FINE LIVESTOCK AT DISTRICT FAIR

WESTERN OREGON BREEDERS COMING, SAYS DR. MCCLURE

"If There Are Any Mossbacks in Oregon They Are in Eastern Oregon—State Fair Beat Anything West of Mississippi—Races Better Than Anything in the United States This Year—Mile of Livestock.

That at least three of the big stock exhibitors at the state fair will come here for the district fair next week is stated by Dr. S. W. McClure, of the bureau of animal industry, who has just returned from Salem.

Those who are now arranging to exhibit at the Umatilla county fair are W. O. Minor of Heppner, Hawley & Son of McCoy, and Schmidt Bros. of Oregon City. Mr. Minor will again bring his herd of fine Shorthorns; Hawley & Son will bring an exhibit of Lincoln rams, while Schmidt Bros. will have an exhibit of Cotswold and Shropshire sheep.

The coming of these outside men assures that the livestock exhibit at the fair will be creditable. In the past Mr. Minor has been about the only big breeder to participate in the fair.

YOUTHFUL WITNESSES CAUGHT BY "KANGAROO" COURT.

While waiting at the court house yesterday to go before the grand jury as witnesses, three young men had some court experience of their own. It was in the "kangaroo" court of the county jail and they were found "guilty."

Click Humphrey, Forrest Baker and young Edmiston were the three defendants. Loitering about the temple of justice all afternoon they became bored and asked the deputies in the sheriff's office to allow them inside the jail. They were allowed to enter and were forthwith "cooperated" by the judge of the mock court.

Two of the boys, Baker and Edmiston, were let off with a fine of 50 cents each and five "cobs" from a broomstick. Humphrey, being larger, was given 10 strokes in addition to the financial penalty.

BUILDING ASSOCIATION TO BE FORMED AT ECHO.

That the demand for dwelling houses at Echo is so great that a building and loan association is to be formed for the purpose of erecting new houses is declared by E. H. Brown, editor of the Echo Register, who has been here today.

According to Mr. Brown, a joint stock company, composed of the principal business men of the place, will be formed at once. Ten or 15 houses are now needed and the work of erecting them will be taken up as soon as the company is formed.

The schools at Echo are crowded this year, according to Mr. Brown, and he says that more people would have moved into town for the winter had there been more houses available.

SHEEP QUARANTINE OFF IN FOUR MIDDLE STATES.

Orders stating that the states of Kansas, Nebraska and parts of North Dakota and South Dakota have been freed from the federal sheep quarantine have been received at the bureau of animal industry office. The quarantine is raised for all of the first two states; for that part of North Dakota lying north and east of the Missouri river, and for that portion of South Dakota lying west of the Missouri. The order was issued September 2.

Aside from the above named states the federal quarantine has also been raised in Idaho and Wyoming. It is still in effect, in varying degrees, in all the other western states.

MRS. DUFF PASSES FROM THIS LIFE

PIONEER LADY CALLED TO REWARD LAST NIGHT

Resided at Home of Her Son William Duff When End Came—Had Lived in Umatilla County for Almost Thirty Years—Deceased Came to Oregon in 1877—Is Survived by Two Children, Both Living Here.

Mrs. Jennette A. Duff, aged 82 years, 3 months and 22 days, died this morning about 8 o'clock, at the home of her son, William Duff, six miles northeast of Pendleton. Death was due to a complication of troubles, incident to old age.

Mrs. Duff was born in North Carolina, but came with her husband to the Willamette valley in 1877. Two years later they moved to eastern Oregon, where they established their home. The husband, David Duff, died six years ago at the age of 83 years.

The deceased is survived by two children, William Duff, who resides on his farm, and Mrs. Grant Elgin of this city.

Funeral services will be conducted at the home of William Duff tomorrow at 10 o'clock by Rev. W. L. Van Noy, pastor of the Presbyterian church, while interment will be in Olney cemetery.

Funeral of Mrs. Bean.

Funeral services for the late Mrs. J. E. Bean were conducted this morning at the Church of the Redeemer, by the pastor, Rev. Charles Quinney. Many friends were in attendance and accompanied the remains to Olney cemetery, where they were interred.

The meeting of the Thursday afternoon club, which was to have been held at the home of the president, Mrs. C. J. Smith, on September 24, has been postponed until October 8, in respect to the memory of Mrs. J. E. Bean.

No member has been more closely identified with the history and success of the club than Mrs. Bean. Her interest and enthusiasm have never waned, though she has often prepared notes while unable to be out of bed.

Gifted with a brilliant mind, an appreciation of the highest and best in literature and art, together with a keen sense of the rejuvenating effect of humor, the club loses in Mrs. Bean not only a beloved friend, but a most efficient worker. With deep sympathy for the family, the Thursday afternoon club mourns a vacancy that can not be replaced, yet with a realization that the lost member has gained "that peace which the world can not give."

CELEBRATE THEIR GOLDEN WEDDING

PENDLETON PIONEERS PASS JUBILEE MARK

W. S. Byers and Wife Have Lived Together Fifty Years—Each Has Passed Three Score Years and Ten—Mr. Byers Has Milled for Sixty Years and Is Still At It—Worked Sixteen Hours Each Day for Forty Years and Hasn't Worn Out Yet.

Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Byers, among the oldest pioneers of this city, celebrated their golden wedding anniversary yesterday. Mr. Byers is 75, while the woman who became his life partner 50 years ago, is 72. Both are hale and hearty, however, and neither look to be that old.

"You must have taken good care of yourself to be so well preserved at this age," said a reporter to the pioneer flour mill man this morning.

"Well, I have been in the milling business for 60 years and have worked hard all my life. For about 40 years of that time I worked 18 hours a day," was the reply.

It would therefore seem that when Mr. Byers finally does quit it will be because he has worn out and not rusted out.

Mr. Byers first entered the flour mill business 60 years ago in the state of Pennsylvania. He later came to Walla Walla where he established a mill and conducted it for six years before coming to Pendleton, where he has been for the past 33 years.

The first mill erected here had a capacity of 50 barrels per day. He kept adding to this each year until a few years ago when the mills burned down they had a capacity of 500 barrels every 24 hours. The brick mills are capable of turning out 800 barrels every 24 hours. The present mill is not the largest in the state, but it is one of the finest built and arranged and turns out about as much flour as the larger mills in Portland for the reason that the plant is kept busy night and day the year round.

When Byers completed the work of erecting his first little mill in Pendleton he looked around and counted just 50 buildings in the city. That included dwelling houses, barns and every other structure worthy the name of building. It will thus be seen that the lives of Mr. and Mrs. Byers have been closely associated with the life and growth of the city of Pendleton.

This pioneer couple only have two children living. They are Mrs. Sophia McComas and Gus Byers, both of this city.

A pleasing feature of the flouring mill business as conducted by Mr. Byers is the fact that he has no commission house to handle his flour, employs no traveling salesmen and yet has orders on hand in excess of the output of his mill at all times. A large part of his flour is shipped to the orient, but owing to the low stage of the river the mill cannot be operated at full capacity now and the entire output of the plant is needed to supply the local, Portland, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle markets.

A very pretty wedding occurred here at 10 o'clock this forenoon when Miss Adeline Schiffler, daughter of E. A. Schiffler, was united in marriage with Edward H. McCune of Albany, Ore.

The ceremony occurred at the Schiffler home on Madison street and Rev. W. L. Van Noy, pastor of the Presbyterian church, was the officiating minister. The rooms of the house were tastefully decorated for the occasion and both bride and groom looked well in their wedding costumes. Only a few friends and the immediate relatives of the bride were present.

The groom is a young business man of Albany and is in the ladies' furnishing goods business. The bride has made her home in this city for some time and has many friends who wish her happiness.

Following the marriage ceremony a wedding breakfast was served at the Schiffler home and at 12:30 the newly married couple left for Albany.
