DR. HENRY LOVE PROMOTED.

Special Agent of Land Office Made United States Marshal.

Washington, Sept. 18.—The department of justice today announced that Dr. Henry Love, a special agent of the general land office, assigned to duty in Oregon, had been appointed United States marshal for the third division of Alaska, in place of George C. Perry.

Love has been a candidate for an Alaska marshalship for some time. He appealed directly to the president and it was solely due to the president that he was appointed. The president was familiar with Love's record in the Philippines and as special agent of the land office, and it was entirely upon his record that Love was chosen. He is expected to start for Fairbanks immediately.

Dr. Love is well known in this county, having been inspector for the department of appeals in several cases, especially in the west end of the county.

JAPS FORM CLUB.

Incorporate As Association for Benefit of Members.

North Yakima, Sept. 18.—The resident sons of Nippon have through the agency of Attorney Vestal Snyder, incorporated an association, the papers of which were filed today, and which will be known as The Japanese Association of North Yakima.

The object of the new association is to improve the condition of the members socially, from a literary standpoint and incidentally to bring them into a position which will enable them to become better acquainted with the Caucasian world.

There will be no annual dues attached to the new order, any Japanese over 16 years of age may become a member, and there will be general reading rooms established so that general knowledge may be disseminated to those in need of it.

ATTEMPTS TO DIE AND AT LAST MAKES GOOD

Portland, Sept. 18.—"Nerve" carried John Weis through in his attempt to suicide here yesterday. He was an employee of Fritz theater, and hanged himself in the basement of the Fritz building.

Determined to die, he lifted his feet from the floor and stubbornly held them in the air until he choked to death.

The man had gone into the basement to prepare his supper early in the evening. Some two hours later his body was found by Frederick Roth, another employee, hanging from a rope made of towels.

Weis had tied the towel to a nail, but with one around his neck, there was no place high enough for him to leap from and suffocate. As a last resort he doubled his legs as far up under his body as possible and slowly died.

SWEARING PREACHER MUCH TOO MUCH

Bellingham, Sept. 18.—"Cuss words," big, rund and unmistakable, startled Bellingham's chief of police this morning as he made his way to the city hall. The colorful language was too much for the chief, who promptly took into custody the offender, James Wardner, an itinerant preacher. Wardner appears to be demented and was attracting quite a crowd by his language, being followed to jail by the mob.

Globe Trotter Arrested.

Seattle, Sept. 18.—Harry Seaton, a globe trotter, arrived from New York at 4 o'clock this morning and while sitting on the doorstep of a saloon, was arrested. Seaton carried his famous Indian clubs and had a big thirst. He was released after convincing the police that he was not a suspicious character.

Stage Hands Strike.

Boise, Sept. 18.—An hour before the opening of the new \$150,000 Pinney theater, the most handsome in the inter-mountain country, the stage hands struck last night for recognition of the union. The demand was rejected and the performance proceeded with the manager of the theater in charge of the stage.
