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WEALTH PARASITIC, SAYS MILLIONAIRE

SOCIALIST ORATOR TELLS OF PEOPLE'S TROUBLES.

James Phelps Stokes, Wealthy Settlement Worker and Socialist, Speaks for Party at Court House Last Evening—Says Workers Are Merely Pensioners Subsisting on What Wealth Will Give—Socialistic Plan of Remedy.

That the owners in the great modern corporations are distinctly parasites was the declaration of James Phelps Stokes, "Little Brother of the Rich," millionaire and former clubman, but now settlement worker and leader of the "parlor socialists" who last night addressed a meeting at the court house on the subject of socialism.

Stokes' delivery was clear, his manner, except for the eastern intonation of his speech, magnetic, and his reasoning perhaps the clearest exposition of socialistic principles ever made to Pendleton people. The millionaire socialist spoke rapidly and enthusiastically picturing the woes of the working classes with the resistless urge of an ascetic reformer. The principles enunciated were radical rather than incendiary and Mr. Stokes made his appeal through clearness rather than sensationalism.

PENDLETON SHIPMENTS OF STOCK INCREASE

Stock shipments from Pendleton over the line of the Northern Pacific have been heavier this year than for a number of seasons, according to Walter Adams, the local agent. This statement is also borne out by Assistant Superintendent James G. Cutler, who says the stock business is good at all points in this division, it being a marvel to him where all the cattle, sheep and horses are coming from.

A total of 21 carloads of livestock are billed to be shipped from this city to Seattle tomorrow. Nate Raines is sending out 29 carloads of cattle, while Carsten Brothers are sending two loads of cattle, and E. W. Dooley, the government horse buyer, is shipping a carload of cavalry horses.

Installing "A. B. C." System.

Assistant Superintendent James G. Cutler of the Northern Pacific, who was in the city today, says the "A. B. C." system of dispatching trains is being extended on the main line of the N. P. from Pasco to Vancouver, but that it will not be on the branch lines for the present at least. This is a block signal system to prevent wrecks, but instead of the automatic blocks as used on the O. R. & N. the telegraph operators serve in this capacity, three different men acting as checks upon each other.

Railroad Men in Town.

James G. Cutler, assistant superintendent of the Northern Pacific; S. B. Calderhead, general agent for the same line at Walla Walla, and E. A. McKenna, traveling freight agent, were in Pendleton today. McKenna and Calderhead drove to Athena on business for the road, while Cutler left for Walla Walla this afternoon.

Will Talk About Pioneer Days.

Hon. J. D. Lee, last year's president of the state pioneers' association, has written the fair commission accepting the invitation to attend the fair and to speak on the subject of "Pioneers of the Old Days." His address will be one of the principal features of pioneer day, Tuesday.

Ball Set But Still in Jail.

In the justice's court yesterday Judge Parkes set bail for young Bloom in the sum of \$500. This amount the boy has not yet secured though he hoped at the time to do so. Bloom was arrested for passing a \$5.50 check upon a Chinaman for \$55.

Dolph Eddy Returns.

Dolph Eddy, who was bookkeeper for R. Alexander, 14 years ago, but who has been in San Francisco since that time, has returned to accept his old position. He had been with Mr. Alexander for sixteen years and a half before going to California.

More Irrigation Delegates.

County Judge T. P. Gilliland has named R. Alexander, Dr. F. W. Vincent and Matt Mosgrove as delegates to the national irrigation congress which is to be held at Albuquerque, New Mexico.

Kenneth McRae Rents Farm.

Kenneth McRae, the well known farmer, has made a deal whereby he rents his farm to Messrs. Erickson and Tyson, the former a half brother to Dave Nelson. The McBride ranch is west of Holli.

Mrs. Mitchell Returned.

Mrs. C. J. Mitchell, wife of the new theatrical manager, returned last evening from Dayton, Wash., where she was called by the death of a cousin. Mr. and Mrs. Mitchell have apartments at the Bowman cottage.

PRO AMERICANISM STRONG IN FAR AUSTRALIA

Melbourne, Sept. 17.—Pro-Americanism is the dominant note in the Australian federal session opening today. The entire country is convinced that the fleet's recent visit has inaugurated a kind of unofficial alliance between Australia and the great American republic. In white against yellow struggle which many Australians deem inevitable for control of the Pacific it is the general conviction that Americans and Australians will fight side by side. Many members argue that it is practically useless for the colony to prepare for war alone.

DE CAPRIO WINS HIGHER HONORS

FAIR BAND DIRECTOR LED SOUSA'S MUSICIANS

Furnished Music for Fair Two Years Ago and Returns This Year With New Laurels—Three Soloists of Merit Will Be With the Band This Year—Concerts Every Afternoon and Evening.

Signor Antonio De Caprio, who with his famous band, is to furnish music for the coming district fair, will be kindly remembered by local people who heard him during the fair two years ago. At that time De Caprio had a splendid band and the music they furnished was one of the best attractions of the fair.

This year Signor De Caprio comes to Pendleton with new fame. Since

he played here he has won high honors in the musical world. Perhaps the most distinguished occasion in which he has participated was that when he led Sousa's great band one evening. It was over a year ago and De Caprio led the band when it played the "Portland Rose Festival March," composed by De Caprio. Concerning the incident the Portland Oregonian said:

It would be hard indeed to say whether the fulsome applause which was rendered to Sousa, the March King, or the undrained ovation that was given to Signor A. DeCaprio, composer of the "Portland Rose Festival" march, was the conspicuous feature of last night's concert at the Armory, which 2000 music lovers attended. It is also difficult to say whether loyalty to a local artist did not have much to do with the record-breaking crowd which poured and jammed its way inside the massive building of stone and brick.

DeCaprio acquitted himself nobly, that much cannot be gainsaid, for when he stepped on the dias to which Sousa had led him, and from which the eminent bandmaster had just retired, there was resounding applause and salutes of spontaneous greeting. DeCaprio had labored long and ardently arranging his "Rose Festival" march for a full band of 65 pieces, and had had only one rehearsal, but when he raised his baton the house was hushed and the three-score of Sousa artists swung gracefully into the march and carried it through to the finish in accurate and rhythmic response to every motion of the leader's baton.

With the DeCaprio band when it comes here for the fair will be three soloists of ability. DeCaprio himself is a baritone soloist, while his other soloists are Signor Biancone, carlonet, and Mr. Rosebroke, cornetist.

CHOLERA IN PHILIPPINES IS NOW UNDER CONTROL

Washington, Sept. 17.—The adjutant general's office was today advised of the death from Asiatic cholera in the Philippines of Bert T. Christian, Company I, Twenty-sixth regiment of infantry. This is the first information which has reached the department for some days regarding any case of cholera in the islands, the responsible officers about three weeks ago, in response to inquiries from Washington having reported that the outbreak at Pangasinan was under control.

It was there an army officer and several men of the Twenty-seventh regiment of infantry (negro) died of the disease. At the surgeon general's office no fear is felt of the disease spreading to any extent and much less that the army would suffer seriously if it did so. The disease, the officers say, is easily prevented by the adoption of proper sanitary precautions.

A dispatch received at the war department from Havana says there is one real and one suspected case of yellow fever here.

ONE ARMED MAN TO PLAY FOOTBALL

Walla Walla, Sept. 17.—Whitman may possess the distinction this year of being one of the few, perhaps the only college football team, having a one-armed man in its lineup. Henderson, a lad who hails from Seattle, has entered the local institution and although possessing but one arm has signified his intention of trying for a guard position on the team. He is big and husky and in addition has had several years' experience on the gridiron, having played on the Seattle Athletic club and other aggregations of like strength.

DISTRICT IS NOT LIABLE FOR DEBT

Portland, Sept. 17.—School districts cannot be held liable for damages for the negligence of their directors. This is the substance of an important decision given by Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court this morning in sustaining a demurrer to the complaint in the case of the Inman-Poulsen Lumber company against school district No. 1.

The case arose out of the construction of a building by district No. 12 near Lentz, which has since been absorbed by No. 1. The school directors failed to exact a bond from the contractors, Clark & Simpson, as they were supposed to do, and Inman-Poulsen brought suit to collect on material worth \$335, it being impossible to place a lien on a public building. Judge Gantenbein holds that such a suit cannot be maintained against the school district, notwithstanding the negligence of the directors.

POLLMAN FOR MAYOR BAKER BANKER TO RUN

Baker City, Sept. 17.—William Pollman yesterday morning consented to be a candidate for mayor at the coming city election and with the strong backing of the business men his success is certain.

Wm. Pollman is president of the Baker Loan & Trust company, a bank that has grown steadily since he started it in 1905. He is also a large land owner and has other extensive business interests. He has made a success of all his private ventures and

is eminently qualified to direct the financial affairs and look after the general welfare of Baker City.

STUDENT POISONED BY SILEY HAZERS

San Francisco, Sept. 17.—An investigation is being made today of the recent illness of Carl E. Hoag, a student of the University of California, caused, he claims, by a poisonous mixture he was compelled to drink as a part of his initiation into the Alpha Kappa Kappa, a medical fraternity.

About a week ago Hoag, together with Samuel E. Bailey and Ernest W. Clancy, were taken into the order. As a final test, Hoag claims, he was compelled to drink a strange tasting mixture, believed to have contained nitrate of silver. He was taken violently ill and it was only after long and heroic medical treatment that he was declared out of danger. His fraternity brothers claim there was nothing harmful in the mixture.
