OPEN RIVER WAY FOR WHEAT TRAFFIC.

Hood River, Sept. 19.—Assurances have been given the Open River Transportation company that a sufficient quantity of wheat will be kept at the upper river landings to keep its fleet well supplied with cargoes. On receipt of this piece of cheering information officers and a crew for the steamer Relief were appointed and they will leave for the upper river on the steamer J. N. Teal tomorrow. The company will place the Relief in regular service a few days later. She will ply between the state portage road and points on the upper Columbia. Toward the latter part of October there will be two other steamers operating on the upper Columbia. These boats are being built at Celilo and are being hurried to completion. Each will have capacity for handling about 200 tons of grain.

During the low water period the government will remove obstructions from the channel of the upper river, making it navigable at an early date as far inland as Lewiston Idaho.

WILL GUARD PRISONERS AT OLD SAN QUENTIN

Sacramento, Sept. 19.—San Quentin, which with its memories of pioneer bandits, is the best known prison in the west, will be the scene of great reform in the government's method of treating prisoners as soon as the work on the new prison building which was commenced today is completed. The prison authorities will segregate the prisoners, making three classes, through which method of grading it is expected to accomplish much in the reformation of first offenders. Each prisoner will have a separate cell and each class or grade will have a separate yard for recreation. If the prisoners behave they will be allowed in the first class where plain clothes will be given them and their hair may grow long.

KIDNAP SQUAD IS TO SEARCH FOR CHILDREN.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Strenuous methods to stamp out the kidnapping evil which seems prevalent in this city will be taken by the "Kidnap" squad which was organized among the city detectives by Chief of Police Shippey. The squad will at once commence active work.

Within the past month 15 girls of between the ages of 13 and 19 years have been lost, their disappearance being as complete as though the earth had swallowed them. All the girls come from good families.

Chief Shippey believes that an organized gang is operating in the city.

TEACHERS SEEK REST WITH NERVE POTION.

Dayton, Wash., Sept. 18.—Seeking relief from worries in a potent nerve potion, Prof. Smith, principal of the Turner schools, indulged too freely Saturday night in some kind of "dope" and in consequence was still in a state of "innocuous desecration" on Tuesday morning when Sheriff Frank Beards arrived on the scene to investigate the case. The professor recently arrived from the east and had taught only a week at Turner with Floyd Clancy as assistant, when

his system, under the heavy strain of his arduous duties, demanded a soothing potion. He therefore visited Dayton Saturday and laid in a stock of Bomidia sufficient to keep him in a state of bliss for a week.

TEDDY RUN GOVERNMENT? NO, BAKER'S SHERIFF.

Supreme Court to Decide.

Salem, Sept. 19.—Chief Justice Bean today allowed a writ of error in the case of the state of Oregon vs. Christ Nielsen, which involves police jurisdiction over the waters of the Columbia river, so the case can be carried up to the United States supreme court. Nielsen was arrested by the Oregon authorities on the Washington side and found guilty. He was fined for violating the Oregon prohibitory fishing laws. The question is whether Oregon can assert police power on the Washington side.

Pay for Indian Fighters.

Portland, Sept. 19.—Oregon and Washington Indian war veterans will use their influence again this winter in the effort to secure the passage of a bill in the Washington legislature allowing the survivors of early frontier battles \$2 per day for past services. At present the remaining handful of men who risked their lives 50 years ago to advance civilization, are receiving \$8 per month federal pension.

Four Men Hurt.

San Pedro, Cal., Sept. 19.—Four men were seriously injured here today by the explosion of an oil tank on the steamer San Gabriel which was loading lumber at the wharf of the Jerhoff-Cuzner Lumber company near here.

WAR IS WAGED ON OAK PARK MASHERS.

Chicago, Sept. 19.—Citizens of South Oak Park yesterday organized a vigilance committee to put an end to the terrorizing of women and children by "mashers" and "peeping Toms."

Nine prominent business men of the suburb, incensed by the insults members of their families have been forced to endure, volunteered to do police duty and walk beats until the prowlers are driven from the community.

They applied for stars and author-

ity to make arrests. These were secured from J. E. Tristram, clerk of the village, and members of the vigilance committee went on duty for the first time last night.

The men are provided with revolvers and flash lights and are instructed to "shoot if necessary."
