

METHODISTS ARE WORRIED

M. E. CHURCH SOUTH IN
STUDY FOR SOLUTION.

Conference in Session at Milton Devotes Debate to Question of Uniting Local Body With First M. E. Church—Recommended by Presiding Elder—Distinguished Visitor Attends Gathering—Appointments Announced Sunday.

Milton, Sept. 17.—The withdrawal of the M. E. church south from church work in Pendleton and the uniting of that body with the First Methodist church of that city, is the one great subject of debate of the annual conference of the M. E. church south, which is now in session in this city.

The conference opened yesterday with Bishop Atkins presiding. Rev. J. Compton acts as secretary, a position he has filled with great acceptance for the last 20 years. There are over 70 delegates in attendance and the church is beautifully decorated for the occasion.

A very encouraging report from the Spokane district was given by Presiding Elder J. G. Carrick, and J. D. Crook gave a fine report from the Boise district.

This afternoon the Woman's Missionary society held a meeting, the president, Mrs. H. S. Shangle, in the chair. An address was given by J. R. Pepper, president of the layman's organization and a member of the national board of international lessons.

He is one of the most prominent men in the Methodist church in the south and comes to the annual conference here to address the lay delegates of the convention. He has already visited the Montana conference held recently in Butte and comes to Milton en route to western Oregon and California points where he will speak before several conferences.

Last night there was a great audience present to listen to Bishop Adkin's address. Fine music was furnished by the choir. Rev. Dr. Lienallen, presiding elder of the Walla Walla district, could not be present, and sent a written report in which he advocated the withdrawal of the M. E. church south from the field at Pendleton and uniting with the north M. E. church. There will be much discussion on this subject and it will be thoroughly reviewed by the bishop and probably action taken before the close of the conference.

The annual appointments will be read either Sunday night or Monday morning.

Freewater Agent Grabs Live Wire.

KING EDWARD NOW IS PERFECTLY SOLVENT

London, Sept. 17.—The American friends of King Edward of England are rapturously explaining how it comes about that his majesty has been so genial to all comers at Marienbad this season, for the first time since his ascension to the throne. They announce that the king is at last free from debt.

Soon after he started for the cure this summer the king's messenger brought him a closing statement framed by the committee on his personal finances, consisting of Sir Ernest Cassel, Lord Farquhar and Lord Esher. This committee was formed when Albert Edward came into his sovereignty, and under the terms of the stewardship they were to take over his private debts incurred when he was Prince of Wales.

The history of their delicate task would make a book of chapters passing strange.

Edward desired that his obligations be liquidated through such interference, rather than have his popularity with the world endangered, by beginning his reign with a petition to parliament for a grant to regulate his affairs.

It appears that when his mother's purse failed him, Edward was helped by his elder sister, the late empress of Germany, who gave him strictly private loans. As soon as she died, Prince Stolberg, master of her household, had to render an accounting of her estate to her eldest son, the emperor of Germany. When note of Edward's large obligation was found his majesty asked his English conferees to settle up with the shortest possible delay.

The king's committee, however, paid the emperor forthwith, but the diplomacy of Europe feels to this day the imprint of that chilling family episode in finance.

Now it is announced—unofficially of course, for the king's debts cannot be bruited—that every one has been squared to the farthing, so that England at last has a solvent sovereign.
