GRAND JURY HAS FOUR INDICTMENTS

NO RETURNS YET IN LIQUOR SELLING CASES.

True Bills Brought Against A. C. Pierce, George Grant and J. V. Lethridge—Sad Cases From Echo Is Difficult Because of Father's Obstinacy—Walter Lehman Faces Serious Charge.

This afternoon the grand jury returned four indictments, but they were mostly against parties already in jail and do not involve local option cases.

Against A. C. Pierce, former section foreman at Umatilla, who is charged with padding his payroll, two indictments were returned. An indictment was also returned against John V. Lethridge, who is charged with forgery. Lethridge is the man who bamboozed a number of local business houses by passing checks signed with the name of Rutherford, for whom he had worked in the harvest fields near Helix.

The fourth indictment is against George Grant, charged with robbing a store at Athena.

Of the men indicted Grant and Lethridge are in jail, while Pierce is out on bail.

Though it is known that whiskey selling cases have been under investigation by the grand jury no returns have yet been made.

A Sad Case.

An unusual case at the court house today, though it is not yet before the grand jury, is from Echo. Walter Lehman, a young man of that place, was arrested yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Joe Blakeley on a statutory crime. The complaint was sworn to by L. B. Wells, father of Ethel Wells, the latter and Lehman being sweethearts.

Both parents of the young girl, the girl herself and the elder Lehman are here today and every effort has been made to settle the difficulty outside the courts. But up to this time the girl's father has remained obdurate, and if he continues so young Lehman will face a penitentiary charge.

INSPECTION FOR CO. L.

Pendleton Guardsmen Ordered Out for Muster September 29.

Colonel C. E. McDonnell, commander of the third infantry, O. N. G., has issued orders that all the companies of his command assemble for inspection and muster during the first week of September. Accordingly Captain Dan P. Smythe has ordered an inspection for company L on Tuesday, September 29.

At the date all members of the company will assemble at the armory at 7:45. The blue uniform will be worn. The inspection will probably be by the company officers and at the conclusion of the same a dance will be given.

The coming inspection will be the first time company L has been out since its return from American Lake. Since the return the regular weekly drills have been omitted in compliance with regimental orders.

FRATERNAL BROTHERHOOD.

Two Big Initiatory Meetings Scheduled for This Week—Organizer Here.

The members of the Fraternal Brotherhood are not planning for a big time this week. J. E. Taylor, state manager for the order, has been here since Sunday and will remain during the week. Two big initiatory meetings will be held while he is here, a class of 15 will be taken in Wednesday evening at a meeting held at Odd Fellows hall and Saturday night a meeting will be held in secret society hall, at which a still larger number of candidates are expected.

When Mr. Taylor leaves the city the Pendleton lodge will be left in charge of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Mahoney, the former being deputy supreme president of the order.

CHARGED WITH STEALING WM. MULLIN ARRESTED

William Mullin of this city, was arrested at The Dalles yesterday by W. R. (Jenks) Taylor, brother of Sheriff T. D. Taylor. The charge against Mullin was made by Fletcher, the cattle dealer, for whom Mullin was working. He says that the gave his employee money with which to purchase cattle and that Mullin then started to leave the country. Learning that he had gone westward the sheriff's office notified W. R. Taylor, who was coming up from Portland and he caught his man in The Dalles. Mullin has been about Pendleton for some time and is a cripple.

Wheat Market Quiet.

Though the wheat market is apparently strong, very little grain has changed hands for several days. There seems to be no hurry on the part of the farmers to dispose of their holdings, neither do the buyers seem to be anxious to purchase. It is probable therefore, that as long as the present conditions continue that there will be little or nothing doing.

MEN ARE WASHED OVERBOARD IN STORM.

Seattle, Sept. 22.—Bringing news of the loss of the lives of two men during a stormy passage to Chignik last spring the American ship St. Paul reached here today. The men were washed overboard.

IRRIGATORS WILL SOON KNOW COST OF WATER.

Klamath Falls, Ore., Sept. 22.—The cost of the water under the Klamath project is now being determined upon by a board of reclamation engineers in session in this city and it will be made public in a short time.

The cost of irrigation per acre will not be uniform over the territory embraced in the project, but will vary according to the ease with which water is put upon the lands, it being more difficult in some sections.

Payments by land owners will begin next spring, but the cost of only the lands under the first unit of the canal will be declared at this time. This embraces the country between this city and Merrill. As the work of construction proceeds the cost of other units will be declared and regular payments commenced.

The board of engineers will submit their recommended cost to the secretary of the interior and if approved it will then be made public.

GIRL HORRIBLY MURDERED IN SECLUDED LOCATION

Bedford, Ind., Sept. 22.—Near the spot where the body of Miss Schaefer the young school teacher, was found three years ago, the body of a beautiful young girl, undoubtedly murdered in the same way as Miss Schaefer, was discovered today. The murdered girl's face is flattened by a heavy blow, the same being done in the Schaefer case. It is thought that one man is guilty of both crimes.

NINE CENTS PER DAY PAYS THIS MAN'S BOARD.

New York, Sept. 22.—M. M. Wood, an advocate of fresh air and a firm believer in the simple life, who is out with a proposition to battle particularly against the great white plague claims that a man can live on nine cents a day, with the products of his own farm, and proves it by his own living, says an Oklahoma City special to the American.

"By that I mean," says Mr. Wood, "that a farmer should be able to live well with the expenditure of just three cents per meal for articles that he can not raise himself."

Mr. Wood illustrated what he meant by giving as an example the breakfast he had just eaten.

"The meal consisted of broiled bacon, Indian meal cake, blueberry pie, bread, butter, cream, preserves and a health-substitute coffee. In that entire meal there is nothing that had to be purchased but the flour for the bread and pie and sugar and the entire cost of those two articles not exceeding three cents."

"The health-coffee we had to buy, but I figured the whole thing at less than three cents. The bacon, eggs, lard, fruit, cream and berries every farmer should raise. With a little study of the relative value of different articles of food I am confident that people could live much cheaper than they do. I have seen more meat on a man's table at night, when no meat should be eaten, than we would use in a week."

"A workingman will say that he has to have it because he must work and needs meat for its food value. He talks that way because he has never studied and found out just what the value of meat as food really is."
