and as a consequence the pictures shown are of a better class and can be arranged to better advantage.

SAYS ALL DRINKS BUT WATER ARE DRUGGED.

London, Sept. 16.—Water, according to the Lancet, the leading medical journal, is the only real safe liquid to drink. All other beverages—alcoholic and non-alcoholic—are drugs. This is what the writer says:

"The thirsty person who cannot satisfy his thirst unless the beverage contains what is in reality a drug, has really acquired an unhealthy habit, or, to put it plainly, a disease. Yet what else is the alcohol of the various alcoholic beverages, the caffeine of tea and coffee, the glucose or quinine of bitters, or even the ginger of ginger beer or of ginger ale, the aromatic oil of the liquor, the carbonic acid gas in soda water, the citric acid of the lemon, and so on, but a drug?"

"All these when consumed clearly convey something into the organism over and above water itself; they cannot quench thirst in the sense that water does. Plain water has become

a rare beverage nowadays, and it is a pity that it is so.

"We are inclined to think that the prejudice against the drinking of plain water has arisen from a mistaken idea in the public mind that plain water has disease entities in it, or 'insects,' and that only when mixed with spirits, hops, malt and other things, or else in the form of tea or beer, which necessarily are free from disease organisms because they are boiled, is it rendered safe to drink."

The peril attending the prejudice against water is thus indicated:

"Under stress of great thirst large doses of alcohol, tea, tannin, carbonic acid gas, bitters and so on may be consumed, and the effects of an unduly prolonged course of drugs, such as in reality these are, sooner or later manifest themselves, frequently indicating a disturbance of function which in the long run may do serious harm to the whole organism."

INVENTIVE MAN SPLITS WOOD WITH DYNAMITE

Baker City, Sept. 16.—The remarkable inventive genius of a Baker City man was recently manifested when he worked out a method of splitting logs with dynamite. The scheme was a success, but—

For the past week there has been much conjecture as to origin of the fire which swept quite a territory south of Baker City a few days ago. Now the cause is known. It is learned that a wood chopper in the vicinity decided to do his work with more ease than had been the custom and he conceived the idea of splitting logs with dynamite. It is claimed he put in several sticks in a big log, one of the sticks exploded and set the log on fire, but the remaining sticks were slow in doing their important work.

The woodchopper was afraid to go near enough to the log to put out the flames because of the unexploded dynamite and as a result a good sized fire was started and under headway before anything could be done. The man who used the dynamite suffered a loss of several hundred cords of wood.

LEADS SIMPLE LIFE.

Austrian Archduke and His Soul Mate Happy in Cottage.

Berlin, Sept. 16.—Leopold Woelfling, Archduke of Austria, whose romance requires no recalling, is now leading the simple life at Blomville-sur-Mer, with his new spouse Madeline Ritter, and a young brother of the latter. He occupies a villa the rent of which works out at less than \$10 a week.

His sole "staff" consists of one female servant. But the three of them work. The archduke himself goes to market and buys food, he also lays the tablecloth on a table in the back garden, Madeline does the cooking, etc., while her youthful brother occupies himself with the more menial work.

JAPS WILL EXTEND THE GLAD HAND

TOKIO PREPARES TO MAKE WELCOME AMERICAN GUESTS

Thunderous Salutes Will Greet Visitors from Western Hemisphere—Japs Prepare the Greatest Naval Spectacle in Time of Peace—the World Has Ever Known—All Important Vessels in Mikado's Navy Will Join in Demonstration of Friendship.

Tokio, Sept. 16.—Drawn up in battle array, their big guns in instant readiness to belch forth death and destruction, the warships of Japan will assemble just a month from today to welcome the American fleet. As the great vessels floating the Stars and Stripes steam into Yokohama harbor the following day, every ship in the long battle-line of Nippon's navy will boom forth a thunderous salute. But no shells will shriek across the water, and the booming of Japanese guns will carry a message of friendship instead of marking the unleashing of the dogs of war.

Officials of the Japanese navy department declare that the spectacle of the mighty fleet from the West being welcomed by the greatest fleet ever assembled in the east will be the most remarkable display in time of peace, that the world has ever known.

All of the ships of the Japanese navy are now gathering at the various stations for maneuvers, the most elaborate and intricate ever undertaken in the orient, and the welcome to the American fleet will come as the climax of the month's naval activities.

Practically all of the important vessels in the mikado's navy will take part in the maneuvers and the subsequent welcome to the American fleet.
