WOULD BY PROXY BE PRESIDENT

PECULIAR SITUATION OF
SOCIALIST LABOR PARTY.

Nominee in Nevada Prison the Proxy
Campaigns in New York Slams Ap-
pealing to Most Radical Element to
Support His Candidacy—Distinct
From Socialist Organization Party
Has But Handful of Voters.

An unique figure in the present
presidential campaign is August Gil-
haus, who is seeking to go to the
White House as president by proxy
for Martin R. Preston, now serving a
25-year sentence in a Nevada jail.
Preston was nominated by the social-
ist labor party—an organization en-
tirely distinct and much more radical
in its tenets than the more important
party headed by Eugene V. Debs—but
by advice of attorneys refused the
honor. Gilhaus, a New York civil en-
gineer, was then selected as Preston's
proxy, and is now engaged in carrying
on his novel campaign.

Although the socialist labor party
has been reduced to a mere handful
in numbers, it is still sufficiently
strong to support a daily paper in
this city. The real head of the party
is Daniel De Leon, a South American
by birth and formerly a college pro-
fessor by profession. While a man of
wide scholarship and quiet in his per-
sonal demeanor, De Leon is far more
revolutionary in his doctrines than
Debs or any of the leaders of the or-
thodox socialist party.

Gilhaus, the proxy presidential nom-
inee, has for months spent his entire
time in pushing his candidacy, al-
though little is heard of him by the
public at large. He is no "Red Spec-
tator" in which to travel about the coun-
try, but does most of his campaign-
ing in the slums of great cities, where
he appeals in rough but forceful lan-
guage to the passions of the world's
disinherited. Yet, despite his radi-
calism, he is a well-read and philo-
sophical man and has in him the
spirit of a willing martyr to a cause
he deems sacred.

Twenty years ago Gilhaus was a
stationary engineer in New York City,
according to his story, working for
wages, living a hand-to-mouth exis-
tence. In his blood there is a strain
of the philosophical German that in-
clines him to revolutionary and spec-
ulative doctrines. One winter in New
York changed the course of his life.
He went to hear Henry George in a
campaign speech, fell under the influ-
ence of the great single taxer's doc-
trines and the stationary engineer be-
came a social revolutionist.

"He taught me to think," declares
Gilhaus, with quiet but impassioned
earnestness. "Before that I thought
only of my engine, after that of my
self and the reason why I lived. And
I realized that I was the slave of the
engine and the man who owned it."
When the socialist labor party was
in the throes of its birth, in the early
nineties, Gilhaus took an active part.
He stayed with the old branch when
the split came and the "socialists"
fell apart over the numerous questions
of craft and class. Since then the en-
gineer has been getting further and
further away from his engine until
now he devotes all of his time to
preaching the tenets of his party.

That he will be defeated he admits
without hesitation, but expresses an
unshakable belief that the party is
gaining strength with each cam-
paign.

"Inevitable forces will push us to
the front," he says. "I realize that
the party cannot in a year or 10 years
revolutionize the social world. We
can prepare the people, nevertheless,
for the upheaval that natural forces
will produce. Then we will be recog-
nized."

There is something almost ludic-
rous and yet impressive about a man
who talks like this and looks as Gil-
haus does—his clothes disorderly and
threadbare and his face with a two-
days' growth of beard upon it. With
a collar that apparently has not seen
the laundry for weeks, shoes broken
and patched and a dusty black slouch
hat tilted over his eyes, he talks calm-
ly of overthrowing capital and seiz-
ing gigantic industries.

Mounted on a soap box, his long,
slender figure swaying to the violence
of his gestures, he talks and draws
generous applause from the crowds of
hungry and discontented men whom
he addresses.

This, then, is the candidate for
president of the United States on the
socialist labor party ticket. A man
without a home for Gilhaus is a bac-
chelor, full of vague economic theories
and catchwords to voice them, in
deadly earnest with it all, pleading
for votes to the saloon loafers and ho-
bos and vagrants of the country. This
is the man who characterizes
Taft as a "fat-head," Bryan as a
"loud-mouthed fool" and Hearst as a
"political weary Willie."
