

CATHOLIC ATHLETES IN PAPAL JUBILEE

With the whole college of cardinals, thousands of archbishops, bishops and clergy and representatives of all the important governments of the world filling the stands in the Vatican gardens, the Papal Jubilee international athletic competitions were formally opened today by His Holiness, Pope Pius X, says a dispatch from Rome.

Thousands of athletes of all nations marched before the assembled priests and princes of the church, the spectacle forming an unique combination of ecclesiastical splendor and gladiatorial prowess.

The opening of today's tournament marks the first time in the history of the Roman Catholic church that athletic sports have formed a great feature of the golden jubilee of a pontiff's ordination to the priesthood. Pius X, who has been a priest for a half century, has always been an admirer of athletics and physical training, and the present carnival was decided upon as a result of his frequently expressed desire to see some of the world's greatest athletes in action.

Every Catholic nation on the earth is represented among the thousands of athletes assembled in the Vatican gardens today. As was to be expected, Italians largely predominate, with Ireland second in point of entries. France, Spain, Germany, Switzerland, Belgium, Holland, England and Australia have considerable delegations, and the United States and Canada have sent some of their foremost Catholic athletes.

Owing to the fact that there can be no cooperation between the civil and clerical authorities of Rome, the carnival will lack some of the features of the recent Olympic games in London. Considering the number of nations represented, however, the results of the competitions cannot fail of assuming world-wide importance. Medals will be given by the pope to all winners, and they will be accorded special honors by His Holiness.

The sports commenced in the Vatican gardens today are the first athletic competitions to disturb their quietness since the destruction of the Caligula circus in the declining days of the Roman empire. The gardens include more than 100 acres and occupy, with the Vatican and St. Peter's cathedral, one of the seven hills of Rome.

The field itself is quite level and required no great lot of work to put it in shape for the games. A quarter-mile track has been installed and stands have been erected to accommodate probably the most distinguished throng of spectators that ever witnessed an athletic tournament.

In connection with the preparations for this international competition Pope Pius X settled another vexed question, proving once again that great personages of an entourage are usually more royalist than the king. Since the fall of Rome the Italian flag has been tabooed in the Vatican. When the athletic games were being organized it was decided that each association should be headed by its flag and march past the pontiff. It was then found that many Italian club flags were merely the national colors with some special distinctive design, and that these associations absolutely refused to take part without their flags. They were so numerous and strong that their defection would have meant the failure of the games. In this quandary Monsignor Bissett, the pope's major-domo, was approached, and he replied emphatically: "I will never permit the Italian flag in the Vatican." Then some bold spirits thought they would appeal directly to Pius X, who at once said: "I wonder at such a question being raised. Of course, they will come with their colors."

It was suggested that they might be furlled to make them less conspicuous. "Not at all," exclaimed Pius X. "I want them to have them and hold their colors high and proud before the other nations. Are we ashamed of being Italians?"

The pope is much gratified at the

American participation in the games. The trophy sent by the United States, through the Rev. Francis J. Sullivan, president of the Catholic Athletic League of New York, is exposed in the apartments of Secretary Merry del Val. The trophy is a solid silver cup, two feet high, having in front the American and Papal flags, with the inscription: "The American Trophy from the Catholic Boys of New York to Cardinal Merry del Val, to be contested for by the Boys of Rome." All around are represented figures taking part in American sports, and on top is the American eagle.

ARMY EXILE NOW IS RANKING ARTILLERY OFFICER

Washington, Sept. 23.—Orders were issued at the war department yesterday directing Colonel William F. Stewart, now at Fort Grant, Ariz., to report at Washington to go before a retiring board.

New York, Sept. 23.—Officers here of the Coast Artillery corps have found out, they say, that Colonel William F. Stewart, the army officer who has been kept at a desolate post in the southwest, is at present essentially the ranking colonel of their branch of the service, and that unless the retiring board before which Colonel Stewart is probably soon to be sent, backs up the recent opinion of the medical officers who forbade Colonel Stewart to take the horsemanship test a few days ago, Colonel Stewart will in fact become the senior colonel of the Coast Artillery on December 3 next.

This is the date of the retirement for age of Colonel George Greenough, the present ranking colonel of the Coast Artillery. As Colonel Greenough has already obtained a leave of absence, with a view to his approaching retirement, Colonel Stewart is therefore practically senior colonel of the coast forces, even though his desert command is far removed from the sea.

Colonel Greenough had been detailed to serve on the Cornman court martial soon to convene at Fort Wayne, Detroit, for the purpose of hearing the charges against Colonel Cornman, but he has also been excused from that duty and his active connection with the army may therefore be said to have been ended.

But Colonel Stewart has been reported upon by the army surgeons as suffering from cardiac hypertrophy and mitral insufficiency.

BLUE SUNDAY PROGRAM OF PORTLAND AUTHORITIES

Portland, Sept. 23.—Determined that Sunday closing, not only of saloons, but of all lines of business not excepted by statute, shall henceforth prevail in Portland, District Attorney George J. Cameron has addressed a communication to Chief of Police Fritzmaier, calling upon the latter official to enforce strictly the provisions of section 1865 of Oregon's Code.

As a result of the peremptory command of the prosecuting officer of the Fourth judicial district issued orders yesterday to Captains of Police instructing them to have the patrolmen of the various reliefs notify all persons interested to comply with the law beginning next Sunday, September 27.

As the statute only exempts theaters, drugstores, doctors, undertakers, stables, butchers and bakers, every place of business, including cigar stores, billiard parlors, bowling alleys, confectionery and fruit stores, and all amusement enterprises not coming under the head of theaters, will hereafter remain closed on the Sabbath.

STUDENTS ARE IN LINE THROUGH WHOLE NIGHT

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 23.—After 100 ambitious students had stood in line all night more than 600 boys and girls today besieged the polytechnic high school with applications for en-

trance. But 225 vacancies in the lower classes existed and more than half of the applicants were doomed to disappointment.

At 3 o'clock yesterday afternoon "sooners" began to assemble in front of the high school. Seeing there was going to be a line of applicants waiting at the doors all night, Principal J. R. Francis stretched ropes to prevent disputes as to place and upper class students acted as patrols.

Miss Julia Auble, daughter of the late Police Captain Auble, who was shot by Carl Sutherland, was among the successful applicants who took places in the line early last night.

The unsuccessful applicants have the alternative of waiting until next year to enter the polytechnic school or entering Los Angeles high school, where they will not have the advantage of technical courses.

WEATHER WAS COOL OVER ENTIRE STATE

Portland, Sept. 23.—During the past week the night temperatures west of the Cascade mountains averaged considerably below the normal, while the afternoon temperatures were slightly below the seasonal average. In the eastern portion of the state the nights were warm and the days cool, due to the cloudy weather. Wednesday and Thursday were cool throughout the state, and light frost occurred on those mornings in sections of the upper Willamette and Umpqua valleys. Light rain was general over the state on Tuesday and good showers fell in the eastern portion on Wednesday, Thursday and Friday, and west of the Cascade mountains on Saturday. The rain was well distributed, no heavy showers being reported from any locality. The sunshine was about normal in the western portion of the state, but there was much cloudiness in the eastern counties till Saturday. No damaging high winds occurred.

In Eastern Oregon, Umatilla, Umatilla county, Helen T. Duncan.—The weather was cool the first of the week. Very light sprinkles of rain fell during the middle of the week, and the closing days were fair and warmer.

Hermiston, Umatilla county, C. W. Kellogg.—Cool and cloudy weather prevailed most of the week, with traces of rain on the 14th and 15th.

Pendleton, Umatilla county, H. F. Johnson.—Cloudiness prevailed on all days of the week except two. The weather was threatening, but only .07 inch of rain fell. Mild thunder and lightning occurred on two nights.

Hood River, Hood River county, H. L. Hashbrouck.—The temperature was normal throughout the week. Cloudy skies prevailed every day. The winds were westerly. No precipitation occurred during the week.

The Dalles, Wasco county, S. L. Brooks.—Normal temperatures prevailed during the week just closed. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday were cloudy and threatening, with a few sprinkles of rain. Very light winds blew from the north and west in the afternoons.

Wasco, Sherman county, J. R. Howell.—The fore part of the week was cloudy, with a very little rain. The latter part was clear and pleasant.

Mikkalo, Gilliam county, J. T. Chandler.—The week was cool and cloudy, with light rains during the fore part and a thunderstorm on Monday. An aurora occurred Friday night, sending streamers up to the zenith. It would have been magnificent had it not been for the bright moonlight. Westerly winds prevailed.

Condon, Gilliam county, S. C. Dodson.—Light showers fell during the week and the temperatures averaged cool. The winds were west and southwest.

She leaped at him and they rolled over the floor of the cage, clawing and snarling. The clamor aroused the other animals, and the roar of the lions and tigers was soon shaking the building.

George Engleholm, one of the keepers, procured an iron spike and tried to pry the animals apart. His efforts were of no avail, and he was joined by three other keepers, similarly armed but the combined force was futile.
