UMATILLA APPLES CHALLENGE THE BEST

If apples from the west end of Umatilla county are entered in the National Apple Show at Spokane in December, as is proposed by enthusiastic irrigators, they will enter into competition with an enormous quantity of fruit, and the very finest that can be raised in this country; and if the Umatilla apples make good as the enthusiasts declare they undoubtedly will, it will fix once for all the place of that district among the fruit-growing sections of the northwest.

The apples from the Echo-Hermiston district will unquestionably show a fine color and flavor and if the samples taken from that at present undeveloped district make a showing that quality would indicate, it will mean that when developed to commercial orchards of standard varieties and given scientific culture, Umatilla county's irrigated section will be second to no other region in the whole Columbia river valley.

Some idea of the competition against which the local fruit will be entered can be gained from the following dispatch from Spokane:

With such favor and interest has the National Apple show been received over the country that it is expected fully 25 carloads of fruit will be on exhibition and that at least 75,000

square feet of space will be required for the display.

H. J. Neely, manager of the show, has received a communication from E. L. Stewart of Prosser, Wash., former president of the Washington State Horticultural association, recommending that steps be taken to get good representative exhibits in the carload class.

His letter in part is:

"I will certainly enter the contest with a carload of apples. It seems to me that this is a grand opportunity for the different apple districts of the northwest to show their faith in their claims of growing superior apples."

"I think the matter should be brought to the attention of the commercial clubs of the different districts with a view of taking the matter up and getting the best equipped grower in each district to enter the competition."

"It is certainly the best opportunity the west has ever had of showing to the east that we are really growing choice apples on a commercial scale, and at the same time convince them that we lead the world in our grade and pack."

"I would prefer to be in competition with 25 competitors rather than with only two or three, and if it could

be known early enough how many cars would be entered, it could be arranged to have an auction sale of the exhibits of this class on the last day of the show and the buyer could land his purchase in the eastern markets in time for the holiday trade. I believe this could be worked up to be the most important feature of the show and as the apples would be the 'cream of the northwest' I think they would sell at prices never before heard of in any country."

Exhibitors Run No Risk.

"The parties making exhibits in this class would be running no risk whatever, for if they put up a meritorious fruit in good shape, it is certain to sell at a price to more than repay the extra expense of making exhibit, without taking into consideration the prize money at all."

"The competition cannot fail to do a vast amount of good to the whole country, for it should bring out the very best material and the very best ideas and workmanship in grade and pack, and in this way show thousands of visitors the very best methods known."

"I know that personally I want to find the man that beats me out, for when I do, I am sure to learn something that I can profit by."

COMET LIKE CAT COMES BACK AGAIN

PAYS VISIT EVERY SEVENTY-FIVE YEARS

Scientists Watch for Appearance of Halley's Comet—Due to Make Its Appearance in the Near Future—Very Oldest Comet Known Existed Before Christian Era—Comets Lost in Trackless Waste of Starry Heavens.

Washington, Sept. 18.—Astronomers at the naval observatory are not paying much attention to the return of Halley's comet, which is now approaching the earth. This comet makes an appearance every 75 years, and is the oldest celestial wanderer known to earth-people, having been observed, according to old records, previous to the beginning of the Christian era. Scientific observations since the inception of the modern science of astronomy show that its orbit varied little and that it may be confidently expected according to schedule time.

While Washington astronomers are not taking observations, several western observatories have made preparations to photograph the comet, and should their efforts develop anything of value, the naval observatory will later take up the comet quest.

With the announcement of every returning comet, superstitious people immediately begin to entertain absurd fears of what might happen in case of a collision. While not denying that such a collision is possible, and that conditions might develop which would render it disastrous, most astronomers assert that such a disaster is so remote as to be almost unthinkable.

Some scientists believe that life was extinguished on the earth more than once by fires generated by comets and that the growth of human, animal and vegetable life took millions of years to reach its present development.

A comet, in brief, is a bit of some planet which has cracked off and is flying rapidly through space. It is intensely hot. It generates enormous heat by its friction going through the ether. Every such comet, while measuring perhaps thousands of miles in diameter at the head, carries with it a sort of burning atmosphere of its own, which precedes it for some distance and trails out behind it for hundreds of thousands of miles in length which stretch across the heavens.

Meteorites, which are fragments of comets have destroyed ships at sea and made huge holes in the earth. Many of these have fallen in the southwest, which seems to be a favorite place for meteorites, and the desert of Arizona is pitted with holes which many miners believe were made by such visitors.

The earth came in contact with the tail of a comet on June 30, 1861. The tail was 118 degrees long. Many people thought it caused the civil war. The comet appeared low down toward the horizon in the northwest. The whole heavens as we see them are only 180 degrees. So our comet struck across almost the whole heavens.

We were buried into the substance of that comet's tail 300,000 miles. And there was not the slightest thing by which anybody could know what happened. There was not even a haze. The tails of comets are so thin, so tenuous, that it is almost impossible to put it in words. Through the nucleus or head of a comet the light of a fifth magnitude star passes without any diminution.

There are dozens of lost comets known to astronomy. These monsters of the sky have into sight, astonished everybody by their brilliancy, had their orbits calculated and then when the astronomers predicted they were going to reappear they never returned and the astronomers were covered with confusion.

DEATH BY PHONE IS FIENDISH SCHEME

San Francisco, Sept. 18.—Diabolical cunning seems to have surpassed itself in fiendish ingenuity in the latest method of assassination.

Death by telephone is the most recent invention of the assassin and was devised for President Cabrera, of Guatemala, according to the statements of the officers of the City of Para, which arrived here today.

Th revolutionists in the plot hit upon a new way of accomplishing death when they attached a wire to the telephone in Cabrera's office and connected the other end with an infernal machine hidden in another part of the room. This is supposed to have been accomplished during the night, and there was nothing in the appearance of the room to intimate that sudden death had been so cunningly prepared for the dictator.

Soon after Cabrera entered the room the telephone bell rang. Whether the plotters had themselves called the president's number or had left that to chance and the ordinary routine of the day has not been discovered. Answering the call, Cabrera took the receiver off the hook and on the instant came an explosion that shattered the desk and flung the president against the wall. The device of the would-be assassins had worked as they had planned, but their victim escaped with a few bruises.

For want of a better clew the police arrested five Salvadoreans on suspicion. Their immediate execution was ordered, but the American minister at Guatemala intervened and the sentence was commuted to banishment and the five were placed on board the City of Para and taken to Acapulco, where they went ashore.

LACEY LEADS WAR AGAINST PROGRESSIVES.

Oskaloosa, Ia., Sept. 18.—Major John F. Lacey, who has been chosen by the "stand-pat" republicans of Iowa to lead in the senatorial fight against Governor Cummins, is probably the most representative conservative in the state.

For many years Major Lacey represented this district in congress, being chairman of the public lands committee of the house. He is best known as author of the Lacey bird law and of the law regulating and protecting the labor of coal miners in the territories.

Major Lacey was first choice of many of the republicans although several of the leaders urged Secretary Wilson and Governor Jackson to enter the race for the toga of the late Senator Allison. Over the state generally Lacey has been looked upon as the logical heir of the "Nestor" of the senate and it is declared that he could duplicate Senator Allison's reputed feat of walking from Iowa to Washington on the keys of a piano and never sounding a note.

Interparliamentary Union.

Berlin, Sept. 18.—With the United States, Mexico and nearly all of the Latin-American republics of South and Central America represented by distinguished delegates, the International Interparliamentary union began its sessions in Berlin today. Many important matters connected with national and international law and parliamentary procedure are slated for discussion.
