BLOODED HORSES FOR BIG SHOW

STOCK ARRIVES TONIGHT

FROM ILLINOIS FARMS

Metz and Son Ship Fine Animals by Express to Reach Here Tonight—Splendid Addition to Exhibit—Commercial Association Gets Decorator for Streets—Work in Pavilion Rushed to Completion by Monday.

M. C. Metz of the firm of Metz & Son arrived this morning from Chicago and will be followed tonight by a carload of blooded horses which will be exhibited at the fair next week. The animals are being shipped from Homewood, Illinois, to Pendleton by express, which accounts for the fact that they will arrive on the passenger train tonight.

The arrival of these horses will prove a splendid addition to the livestock exhibit at the fair as they are all imported stallions.

A special meeting of the board of managers of the Commercial association was held this morning and arrangements made with E. T. Tyler of Seattle, the professional decorator, to decorate the streets of the city for fair week. The contract price of \$200 has been agreed upon and the decoration committee, consisting of Dr. C. J. Smith, A. J. Goodman and J. P. Winter has undertaken the task of securing the funds necessary. A special meeting of the Commercial association will be held Monday evening.

GOVERNMENT TO RECLAIM CROOK COUNTY DESERT

Prineville, Ore., Sept. 25.—Now that the Hermiston irrigation project is about complete, and since the 50 per cent of the money derived from the sale of public lands in any one state must be expended in that state, the government is making reconnoissances throughout interior Oregon, with a view to the early construction of a third irrigation project in Oregon, the second being that at Klamath Falls. Inasmuch as H. J. Doolittle, an engineer in the reclamation service, together with six associates, is running levels and driving altitude stakes on practically every irrigable piece of land within a radius of 45 miles to the north and west of Prineville, it is possible Crook county may be the scene of the next government reclamation enterprise in Oregon.

GOOD BANK REPORT.

Condition of the First National Is Shown by Figures of Report Issued Today.

The excellent condition of the First National bank is shown by the figures of the report by Cashier G. M. Rice today.

The total resources of the bank are \$1,874,995.92, the loans and discounts amount to \$906,300.88, the deposits have reached a total of 1,421,466.06 and the undivided profits and surplus now amount to \$83,149.05.

This is a fine increase of business over the last report and the management is well pleased with the growth and progress of this pioneer institution.

Returns With Bride.

Rev. A. McKenzie Meldrum, pastor of the First Christian church, returned yesterday afternoon from Scotland, bringing with him the bride for whom he had crossed the continent of America and the Atlantic ocean. He left Pendleton nearly two months ago and was married to Miss Helen Crockett, in Glasgow, September 2. After a three days' tour of their native country, Mr. and Mrs. Meldrum sailed for their new home in America, having been 19 days in making the journey. They have taken up their residence in the Mumford house at 227 Perkins avenue. Mr. Meldrum will at once begin the work of rebuilding the church which was recently destroyed by fire.

Bought Land in Canada.

H. L. Rutherford of the Sand Ridge, Union county, was in the city today on his way home from Alberta, Canada, where he bought two sections of wheat land at \$15 per acre from the Canadian Pacific railroad company. Mr. Rutherford is a practical wheat raiser and has made a fortune at the business in the Dakotas and Oregon and declares that the Canadian Pacific lands east of Calgary offer the best opportunity for the wheat raiser that he has ever found. He will farm a section next year. Wheat in the vicinity of his land is this year yielding all the way from 30 to 50 bushels per acre.

Home from Canada.

Charles H. Nelson, who has been at Claresholm, Alberta, for the past two weeks, returned home last evening and is enthusiastic over that country. His father, James A. Nelson, is farming a large tract southeast of Claresholm and is doing exceptionally well. He will return to Alberta this fall to rent a farm from Dave Cargill, who is buying more raw land and who will perhaps spend the winter in California. He thinks it is the best place for a young man that he has ever seen and will reside there permanently.

Reception to Students.

The ideal club, composed of young people of the Methodist church will tonight tender a reception to the students of the high school and Pendleton academy. The object is to make the large number of out of town students feel more at home in the city and to permit them to become better acquainted with each other and the young people of the city in general. A program will be given, refreshments served and a general social time will be enjoyed. All interested are invited.

An automobile party consisting of Frank Moore and wife, R. E. Gleason and H. T. Shaver, passed through Pendleton yesterday afternoon on their way from Los Angeles to Walla Walla. They had made the long journey without a serious mishap of any kind and came across the Cascades by way of the Mount Hood road.

To Irrigation Meeting.

Col. J. F. McNaught of Hermiston, passed through Pendleton this afternoon on his way to Albuquerque, New Mexico, where he will attend the sessions of the National Irrigation congress. McNaught was one of the list of delegates appointed by the governor, this being the second time in succession this honor has been conferred upon him.

Nothing But Cash or Money Orders Recognized at Land Office.
