DEPARTMENT STORES SUFFER

NEWSPAPER CRUSADE HITS
LARGE CONCERNS HARD

Sears, Roebuck & Company Lose 20
Per Cent of Net Sales and Profit
Less By a Cool Million During Past
Year—The "Patronize Home Mer-
chants" Campaign and the Hard
Times Held Responsible.

Chicago, Sept. 16.—That the big
Chicago mail order houses have suf-
fered severely in the campaign being
waged by the country newspapers for
the protection of home merchants
and by the recent hard times is
shown by the annual report of Sears,
Roebuck & Company, the largest con-
cern of its kind in the world. The
net profits for the last year fell short
over a million dollars from the pre-
ceding year, and there was a falling
off of almost 20 per cent in net sales.
A "home industry" crusade has been
carried on by local newspapers
throughout the central west during
the last year or two, and it is be-
lieved that this movement, as much as
the hard times, may have had its in-
fluence upon the mail trade.

The report shows that the com-
pany's net sales amounted to \$40,-
\$43,866, or \$9,878,973 less than those
for the previous year, while dividends
received from investments involved
\$59,686, or \$18,882 more than those
recorded for the preceding year,
making a total net income of \$40,-
\$33,552, or \$9,860,091 less than that
for the fiscal year ended June 30,
1907.

Expenditures for interest and de-
preciation charges involved \$38,498,-
756, or \$8,656,385 less than similar
expenditures for the previous year,
leaving net profits of \$2,034,796, or
\$1,203,706 less than those for the fi-
scal year ended June 30, 1907.

PENNY-IN-THE-SLOT
SOLVES HUMAN ILLS.

Paris, Sept. 16.—The penny-in-the-
slot machine has been adapted for
use in the medical profession by a
physician.

The physician consists of a human
figure of iron enameled in various
colors. The chief organs are mapped
out on the body, red for the heart,
blue for the liver and so on.

A coin slit corresponds to each or-
gan. When you go to consult the
doctor you consult his machine. If
you have a sore throat you put a coin
into its throat. For heart disease a
coin must be dropped into the car-
diac valve.

In return, the automaton instantly
produces a clearly printed prescrip-
tion on a ticket, and all you have to
do then is to have it made up and to
get well again.

In the case of amputations, the
ticket presumably consists of a
voucher entitling the bearer to have
one leg or arm cut off in some sur-
gery.

Squatters in Wallowa.

D. C. Birchoux, the timber loca-
tor, arrived last night from an ex-
tended trip to that portion of Wal-
lowa county where a number of sec-
tions of land heretofore in the forest
reserve are to be thrown open to
entry on the 15th of this month, says
the La Grande Star. This prospec-
tive opportunity to secure claims is
the cause of the present line up at the
land office. Mr. Birchoux brings the
report that every claim worth having
has been seized upon by squatters and
in many cases they are, to use Mr.
Birchoux's expression, the squatters
are "two deep." In a number of in-
stances the squatters are building
cabins close together and there can
be no other result than that in such
cases the claims will overlap. Some
of these who are now in the line up
have previously exercised the rights
of a squatter.

While there are about 25 sections to
be thrown open much of it is not
worth having, and on the other hand,
there are claims that have three and
a half million feet of saw lumber on
them.

In the mix up there are unques-
tioned chances for serious trouble. It

ago that two men were killed in a
dispute over the possession of a claim
and the man who did the shooting is
now serving a term in the peniten-
tiary.
