MRS. MATLOCK IS CALLED BY DEATH

PIONEER LADY GOES TO DESERVED REWARD

Pathetic Incident in Sufferer's Inability to Recognize Her Aged Father Who Was at Bedside—Mrs. Matlock Crossed the Plains in 1852—Was Married in Oregon Almost 50 Years Ago—Resident of Pendleton for Many Years.

Mrs. Mary A. Matlock, wife of C. J. Matlock, died at the family home 330 Water street, about 11 o'clock last night, a complication of diseases being the cause of death.

Mrs. Matlock, whose maiden name was Bennett, was born in Fulton county, Illinois, November 26, 1844, and crossed the plains with her par-

ents by means of an ox team in the fall of '53, her father, Charles Bennett, settling near Eugene. At that time there was not a house in the now thriving city of Eugene.

She was married to C. J. Matlock, October 28, 1860, and they had therefore lived together as man and wife for almost 48 years. In 1871 they moved from the Willamette valley to eastern Oregon, settling on Wild Horse creek, a few miles from Pendleton. The next year they moved down on Butter creek and have resided in or near Pendleton ever since that time.

The deceased is survived by a husband, who is 71 years of age, and five children, as follows: Mrs. F. J. Donaldson of Pendleton; Mrs. D. D. Burford of Spokane; D. Matlock, Ed Matlock, and Guy Matlock, all of this city.

Her father Charles A. Bennett is also alive and will be 90 years of age, October 8. He unexpectedly arrived from his home near Eugene Tuesday but his daughter was so low that he was not permitted to see her until he was not permitted to see her until he did not recognize him.

Funeral services will be conducted tomorrow afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Church of the Redeemer by the pastor, Rev. Charles Quinney. Interment will be made in Olney cemetery.

APPLE CROP FAR SHORT OF NORMAL PRODUCTION

Estimates of the apple crop in the United States, made yesterday by the American Apple Growers' Congress, at the last session of its convention at the Southern Hotel, showing a gloomy outlook for the fruit this year. The best promise by any district was held out only by the districts which did not suffer from the copious spring rains which washed the pollen out of the blooms and from the killing frost which came about the end of April.

The estimate of the Statistics Committee, presided over by J. Mack Tenner of Springfield, Ill., and was a reduction of from 25 to 50 per cent over last year's crop.

Thompson Fruit Co. of Yakima, the largest orchardists in Washington gives a carefully compiled estimate of the total output of apples in the Pacific Northwest. All these apples are packed in boxes, 630 boxes to the car being the minimum. The estimate of the company follows:

Colorado—Grand Junction, 500 cars; Paonia, 300; Hotchkiss, 150; Delta, 100; Montrose, 250; balance of State, 300.

Idaho—Boise and Payette, 600 cars; Palouse, 150.

Utah—All points, 250 cars.

Montana—Blitter Root Valley, 250 cars.

Oregon—Hood River, 600 cars; Grand Ronde Valley, 300; John Day country, 100; Medford, 150; Grant's Pass, Salem, Roseburg, 250; Willamette Valley, 200.

California—All points, 6,000 cars.

New Mexico—All points, 450 cars.

Washington—Yakima Valley, 1,500 cars; Wenatchee, 650; Spokane, eastern Washington, 100; Walla Walla, 150; Meyer's Falls, 60; Puget Sound, 150.

Total, 13,519 cars.

HOLD POTLATCH AT TOPPENISH

YAKIMA INDIANS PLAN FOR BIG FESTIVITIES

Umatilla Chief Prepare to Attend Annual Event in Yakima Valley in Early October—Horse Races to Be Big Event of the Occasion—Umatilla Horses Will Be Entered in Hopes of Bringing Back Yakima Wampum.

Many Indians from the Umatilla reservation are preparing to go to Toppenish for the big annual potlatch of the Yakima Indians, which is to be held near that place, beginning October 5. There are a number of Yakimas here and as the bonds of friendship between the Umatillas and the Yakimas are close there will be a large number of the former go over to participate with their friends in the festivities.

Though this event is one of the few remaining relics of a number of tribal customs, the ways of the white man are gradually being adopted in the manner of its celebration. No longer will the big horse races be held out on the open prairie or even on some dusty straight-way road. A race track is being constructed and a grandstand erected from which the dusky reds can view their greatest sport.

For a number of years the annual potlatch has been held on the farm of an Indian belonging to the Klickitat tribe, which fact has kept many of the Yakimas from participating. It seems that in the troubles of the early days the Klickitats took sides with the whites against the Yakimas, thereby engendering a hatred which has never entirely been forgotten, especially by the older Indians. This year a family of Yakimas is to be the host and it is expected that the celebration will be the most largely attended of any in recent years.

While various Indian stunts will be pulled off, the principal attraction will be the horse racing. There will be purses put up for Indian races every afternoon and for one day there will be offered a purse of \$100 for a race between horses belonging to Indians and those belonging to whites. Chief among the Indians who will participate in the races will be a number of Umatillas who think they have fast horses and are confident they can return home with some of the Yakima wampum.

G. I. LA DOW BUYS GOODMAN'S

PROMINENT CONTRACTOR IS TO SELL HARDWARE

Change Will Take Place on November First—Mr. Goodman Decides to Locate in Portland and Mr. Craven Will Cast His Lot With Wallawa—Old Firm Has Enjoyed Fine Business Here During Existence—New Owner Is Old Resident of Pendleton.

The Goodman Hardware company, one of the largest business houses in the city of Pendleton, has changed hands, G. I. La Dow, the well known contractor, having bought the store and will take charge about November 1.

The Goodman Hardware company has been in business in Pendleton for five years, during which time they have enjoyed an ever increasing trade and have built up a large and profitable business. The growth of their business has continued right up to the present time, Mr. Goodman making the statement this morning that despite the fact that up to the first of October last year, the amount of business transacted was phenomenal, it was even greater for this year.

The present firm will continue to conduct the business of the store up to the last of October, when it will be transferred to Mr. LaDow, who is well known and popular here, having spent practically his entire life in this city.

Mr. Goodman, the senior member of the firm, says he is selling out for the reason that he is permanently retiring from business. He will move to Portland shortly to look after his business interests there and will probably make his home permanently in that city.

Mr. Craven, the junior member, will go to Wallawa county, where he is in company with his brother, will engage in the hardware and implement business in the young and growing city of Wallawa.

Frank Masterson, one of the salesmen, will probably go out with the old firm, while Roscoe Frost, another salesman, will be retained in the same position.

The new proprietor has an unlimited number of friends in the city and country and that he will continue the already good business and build it up to still greater proportions is generally expected.
