TUBERCULOSIS CONVENTION OPEN TODAY

Washington, Sept. 21.—Enemies of the white plague from every civilized nation of the earth and from every state of the union assembled in Washington to begin a world wide warfare that is expected eventually to result in the wiping out of this terrible scourge of humanity. The fifth International Congress on Tuberculosis, convened today, represents beyond all doubt the largest aggregation of scientific and educated humanitarians ever gathered in a single city. Backed by the medical and sociological science of the age, with unlimited funds at its disposal and a definite object in view, it seems hardly possible that the congress can fail of attaining its end. The convention opened today, to last until October 12, will likely be a historical event and will be remembered when other more spectacular events are forgotten.

Every important commonwealth of the union has sent committees to the congress, and the nations of Europe and South America are represented by their most distinguished physicians, savants and humanitarians. Upon his return to Washington tomorrow, President Roosevelt will take an active interest in the congress and will probably preside at some of the sessions.

The last International Congress on Tuberculosis was held in Paris in 1905, and three years before that a similar congress was held in London. That the present meeting will be far more important than any of its predecessors, both in attendance, influence and practical results, is generally admitted. This is the first congress to be held in the United States, and will probably be the last for many

years to come.

Representatives of 46 foreign countries are here and there is eager competition for the honor of securing the next congress. Addresses will be made by some of the most prominent scientists of Great Britain, Canada, France, Sweden, Germany, Holland, Russia and Latin America.

The list of papers to be presented includes contributions to scientific research on the subject of the cure and prevention of tuberculosis by the following distinguished savants:

Dr. K. W. Phillips, of Edenburg, founder of the first tuberculosis dispensary.
 Dr. Theodore Williams of London.
 Dr. Arthur Newsholme, health officer of Brighton, England, director of King Edward's sanatorium.
 Dr. C. H. Spronck of Utrecht, Holland.

Dr. Turban of Daves-Platz, Switzerland, the originator of the scheme generally followed at present for the classification of tuberculosis.

Dr. Gotthold Pannwitz of Berlin, secretary-general of the International Conference on Tuberculosis.

Dr. Emil von Behring, of Marburg, the originator of the diphtheria antitoxin.

Dr. Calmette, director of the Pasteur Institute at Lille, France.

Dr. Letulle of Paris, secretary-general of the last International Congress on Tuberculosis.

Dr. S. Kitano of Tokyo, Japan, director of the Imperial Institute for the research of infectious diseases.

The congress is divided into seven sections, every section being under the direction of men of distinction in their particular fields. William H. Welch of the Johns Hopkins University will preside over Pathology and Bacteriology. The Clinical Study of Tuberculosis will be in charge of Dr. Vincent Y. Bowditch of Boston. Dr. Charles H. Mayo of Rochester, Minn., will preside over Surgery and Orthopedics. Dr. Abraham Jacobi of New York will direct investigation as to Tuberculosis in children. Edward T. Devine of New York, will have charge of the work concerning Hygienic, Social, Industrial and Economic Aspects of Tuberculosis. Surgeon-General Walter Wyman of the

United States Public Health and Marine Hospital Service will preside over the department of State and Municipal Control of Tuberculosis. Tuberculosis in Animals and its Relation to Man will be discussed under the supervision of Dr. Leonard Pearson of Philadelphia.

The exhibition and the congress are housed in the National Museum, adjoining the Smithsonian. The exhibition is practically a world's fair on the subject of tuberculosis, from Alaska down to the Cape of Good Hope, from the Steppes of northern Russia to the diamond fields of South Africa.

A prize of \$1000 is offered for the best evidence of effective work in the prevention or relief of tuberculosis by any voluntary association since the last International congress in 1905. In addition, two gold medals and three silver medals will be awarded, and will be accompanied by diplomas or certificates of award. Evidence is to include all forms of printed matter, educational leaflets, reports, etc.

A prize of \$1000 is offered for the best exhibit of an existing sanatorium for the treatment of curable cases of tuberculosis among the working classes. Medals of gold and silver with diplomas or certificates also will be given. The exhibit must show in detail, construction, equipment, management and results obtained.

A prize of \$1000 is offered for the best exhibit of a furnished house for a family or group of families of the working class, designed in the interest of the crusade against tuberculosis. This prize is designed to stimulate efforts toward obtaining a maximum of sunlight, ventilation, proper heating, and general sanitary arrangement for an inexpensive house. A model of the house and furnishings is required. Medals and diplomas also will be awarded.

A prize of \$1000 is offered for the best exhibit of a dispensary or kindred institution for the treatment of the tuberculous poor. The exhibit must show in detail construction, equipment, management and results obtained. Medals and diplomas also will be given.

A prize of \$1000 is offered for the best exhibit of a hospital for the treatment of advanced pulmonary tuberculosis. The exhibit must show construction, management and results. Medals and certificates will be awarded as well.

The Hodgkins Fund Prize of \$1500 is offered by the Smithsonian Institute for the best treatise that may be submitted on "The Relation of Atmospheric Air to Tuberculosis."

PARTY PASSES HAT FOR FIRST TIME IN OREGON

Portland, Sept. 21.—For the first time in the history of the Oregon republicans, the Oregonians are being asked to send contributions to the national committee, instead of receiving funds from that source. This is not the only state which is being assessed by the national committee. Washington has been notified to "dig up," instead of passing the hat, which is a novel experience, especially for the Seattle politicians.

One donation has been received by the Oregon state committee from the national headquarters. This is a check for \$1000, which was sent to State Chairman Calk. This money, however, has strings on it, and that is the gathering of personal data concerning voters. The national committee wants the name of every registered voter, his religion, whether he is a soldier, and if so, whether a Philippine veteran or a G. A. R., what party he is affiliated with, he is a "sure" republican or democrat, or whether he is doubtful. The nationality of the voter is also wanted and whether he is a first voter. The national committee expects to gather all of this information concerning each registered elector for less than a cent each.

Young Men's Institute.

Louisville, Ky., Sept. 21.—Louisville will this week entertain the Supreme Council of the Young Men's Institute, and preparations have been made to render the session the most enjoyable and interesting in the society's history. All sections of the country have sent delegates to the national meeting.

Oppose Prohibition.

East St. Louis, Ill., Sept. 21.—Methods of turning back the prohibition wave, which has swept over a large part of the state in the last few years, will occupy the convention opened today by the Illinois Liquor Dealers' Protective association.

WAREHOUSE PLAN WINS HIGH PRAISE

WOOLGROWERS' PLAN PROVES BIG WINNER.

Textile American Declares Plan Is Great Money Saver—Demonstrates That Union of Forces Results in Better Profits to Producer—Sales Plan Not Yet Completed—Australian Method Highly Successful at Antipodes.

Commenting on the work of the Wyoming and National Woolgrowers' associations in their work of establishing a national storage warehouse, the Textile American, a Boston journal devoted to the wool and cotton industry of the United States, says:

"If there remain any woolgrowers who consider the time-honored methods of disposing of their clips the best for their interests the experiences of those who dared the novelty of storage warehouses and central market should be sufficient to convince them that the recent and newer method is the best for all concerned. The results from the Omaha warehouses have passed beyond the realm of experiment, and in all probability there will be little or no individual dealing in the sections served by this enterprise."

"The principles of the trust when adapted to the needs of the small merchant become but the practical methods of good business, and in this case the establishment of wool warehouses at Omaha, which served the interests of the woolgrowers of Utah, Montana, Wyoming and Nebraska, has shown that when the industry unites 'all for one, and one for all,' better methods obtain. It was the experience of those interested in this enterprise that on the opening of the wool market prices advanced above those quoted at the ranches, and buyers became more interested. At the same time those growers who had dared this innovation found it was more to their advantage to sell from their own center, through their own broker, than to ship to eastern agents, for the selling being more of a co-operative action, the tolls of a middleman were eliminated or reduced, so that the grower received more for his clip than would have been the case had he depended on either his own efforts to effect a bargain at his ranch or consigned it to a distant agent."

"From these experiences other woolgrowers have become convinced that their interests are the interests of the others and they are recognizing the practical worth of the new enterprise. The experiment has demonstrated that by uniting in their efforts they can maintain prices and not be obliged to sacrifice; that they can save the cost of a middleman and at the same time receive an advance on the clip before disposing of it. So satisfactory has been this experiment that it is predicted that before another season three-fourths of the clip will be sold through the medium of the central warehouse."

"There yet remains a step to be made in deciding on the method of sale. The arguments in favor of regular auction sales have been presented, and the experiences of the Australian woolgrowers seem to favor the method."

"Australian growers having decided that it was better to market their wool at a point nearest the seat of production, settled on Melbourne as the site for their warehouses, and a thoroughly equipped establishment has been developed and there come the buyers from all over the world to get their purchases at auction, which has become the established method of sale. A regular industry, that of wool-selling, has been developed and perfected, the grower having nothing to do with the transaction."

"While the circumstances of the Australian and the American wool-grower may differ in some respects, and the market of the one be worldwide, while that of the other is domestic, the trade has so many points in common that the adoption of some of the methods of the Australian trade may be safely tried by the American."

THEY WANT PURE BEER OR NONE WHATEVER

Albany, N. Y., Sept. 21.—That uniform standards of purity be required of all members is the demand of many influential brewers from all over the country who are in Albany today in attendance at the opening session of the United States Brewmasters' convention. It is alleged that the cheap and adulterated varieties of beer hurt the business of the honest and competent brewer and serve as an argument for the prohibitionists.

That adulterations are largely used in cheap beers is admitted by the more candid brewers. A recent report of the state commissioner of health of New York shows that of 219 samples examined, salicylic acid or fluorides were found in 13, while sulphites were discovered in a greater number of samples.

Brewers state that such impurities are to be found in only the cheaper grades of draught beer made by irresponsible concerns, and that brewers who take pride in their product and reputation never sacrifice quality to cheapness.

The national convention of brewmasters has established headquarters at German hall. Nearly 700 brewers are in attendance and many have brought their wives and families. A concert will be held this evening, when Mayor Gaus will welcome the visitors. The business sessions will be held principally in the forenoon and amusements and excursions will occupy the afternoons and evenings. The convention will conclude Wednesday.

PASSENGER AGENTS WILL BOOST FOR NORTHWEST

Portland, Sept. 21.—No event has taken place in the last year that will be more beneficial to the Pacific northwest than the visit of the delegates in attendance upon the national convention of the American Association of Traveling Passenger Agents. These men have traveled through Washington, spent three days thoroughly investigating Seattle where they held their convention, visiting interesting points on the sound; then they came to Portland where they spent a day before making the Columbia river trip. Here they disbanded, going to many points in Oregon, Washington and down through California. The traveling passenger agents meet thousands of people every year, and influence a vast amount of travel.
