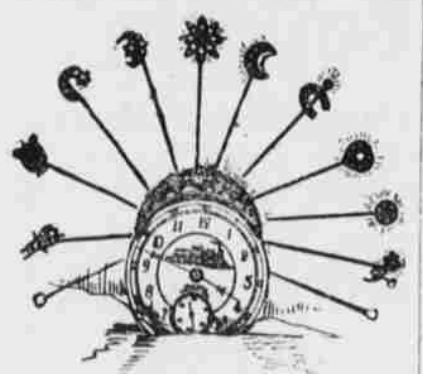

### FARMERS' NATIONAL CONGRESS HOLDS OPENING SESSION

Madison, Wis., Sept. 24.—All of the diversified agricultural interests of the nation find representation in the great assemblage of delegates gathered here today at the twenty-eighth annual Farmers' National congress. Truck growers in the east, wheat and corn farmers of the central west, cotton and tobacco planters of the south and irrigation farmers of the far west are here for what promises to be one of the most important and profitable experience meetings ever held by American farmers.

Among the speakers on the program are Representative Randall, president of the National Rivers and Harbors congress; Chief Forester Pinchot of Washington; President Harvey Jordan of the Farmers' union, and William J. Bryan, who has been invited to address the congress on the subject of the farmer and his relations to public affairs. Governors of several states have also been invited to speak.

One of the country's strongest agricultural colleges is located at Madison, and the delegates will have an opportunity to inspect thoroughly its workings, as well as to meet and hear many men who have been important factors in the position which American agriculture holds today.

### "AFFINITIES" DON'T PAY, SAYS MANHATTAN JUDGE.

New York, Sept. 24.—"If you are a woman of intelligence you ought to know that this affinity business doesn't pay."

Police Magistrate Higginbotham, looking angrily from his bench at a young, pretty, foolish-looking woman, continued his scolding, says the American.

"On one side of you stands your husband, a fine specimen of manhood. On the other a weak, insignificant looking youngster. The man is your husband. The youngster is your affinity. Madam, I am surprised at you. You must hear the news if you do not read the newspapers. You know how the notorious Earle case ended. That case is the straw which shows which way every affinity case blows. It points to the inevitable end."

While Mrs. Charles Reed, who in open court in Brooklyn uttered the confession that made justice irate, that she preferred the society of her affinity, Frederick Esslinger, to that of her husband, those who heard the admission and the reprimand that followed recalled as though by a roll-call of fate these so-called affinity cases and their sequels:

Pastor Jere Cooke, poverty and ostracism.

Joseph Hoover, murder.

Mrs. Annie M. Bradley, poverty.

Clyde W. Gow, death of victim.

Mrs. Annie M. Bradley, poverty, ostracism and murder.

Frank Warren, business failure and flight from justice.

### NEW SAN FRANCISCO SETS FIRST CONVENTION.

San Francisco, Sept. 24.—San Francisco, which has been out of the running as a convention city since the earthquake, will again get into the game week after next, when the greys convene here. Committees are now busy engaged in completing plans for the entertainment of the large number of influential men who have signified their intention of attending the congress.

The Trans-Mississippi congress has become in recent years the most important organization of its kind in the country and is a well-organized and very influential body. It considers all non-political subjects which directly concern the great west or any considerable part of it.

This being a presidential year, the management has thought it wise to issue a special warning to orators to steer clear of dangerous allusions. The subjects which are covered by the official program include mining, irrigation, drainage, immigration, Pacific commerce, livestock industries and similar topics in which western America is specially concerned. All these subjects will be discussed by the Americans most capable of discussing them profitably. The congress is a great clearing-house of western opinion and experience, and its sessions promote solidarity among the western committees.

### SHIP FIRST APPLES TO EASTERN MARKETS

The first car of Grande Ronde prunes to be shipped out from La Grande by the Ramsey-Oldenburg Warehouse company is being prepared for its trip to the east, says the La Grande Observer. At the same time a car of apples, also the first of an extensive shipment from this point this fall, is being prepared for transportation by that company. The new firm has a bright prospect for the coming season, and is storing fruit for its patrons to be ready to unload on the markets when prices recuperate and the demand is better. The unsteady markets for apples this fall will delay extensive shipments from this section of the state and fruit men in general are planning on waiting for holiday demands to set the movement at a good fast clip. So immense is the apple crop in Union county this year that all shippers will be busy in handling the fruit for growers.

### Will Visit Canada.

T. C. Taylor and John Vert are contemplating an extended tour of observation through Alberta and other Canadian territory this fall, perhaps early in October. They wish to see the immense harvests that are being gathered in Alberta this season and will probably look over the country with a view of investing in raw land if they find anything suitable.
