WALLA WALLA MAY HAVE ENFORCED VACCINATION.

Compulsory vaccination of school children, which has been suggested as a possible means of preventing the annual epidemic of smallpox in the schools of Walla Walla seems to have run amuck what is likely to prove its undoing in Seattle, says the Walla Walla Union.
G. W. Green, a tea merchant of the coast city, intends to bring a test case soon, it is said, to see whether or not the law will stand.
The Seattle health officers endeavored to secure the vaccination of a son of Green's, to which the father strenuously objected, claiming as his reasons for doing so probable results which would likely prove fatal to the boy. It is asserted that unless the health department of that city back down the case will be heard in the immediate future.

STRIKE BREAKER SLAYS OVER PICKET'S SLUR

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 16.—Stung by the taunts of Robert Kirk, a striking picket who called him a "scab," Daniel Hepner, a Canadian Pacific strike breaker, shot the former, according to a Winnipeg special, Kirk would probably die. His assailant was found at his father's home and is now in custody. As the result of the shooting several hundred strikers marched to the railroad shops, intending to overawe the strikebreakers. They were dispersed by a riot call.

TO COUNT STARS.

California Professors Go to South America for Five Years.

With Professor Lewis Ross and Robert Varnum of the Dudley observatory at Albany, N. Y., Professor R. H. Tucker of the Lick observatory has departed for South America to undertake the task of observing and cataloging the southern stars, numbering upward of 25,000, that are of merit in astronomical eyes, says a San Francisco item.

A temporary observatory is to be built in the Argentine republic at San Luis, on the edge of the Andean plateau, and here for four or five years the scientists will keep nightly vigil. The remote locality was selected because of the clear nights and the pure atmospheric conditions. The expedition is undertaken under the direction of the Carnegie institute at Washington.

Taft to Go South.
Cincinnati, Sept. 16.—It was announced late this afternoon that Judge Taft will begin a preliminary tour of the south on September 25. He will speak in Kentucky and Tennessee. Western leaders insist upon his visiting Denver.

FISHER CRIMINAL? NO. MUST BE WARDEN

The Dalles, Sept. 16.—"You're another," retorts F. A. Seufert, the fish king of the Columbia river, when Master Fish Warden McAllister accuses him of criminality in violating the fish laws enacted by the people of Oregon at the last election—only Seufert makes McAllister the blacker criminal—in effect he calls him a thief.

The latest development in the fish fight which is added to the visible amount of the gasty of nations came yesterday when Seufert charged that Master Fish Warden McAllister stole the fish which was confiscated yesterday at the Seufert cannery and has instructed his attorneys to bring action against the fish warden in attempt to recover the fish or their equivalent in money.

Two tons of fish were confiscated from F. A. Seufert yesterday afternoon by Master Fish Warden H. C. McAllister, who followed up this work by swearing out two complaints against the fish king last night.
Mr. McAllister was unable to have the confiscated fish shipped on the O. R. & N. road or to procure a boat for this purpose yesterday afternoon so chartered the portage car and an engine from the same company and had the fish brought to this city, where it was repacked and shipped to Portland via the O. R. & N.

"If I had been at the cannery," said Mr. Seufert, "McAllister would not have gotten off as easily with the

fish. When a person steals anything the officers get him.

"The fish warden swiped the fish while we were away from the cannery, that is all there is to it. I have nothing to say about the matter except that it is now in the hands of my attorneys. They have been instructed to arrest McAllister for taking the fish. He took them down to Portland and now he will have to bring them back or pay their equivalent in money. I had rather have the fish, however."

SECOND VICTORY FOR WRIGHT AEROPLANE.

Lemans, France, Sept. 16.—The superiority of the Wright principles in aerial navigation was proven beyond doubt today when Wilbur Wright, brother of Orville Wright, whose sensational flights at Washington last week startled the world, broke the world's speed records when he sailed for 39 minutes and 19 seconds at the rate of 46 miles per hour.

This second victory of the Wright aeroplane makes the Wright brothers the undisputed champions of aerial flight. Wilbur Wright's record today places him first in speed and second in duration of flight, and the remarkable performances of Orville at Washington make that brother the champion for duration and holder of the second record for speed.
