WOULD NOT HELP IN BURYING SELF

COFFEY WON'T HELP IN
DOCTOR COE'S PROJECT.

Accused of Prejudice Against Oregon Graduates He Refuses to Furnish Data to Help Convict Self of Unfairness Even Upon Cordial Invitation of Editor of Medical Sentinel—Coe Declares Prominent Surgeon Is Unethical.

That Dr. Henry Waldo Coe, who between looking after his Umatilla county land interests, professional practice and other enterprises manages to find time to edit the Medical Sentinel, deserves high rank as an unconscious humorist was made evident in the latest issue of his medical journal which, while firing another broadside in his wordy duel with Dr. R. C. Coffey, grimly recounts the details of Dr. Coe's calm and cordial invitation to his opponent to assist in the elaborate preparations the Sentinel is making for the professional interment of the president of the Oregon Medical association.

Dr. Coe makes no secret of his absorbing passion for the possession of the Coffey scalp which he considers would make a splendid addition to his collection of physiological curiosities.

The Sentinel's latest charge is that Dr. Coffey in his position as state medical examiner is notoriously unfriendly to graduates of Oregon schools. So open is this position of the medical examiner says the Sentinel that out of recent 23 graduates from the institutions of this state only three have been granted Oregon diplomas.

To assist him in finding out just why such facts should exist Dr. Coe called upon Dr. Coffey. His invitation was gentlemanly, courteous—a model of Chesterfieldian correspondence. So was Dr. Coffey's reply, which indicated that that gentleman had no hankering to participate in the proceedings of his own professional demise. The information was not forthcoming and Dr. Coe, since there was nothing else to do, has published the correspondence in the latest edition of the Sentinel.

Besides the alleged prejudice against Oregon graduates, Dr. Coe also accuses Dr. Coffey of unprofessional ethics—of lurid forms of self-exploitation, of rate cutting and fee-diversion—the latter charge being worded to include an unfair division of fees.

Dr. Coffey when asked his opinion of the latest attack in the discussion which is now focussing the attention of the medical profession upon the two warriors, declined further discussion.

ONTARIO JOCKEY CLUB OPENS FALL SESSION

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 18.—Toronto is today the Mecca of hundreds of Canadian and American horsemen and race track followers. The Ontario Jockey club will begin its fall meet tomorrow, and the nine liberal stakes combined with a small entry fee, have attracted many horsemen with fine strings.

The \$2000 events include the To-

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ronto Autumn cup, a handicap for 3-year-olds and upward at a mile and a quarter, and for 2-year-olds and upward at two miles and a quarter.

There are a couple of stakes on the program with \$1500 added, the Durham cup being for 2-year-olds and upward at a mile and six furlongs, with a challenge cup presented by the Earl of Durham. Another event of the same value is the Grey stakes, for 2-year-olds. The event is at a mile, and will be a true test of the ability of the pick of the young division.

The Michaelmas handicap is also for 2-year-olds at six furlongs, and has \$1200 added money. The Epson handicap, with the same amount in added money, is for all ages at six furlongs.

The several \$1000 events include the Dominion handicap, for 3-year-olds and upward foaled in Canada, and the Dufferin plate, a selling race for 3-year-olds and upward at a mile and an eighth. There are also a couple of steeplechases with the same amount in added money. They are the September steeplechase at two miles and the Woodbine Autumn steeplechase, a handicap event, at two miles and a half.

STATE CANNOT HOLD ITS LIQUOR MONOPOLY

Richmond, Va., Sept. 18.—Covering every phase of the South Carolina dispensary case is an exhaustive opinion which deals with the broad question of state rights, the United States circuit court of appeals handed down an opinion today fully sustaining Circuit Court Judge Pritchard in the appointment of receivers to wind up the affairs of liquor monopoly of the commonwealth.

There was no dissenting opinion. Chief Justice Melville W. Fuller and Judge Edmund Waddill, Jr., sustaining the law as propounded by Judge Boyd. As counsel for the state, W. M. Stevenson of Bennettsville, S. C., asked for a stay of judgment in order to prepare an appeal. The court allowed him 40 days.

The decision is a matter of paramount importance in South Carolina, where the dispensary has long been the object of attack. Its failure to serve as a temperance measure, along with charges of graft, caused a revolution of feeling, which resulted in the passage of a law to abolish it as a state institution, at the same time permitting towns and counties to decide by popular vote whether or not they desire to retain it under local option or county management.

1000 STRAW HATS MEET TRAGIC FATE

New York, Sept. 18.—There was a big smash in Wall street yesterday. Fully 1000 straw hats went down to ruin. September 15 is the date set by the financial district for the end of summer headgear, and numerous brokers who ventured into the region of the bears and bulls in defiance of the rule, soon saw their "straws" look like a naval practice target. Although there was less demolishing than in former years, the curb market and Consolidated Stock Exchange, as well as the lower corridor of the Produce Exchange, kept up precedent in good shape.

WALLA WALLA PLANS FRUIT GROWERS' UNION

Walla Walla, Sept. 18.—For the purpose of organizing an apple growers' combine to secure more uniform and equitable prices and also to combat the recent advance in transportation rates, a special meeting of Walla Walla valley fruit growers will be held in the court house at 1 o'clock Monday.

The plan of organization will likely be similar to that adopted by fruitmen in other sections of the state, ex-

cept that several new ideas are to be presented for consideration and discussion. It is proposed at this time to secure an approximate estimate of the number of boxes of each variety of apples grown in the valley during the season so that whenever buyers ask for an estimate of the year's crop it can easily be given. To secure this approximate figure every fruit grower who will be present at the meeting Monday is urged to prepare a list of his apples and the number of boxes of each variety which he will harvest.

Some kind of growers' pool will likely be arranged at the meeting in the court house and it is expected that from 10 to 25 per cent advance in prices can be secured by cooperation of growers.

AID FOR "LUNGERS" IS CONGRESS' HOPE

Washington, Sept. 18.—Many distinguished physicians, sociologists and men of prominence in other walks of life are already in the national capital to take part in next week's World's Congress on Tuberculosis. Every great nation on the earth will have representation at the meeting and will add its influence to the movement for a world-wide warfare on the white plague.

Hundreds of exhibits pertaining to the anti-tuberculosis campaign are now being installed. Among the results that are expected to follow from these exhibits are mentioned:

Sanitary dwellings and house furniture for the working classes.
 Sanitary passenger coaches.
 Advanced and accurate instruction of school children in the methods of preventing consumption.
 Eradication of tuberculosis in cattle.

Construction of the most advanced sanatoria the world has ever known.
 Construction of model factories and workshops.

America will reap the first fruits of all these advances. Physicians and sociologists assert that, through this congress and as a direct result of the prize competitions, the fight for the eradication of consumption in this country will be advanced many years. The prizes that are offered will pit nations, municipalities and individuals against each other. They will develop utilities that will protect the healthy, heal the sick, decrease the nation's death rate and add to the national wealth.

As this congress will eclipse all others of its kind ever held anywhere, so does the list of prizes surpass in value and in wisdom of selection those offered by previous congresses. Especially evident is the regard for the health and strength of the nation's working men and their families.
