ALFALFA MEAL IS USED AS LAMB CHOP MAKER

"Alfalfa meal," the coming fodder of the northwest, has its champion in J. E. Murphy, who has a mill grinding 30 tons of it every day at Echo, Umatilla county. Mr. Murphy is in Portland securing a plant for North Yakima, so as to extend the benefits of the fattening material to that part of eastern Washington, says the Telegram.

"Alfalfa meal," Mr. Murphy explains, "is simply alfalfa leaves and stems ground to a pulp the consistency of bran, in a mill constructed for that purpose. This mill consists of a series of wire screens through which the alfalfa is forced until it acquires the requisite fineness. The meal is eagerly devoured by the sheep, cattle and hogs, and it proceeds to lay on layers of fat without loss of time."

In the milk and butter business alfalfa meal particularly shines, he says, and its richness is apparent immediately in the improvement of the milk and in the amount of butter fat found in the cream. It is thus superior to bran, which is now worth \$27 a ton, while the alfalfa meal can be furnished for \$20 at a good profit.

Water power, he says, is essential in conducting the manufacture of alfalfa meal, as steam power is too dear. Wherever there is a creek of water going to waste, however, water power in sufficient quantity can be utilized.

"We can beat the corn-growing states all to pieces in fattening stock for the butcher," Mr. Murphy says, "as our alfalfa can be produced in abundance wherever irrigation is in progress, and as three crops of alfalfa a year can be produced in Oregon our capabilities for fattening stock in Oregon are unlimited."

He looks for a number of alfalfa meal mills to be started in this section in the immediate future. He has now a number of toothless old ewes being fattened at his mill in Echo, just to show what can be done with his new meal.

"I have taken pains to secure the toughest kind of material to try to fatten for market," he explains, "to show that good merchantable lamb chops can be produced from the ribs of very old sheep, and anyone doubting the value of 'alfalfa meal' can call at my yards in Echo and be convinced."

WALLA WALLA LABOR TO HAVE OWN NEWSPAPER

"The Garden City Monitor," is the name of a new publication to be established through the Trades and Labor council of Walla Walla next month, the publication to be issued by Jesse Ferney, providing the laboring men of the city pledge enough subscriptions to make the venture a success.

A committee which was recently appointed, together with delegates to the Trades and Labor council, are working on the pledges for subscriptions, and as soon as 500 cash subscribers have been received, the first edition will be launched. It is probable that the first number will be issued about October 10, after which it will appear every week.

It is the intention of Mr. Ferney to make the paper at the start a four page, seven column publication, covering all the news of the labor world. It will be the official organ of the Trades and Labor council, and it is believed that a subscription list of fully 2000 can be secured.

For a number of years the labor bodies of the city have felt the need of a paper in Walla Walla, and now that Mr. Ferney has consented to establish one in return for a sufficient number of cash subscribers, members of the various labor bodies have taken up the work of securing the subscriptions.

The Monitor will be a non-partisan sheet and will keep clear of any affiliation, except in cases where the election or defeat of certain candidates is desired by the labor interests.
