SALMON FISHER TALKS OF LEAVING OREGON

The Dalles, Sept. 17.—F. A. Seufert, the fish king, doesn't like to be called by that title. That is only one of the things that disgusts Seufert, however. He does not relish Master Fish Warden McAllister's action in confiscating his fish Monday, and further he has no burning love for the Oregon fishing law as enacted by the voters of the state following the efforts of the up-river and down-river fishermen respectively, to secure monopolies of that industry last spring.

Seufert's bill of complaint is set forth in a letter to the Chronicle and says in part:

"I am perfectly willing to fight out the middle of fish laws that the voters of this state have saddled upon those engaged in the fishing business and if we may not operate our business on this side of the river in a decent way we will remove it to a decent state to operate it in. Oregon

APPLE PACKING ART TAUGHT BY UNION

Hood River, Sept. 17.—Monday morning over 70 tables of the 100 prepared by the Hood River Applegrowers' union were filled with students who came to learn the art of apple packing. More have been joining the band of workers until now all the available room is about occupied. Most of the class are residents of this vicinity, although there are a few from outside districts and among the pupils are about a dozen young ladies. This school was opened in order to develop packers to properly take care of the big apple crop which will be shipped from Hood River this year, and the managers of the applegrowers' union hit upon this plan in order to take care of the busi-

ness. The course in packing will last all the week and possibly a few days longer. Boxes and apples have been furnished by the union and instructions are given free of charge.

Stewart Must Make Good.

He will appear before the medical board and will be given a strict physical examination. If in the slightest unfit Col. Stewart's retirement will be made compulsory.

GANDY ROAD FOR CANDY FARMERS

U. S. GOVERNMENT BUILDS
HIGHWAY OF MOLASSES.

Department of Agriculture Plans Unique Roadway for Use in Dusty Districts — Molasses, Oil, Lime-water and Rock Form Combination—To Save Farmers Thousands in Hauling Costs — King Louis' Road of Sugar.

Washington, Sept. 17.—To gratify the whim of a king's mistress Louis XIV of France built a 12-mile road of sugar to give his favorite a sleigh-ride in summer time.

To save American farmers thousands of dollars in hauling costs and make a dust proof road, the department of agriculture is now completing experiments and testing what the future will know as the "candy" road. "Candy" in more ways than one this new road is termed. Officials believe it will be of great benefit to the communities adopting it. And, moreover, the principal material of its manufacture is molasses.

In all flights of fancy it is probable that nobody except a scientist would go so far afield in research as to adopt molasses as a road building material, but that is exactly what has been done here, and Assistant Chemist Prevost Hubbard of Director Page's scientific corps, is leveling a half mile stretch of road near Newton, and in a few days will be in active supervision of the laying of the first molasses road of history.

The molasses used is the almost useless by-product of the great cane sugar refineries of the south, and the best sugar refineries of the west and southwest. It is sickly sweet, nearly as black and as thick as tar, and almost as powerful as a binder. Having always been a waste product, it can be bought at a lower price than coal tar and in greater quantities.

When the quantity and the sticky consistency of this material was called to the attention of Director Page, a number of months ago, he conceived the idea that it might aid in solving the always difficult problem of dusty roads. He sent for a supply for laboratory experiments and detailed Mr. Hubbard to conduct them. The molasses was blended with oils and lime-water; was mixed with rock dust, with earth and with sand and tried out under heat and under water. It behaved so well and held out such promises for ideal roads that the practical test of a real road was recently decided upon.

ASKS FOR PIE IN SCHOOL CURRICULUM

Spokane, Sept. 16.—Whether the study of "pie" shall be added to the high school curriculum is the question which now faces the Spokane school board. Mrs. J. W. Marshall has appeared before that body and suggested that the aspects of pie, geometrical, physical, chemical and physiological were worthy of a place in the study role of any civilized system of education. Moreover, the lady herself is willing to initiate the youthful mind into the penicillia of the great American dessert.

"Pie," said Mrs. Marshall, "is the great American dessert. Nine out of every 10 American families eat pie. It is a subject that appeals to every man's stomach."

Mrs. Marshall has a new and original formula for making pie crust which she desires to sell to the public schools to be used in the domestic science department. After a short oration on pies in general and a dissertation of the merits of her pie crust in particular she submitted samples of the product of her method of making the pastry.

"Simply lovely," said Dr. W. H. Allen, president of the board of directors. "Madam, the board will consider your proposition and let you know later what action will be taken." What was left of the pie was laid on the table for consideration upon Mrs. Marshall's departure.

WEDS MAN SHE HATES "FOR 24 HOURS ONLY"

IS FOURTH OF JULY FOR MEXICO'S REPUBLIC.

City of Mexico, Sept. 16.—With all the enthusiasm which the Americans across the northern border display on the Fourth of July, the 58th anniversary of the achievement of independence by the Mexicans over the Spaniards was celebrated today.

The festivities began yesterday, the birthday of President Diaz, and continued through today with many elab-

orate exercises, which will culminate tonight with fireworks, illuminations and concerts and the opening of congress.

Two years hence, on September 16, 1910, Mexico will celebrate the centennial anniversary of its independence, and the occasion will be signalized in a unique manner. It will be observed simultaneously in all the important cities and towns of the republic by the starting of public improvements which will be of permanent value, instead of by an evanescent exposition confined to one city and soon over and forgotten.

It is estimated that the average cost of these municipal enterprises will be \$100,000, and the total amount which will be spent on the various projects before completion will approximate \$100,000,000. The municipal authorities are expected to be prepared to begin, on the said date, water works, drainage systems, market houses, public buildings or whatever public improvements may be needed.

Irish Industrial Conference.

Galway, Ireland, Sept. 16.—Opening of new markets for Irish goods outside of the Emerald Isle is the special subject under consideration today at the opening session of the All-Ireland Industrial conference. Irish residents of America, Germany, France, Denmark, Australia and Mexico are in attendance. An extensive exhibition of Irish manufactures is being held in connection with the conference. Special commemorative medals of Irish bronze, with enamel and gold, were presented to each delegate. The conference hopes to revive the lacemaking and similar handwork industries which have almost been driven out of existence by cheaper manufacturing processes.

Catholic Games.

Rome, Sept. 16.—It has been definitely decided that the first events in the Papal Jubilee international athletic competition will be decided a week from today. The carnival of sports will continue until September 28. Many famous European athletes are already in training here, and entries are expected from the United States and Canada. Only Catholic athletes will participate and the games will be under the direct patronage of Pope Pius.

Oklahoma Grand Army.

Sulphur, Okla., Sept. 16.—Veterans of the new department of Oklahoma, Grand Army of the Republic, gathered here today in force for the first reunion since the consolidation of the Oklahoma and Indian territory divisions. Many Rough Riders and other veterans of the Spanish-American war are here as the guests of the civil war veterans. The reunion will last three days.

ODD FELLOWS GATHER FOR DENVER CONVENTION

Denver, Colo., Sept. 16.—Many Odd Fellows invaded the "mille high" city today, attracted by the general convention of the order, which will be in session here during the next 10 days.

The proceedings will include the business meetings of the sovereign grand lodge, the largest fraternal legislative body in America, which will begin next Monday. The Patriarchs Millant will also meet and will engage in the usual drills and contests.

All sections of the United States and Canada are represented by delegates, and it is expected the total attendance during the session will reach 30,000.

The Independent Order of Odd Fellows now has a membership of nearly 1,400,000, with grand lodges in every state and territory of the union, in every province of Canada and in Australasia, Germany, Denmark, Sweden, Switzerland and the Netherlands.
