TEAM WORK WINS FOR OREGON STATE

Cooperation among the Oregon boosters was the theme of Tom Richardson's address for the State fair program last week and in the course of his talk the Portland booster put forth some excellent thoughts on the "long pull, the strong pull, the pull altogether."

The address lays stress on the importance of boosting for the entire state as well as for our individual communities and contains many sentiments that may be studied with profit by all interested in the fullest development of the great resources of the state.

Tom Richardson's Talk.

Oregon is prosperous. The cities and towns of the state are building better business houses, good streets, and almost innumerable homes, when one would judge, from newspaper reports at least, that there was a partial cessation of such activities in many sections of the United States.

Factories are locating in all parts of the state and transportation facilities, both by rail and water, are upon the increase, while every part of Oregon is adding to its population and increasing its cultivated acres.

This result has been brought about by as fine an example of "team work" as any in the union has ever witnessed. The newspapers, the commercial bodies, and the different associations which have for their purpose the advances of the fruit and dairy interests, the improvement of the highways, and all organizations which mean the betterment of the state, are doing effective "team work" for the common development of all.

The active workers of the Rogue river valley have only good to say about the other parts of the state. This is true of the energetic citizenship of the Willamette and Umpqua valleys, and all of eastern Oregon actually rejoices at the prosperity of the western part of the state.

Praise for Portland in the newspapers of the entire commonwealth has taken the place of the sneers and censure of a few years ago, and all Oregon is a chorus for advancement and prosperity.

Team Work Counts.

One of the best known railroad officials of the country recently made a trip through Oregon, and while he admired the resources and attractions of the state almost beyond expression, he centered his comment upon the harmony, unity, and to borrow his own words, "the splendid team work" of the Oregonians.

At a meeting held in Willamette valley only a few years ago, the easiest way for a speaker to get applause was to make a caustic remark relative to Portland. But that is a thing of the past, for it seems to be universally understood today that the reputation of any individual community within the bounds of Oregon has either a beneficial or prejudicial effect upon the state as a whole.

As an entirety, the people of Oregon are not given to boasting of the state's attractions, but they have laid aside the pessimism that ruled before the successful Lewis and Clark expedition, and take greater pleasure in saying kindly things than was true in former years.

The advertising campaign being carried on today by the Oregon communities is easily the most comprehensive of any state west of the Missouri river, and as that great area includes some of the most progressive commonwealths in the United States, this statement is a strong one—but absolutely true.

The active business organizations of the different communities are aggressively selfish, but it is becoming the custom whenever they fail to locate a given industry or enterprise to try to find some other advantageous location for that project within the confines of the state. Kindly expressions about many portions of Oregon are to be found in the papers of every part, and this is "team work" of the very highest class.

Central Oregon Railroad.

The people of this whole state have rejoiced over what they have accepted as an assurance of a railroad line into central Oregon with just as whole-hearted an enthusiasm as though it meant an additional transportation strength to the immediate locality in which they reside.

The Salem man will tell you with pride of the forward march of sister towns, and is delighted to tell about other communities building hard-surface pavement in harmony with the street improvements of the capital city. And this spirit is indicative of the sentiment prevailing all over the "Beaver state."

Portland business men have visited every section of Oregon and the business men of other communities have made it both their pleasure and duty to become better acquainted with their surrounding towns.

The pessimist can always find a cast number of things to object to. Finding fault has always been and always will be a human weakness, but honestly, I believe there is as little of it today in Oregon as in any other community under the sun.

No one man is deserving of any special praise in what has been accomplished in this state, nor is any one community to be credited with the progress made in all Oregon, but it is due to systematic "team work" in which every man, woman and school child have anticipated.

State Widely Advertised.

As a consequence every part of Oregon has become better known than ever before and thousands of people have come here to make their homes, and while the shadows are darkening around some other sections of our great country, Oregon is prosperous. This is true of the west, the east, the south, and the north, and is soon to be even more forcefully true of the great core of the state, which has

long been without much-needed transportation.

If a man earnestly favors the deepening of the Coos Bay he doesn't waste time and find enemies by objecting to the improvement of the Columbia river. It doesn't further the improvement of the Willamette to make an objection to the expenditure of funds on the upper Columbia. An appropriation for a public building at La Grande doesn't hinder one at Baker City, and no people believe in this doctrine more thoroughly than do Oregonians.

The divided community is not prosperous. A small clique cannot make a great city. It takes "team work" to win—all must pull together. The fruit grower of the state long since rejected the plan of "going it alone and the devil take the hindmost," and is pulling with his fellows in associations which illustrate the highest perfection in "team work" to be witnessed in America, and as a result the Oregon apple brings the highest price of any produced in the world.

"No man can pack his own apples," is the superlative of good old common horse sense, and it is the character of "team work" that counts. The fact that the Oregon Cornice pear has reached the climax of American high priced fruits is a result of the same kind of cooperative organization.

Team Work in Dairies.

"Team work" among the creameries of Oregon—some might think the word "trust" applicable here—has gained for the Oregon dairy producer a higher price for his butter fat than is paid anywhere else, and this price is within a cent and a half a pound of what the best creamer butter commands at wholesale. The consumer pays a good round price, but he seems to be willing.

I am common to go away from home to hear the news, and there is no saying in the world truer than that "Distance lends enchantment to the view," but let's look at home and we find much to compliment.

At the Alaska-Yukon-Pacific exposition to be given next year at Seattle, Oregon leads; in the perfection of organization of her business strength as a whole, she leads; more of her communities are working like one man than is true in any other state. In fact, Oregon exceeds them all in splendid "team work," and it is a pleasure to say that the harness which binds this great team together embraces almost every man, woman and child in the state.

EATS BONE, PROVES CASE.

Man Accused of Poisoning Dog Swallows Moldy Refuse.

Newburyport, Mass., Sept. 19.—To prove to the court that a bone which he was alleged to have thrown to a dog did not contain poison, G. W. Spears of Rowley calmly cut off green portions from the bone and ate them before the court official could interfere.

The bone had been exposed to the sun and flies for over a week, and was in a decayed condition. The court, still skeptical, ordered an examination by a chemist, while a recess was taken. The report sent back was as follows:

"The green matter is caused by mold and the white spots were caused by the application of arsenic."

Spears ate none but the green portions. The chemist's examination was superficial and Mr. Spears was held in bonds while an examination is being made by the state chemists at Boston. His case will be heard again next Monday with the chemist's full report. He was taken to jail in the mean time.

EVELYN WANTS JOB.

Famous Fatal Beauty Seeks Notoriety in Theatrical Ranks.

Evelyn Nesbit Thaw quietly came into Boston yesterday in her automobile from Portland, Me., and today spent much of her time at the Globe theater with Joe Welch, of the "Morning, Noon and Night" company, and his manager, E. V. Vion, says a Boston dispatch.

Mrs. Thaw's brother, Howard Nesbit, is playing with the company, and tonight he said Mrs. Thaw had come here to secure a theatrical engagement and that it was likely that she would go out with the company when it leaves Boston in two weeks. Mrs. Thaw refused to discuss the report, but Mr. Welch admitted that they had talked the affair over.

"From what Mrs. Thaw tells me," he said, "she is 'broke' and has to go to work. I'd be glad to have her with us, if we can settle on terms."

KEEP TRAMPS BUSY IN MEDFORD OFFICIAL'S SCHEME.

The wood pile has taken the place of the rock pile at Medford, says a dispatch from that city, and from now on all those who are compelled to work out the amount of their fines will do so with a bucksaw and put in a good 10 hours a day. The city officials have put in a lot of cordwood which was brought from the supply at the city water plant, and have it on tap in close vicinity to the city lock-up.

The police got tired of serving meals to prisoners who had nothing else to do but kill time while waiting for the time when they would be free men once more. Now they just lock them in the old jail building with a nice pile of wood and tell them to "do nothing but saw wood." From the way business has been improving in the recorder's court it would appear that the stock of wood will not last many months.
