JOHN D. DEFENDS HIS STANDARD OIL

TRUST MAGNATE AUTHOR
OF MAGAZINE ARTICLE

Rockefeller Takes Public Into His Confidence and Tells Story of Creation of Trust—Direct Selling Has His O. K.—Declares Standard Oil Policy Has Not Driven Out Competition—Claims Company Has Many Competitors—Not Bad Trust.

New York, Sept. 26.—John D. Rockefeller appears for the first time in the role of an author in a series of articles on "Some Random Reminiscences of Men and Events," the first of which appeared yesterday in the October issue of the World's Work.

Mr. Rockefeller gives as a reason for speaking now that "if a tenth of the things that have been said are true, then dozens of able and faithful men who have been associated with me, many of whom have passed away, must have been guilty of grave faults. For myself, I had decided to say nothing, hoping that after my death the truth would gradually come to the surface; but while I live and can testify to certain things, it seems fair that I should refer to some points which I hope will help to set forth several much discussed happenings in a new light. I am convinced that they have not been fully understood."

Mr. Rockefeller speaks of the development of the Standard Oil company, and says that the plan of selling direct to the consumer and the exceptionally rapid growth of the business "bred a certain antagonism which I suppose could not have been avoided."

Of the direct selling to the consumer he says: "This was done in a fair spirit and with due consideration for every one's rights. We did not ruthlessly go after the trade of our competitors and attempt to ruin it by cutting prices or instituting a spy system."

If any of the employees of the company were overzealous in going after sales, he says, with that they acted in violation of the expressed and known wishes of the company.

Mr. Rockefeller says that in the early days the oil industry was considered a most hazardous undertaking, not altogether unlike the speculative mining undertakings we hear so much of today.

"None of us," he says, "ever dreamed of the magnitude of what proved to be the later expansion."

Further on he says: "Another thing to be remembered about the so-called 'octopus' is that there has been no 'water' introduced into the capital (perhaps we felt that oil and water would not have mixed). Nor in all these years has any one had to wait for a month for what the Standard owed. It is a common thing to hear people say that this company has crushed competitors. Only the uninform could make such an assertion. It has had and always will have hundreds of active competitors. "The Standard has not now and never did have a royal road to supremacy, nor is its success due to any one man, but to the multitude of able men who are working together."

In discussing the "Modern Corporation," Mr. Rockefeller says: "Beyond question there is a suspicion of corporations. There may be reasons for such suspicion very often; for a corporation may be moral or immoral, just as a man may be moral or the opposite; but it is folly to condemn all corporations because some are bad, or even to be unduly suspicious of all because some are bad. But the corporation in form and character has come to stay—that is a thing that may be depended upon."

WASHINGTON FIENDS CAN NOT GET COFFINAILS.

Olympia, Wash., Sept. 26.—The judgment of Superior Judge Sullivan of Spokane county that the anti-cigarette law of last session was invalid because of defective title has been reversed by the state supreme court in the case of the state against H. S. Winsor. It was contended by the defense that the title was fatally defective because it did not state that the act did not prohibit Washington jobbers from selling cigarettes to persons outside the state.

The supreme court decision says that the title to a law need not be an index to the contents of the act, and is sufficient if it fairly gives notice and directs attention to the body of the law, where details may be found. The Spokane court is ordered to proceed with the trial of Winsor, who is accused of selling cigarette papers.

SPREAD SWELL BANQUET IN BIG SEWER PIPES.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 26.—A banquet laid in a sewer in Franklin park, a Chicago suburb on the west bank of the Des Plaines river, was the unique means of the enterprising women of that town to celebrate the opening of the new concrete sewage conduit, the completion of which ends a legal fight of 16 years. The men only could be induced to enter when Mrs. Dora F. Combes, chosen by lot, agreed to descend through the manhole.

Mrs. Combes had no trouble descending. When she viewed the scene below she sent up a cry of enthusiastic encouragement to her sister above, for in either direction, for several hundred feet was a long line of coffee cups, grape juice glasses filled to the brim, gaudy lanterns and other edibles, with the candles alight along the tunnel way.

MILLION BAGS LEFT AT WALLA WALLA PRISON

Walla Walla, Sept. 26.—The state of Washington has on hand at the penitentiary the largest lot of sacks ever held over at the close of harvest. About half a million bags have been sold and delivered and the remainder of the output is on hand. Until an inventory is made, October 1, at the close of the season, it is not possible to state just how much of the jute products are on hand.

The prison manufactures about a million bags a year in addition to oth-

er products made from raw jute, and at the close of the season last year some bags were on hand. Early in the season the price was fixed at \$1.20 per hundred, but later the figures were changed to \$6.80. The trust bag was put on the market at about \$7.20 laid down here and the farmers union made large purchases direct early in the summer.

In two or three deals the farmers bought nearly 1,000,000 bags while the prison product was forgotten. The Calcutta shipments were received early in the season and most farmers found that they had purchased

too heavily for the light crop. In this way it was possible for one farmer to supply his neighbor with the surplus of his order and the usual late orders were entirely lacking. As a matter of fact the bag supply was fully adequate at all periods of harvest, while usually there is a shortage during the rush.
