BUMPER APPLE CROP THIS YEAR AT LA GRANDE

La Grande, Ore., Sept. 18.—On the eve of the apple harvest in this valley, indications are that the largest crop in the history of the fruit raising industry in the Grand Ronde valley will be gathered. The foreign shipments will total 300 cars, according to fruit men, and aside from this will be 50 cars for the home consumption.

Local shippers are preparing to dispose of the fruit as rapidly as it ripens and is picked. Markets are unready at present, but it has been stated by buyers that with the beginning of the new year the markets will open strong. While apples are being picked at this time, it is principally the summer varieties.

MANY CATTLE COMING HERE

STOCKMEN BRINGING HERDS FOR SHIPMENT.

James Jones Now on Trail With 600 Head for Seattle Market—Central Country Needs Railroad—Rains Freshen Range and Gladden Stockmen—Lon Downs Glad to Return From Iowa and Tells of Former Home in That State.

Albee, Sept. 18.—Large bunches of beef cattle are daily passing through Albee to Pendleton, from which place they will be shipped to the Seattle markets, and thence to Alaska.

One of the largest bunches is that of James Jones, who is now on the trail from the Ilee country south of Canyon City with 600 head of fine steers. The stockmen are all longing for a railroad into their country as the long drive with beef takes time and incurs a great risk, the army of cowboys employed and the loss of weight on the hard trip often eating up the entire profits of the venture.

The weather here has been cloudy and with rains, so that the grass has begun to freshen up on the range. This is most welcome to the stockmen as the pasture had become dryer and scarcer than in years.

MIND VERSUS MONEY IN CALIFORNIA COURT

San Francisco, Sept. 18.—What is the value, in dollars and cents of the benefit derived by an invalid from psychic force applied by a person of a stronger mind? Is it worth \$5500? These are questions that a jury in Judge Graham's court will be called upon to decide either today or tomorrow, in one of the strangest cases that has ever come up for decision in the local courts.

Mrs. Mary Cashman, a psychic medium, is suing for \$5500 from the estate of Mrs. Sarah F. Hiller. Mrs. Hiller, who was the wife of Dr. Albert Hiller, a celebrated physiologist, died in January, 1907. She left an estate valued at a half million dollars and named her two sisters, Mrs. Louisa W. Knowlton and Mrs. Elizabeth L. Real, as administrators.

Before Mrs. Hiller's death, she was attended by Mrs. Cashman for the betterment of her physical and mental health, says Mrs. Cashman. It is understood that the psychologist was to receive for her services the proceeds from the sale of a piece of property that is now valued at \$5500.

The woman put in her bill against the estate but the two sisters of Mrs. Hiller refused to honor it. They say that Mrs. Cashman led Mrs. Hiller to believe that she, Mrs. Cashman, was Jehovah. Attorney J. M. Young who claims to be a psychologist, was on the stand today for cross-examination in the case. He says that he has studied psychology for 25 years and that the contentions of Mrs. Cashman are in accordance with the known effects of the practice of the science. People can be made well by suggestion, he said.

The witness was led through all the phases of the subject in a grilling cross-examination.

NETHER EXTREMITIES FIGURE IN DIVORCE

Oakland, Cal., Sept. 18.—Whisper it—shocking—but true. Legs figure most prominently in the latest divorce sensation of this city—not frog legs either, just the simple sort made famous by that old soldier who wanted a chew. Only yesterday consideration of the suit for annulment of marriage filed by Arthur F. WAGES ARE HIGHER NOW BUT FOOD COSTS MORE

Washington, Sept. 18.—The average wages per hour in the principal manufacturing and mechanical industries of the country were 3.7 per cent higher in 1907 than in 1906, while retail prices of food were 4.2 per cent higher, according to the July report of the bureau of labor. The regular hours of labor per week were 4-10 of 1 per cent lower and the number of employees in establishments investigated by the bureau showed an increase of 1 per cent. The report shows that as compared with the 10 years preceding, -1890 to 1899, the average wage in 1907 was 27.7 per cent higher; the number of employees 44.4 per cent greater, with a decrease of 5 per cent in the average hours of labor per week. The retail price of the principal articles of food was 29.6 per cent higher in 1907 than for the period of 1890 to 1899. Compared with the average for the same 10-year period the food-purchasing power of an hour's wage in 1907 was 6.8 per cent greater. Retail prices of food in 1907 were higher than in any other year of the 18-year period above named, being 4.2 per cent higher than in 1906.
