OUR BIG BROTHER, SAYS AUSTRALIA

ISLAND EMPIRE ENTHUSED
—OVER AMERICAN FLEET.

Newspapers Look to United States to Extend Protection from Asiatic Influences—Whole Country Enthused Over Visit of Pacific Fleet—Impression of Great Nation Forced Upon Islanders by Visit—Lesson of Floating Fortresses.

Victoria, B. C. Sept. 25.—That before the American battleship fleet has Australian shores its visit will have proved an epoch-making event is borne out in no uncertain manner by descriptions and statements in mail advices per the Canadian-Australian liner Marama, which has just arrived here. The \$160,000,000 in buff and white which rode at anchor in Sydney harbor has taught Australia two great lessons, and incidentally has taught the United States something of which she had only a vague consciousness. The fleet and its lessons are dealt with in an exhaustive manner in the Sydney Morning Herald of August 29, and in its summing up of the visit this paper has disclosed two important if hitherto veiled truths.

"Just across the Pacific," it says, "lives a white people which must for sheer size and weight of numbers be always the greatest white people of the Pacific. We may hope to be a good second. This great young people is sprung from the same stock as ourselves. It is faced with some of the same big questions in the Pacific. These two peoples must always live as neighbors on this ocean. No matter what distinctions international law, or geography, or common ignorance may draw, we know that the United States is in reality our Big Brother."

"And we have learned another lesson. We have seen what a very helpless place this Australia would be if the sea were not its own castle, kept for it by the great people to whom it belongs. We have seen that the nation over the water is taking advantage of the sea for its fortress—not merely a fortress but a fortress that can go about the world and enforce by offense an honorable peace wherever it wishes. The people of America have come to think the same way as the people of Britain about the command of the sea and what it means to them."

CLAIMS HER SISTER WAS NOT EMANCIPATED.

Kansas City, Mo., Sept. 25.—An officer went to Leonard today to serve a warrant upon Mrs. Belle Kays, accused of poisoning by Mrs. Martha E. Robertson, a negro, who was given her freedom after the civil war. Mrs. Robertson appeared in the federal court and alleged that her sister had been held in slavery by the Kays family for 33 years. She told the court that she and her sister were first owned as slaves by J. G. Robertson of Marion county. Her sister was sold a man named Whittaker in Kansas county, who afterward sold her to the Kays family. Mrs. Robertson's sister, who was seven years old at the close of the war, has since been held as a slave, according to Mrs. Robertson's allegation. It was not until recently that she became aware of her sister's whereabouts.
