FIRST EPISCOPAL CONVOCATION

CHURCH WORKERS CONVENE IN PENDLETON WEDNESDAY

Bishop Paddock and Leading Church Workers of Jurisdiction Will Organize First Convocation—Program of Discussion of Church Problems Prepared—List of Delegates and Manner of Entertainment.

The Right Rev. R. L. Paddock, bishop of eastern Oregon, together with his ministers and the leading laymen of the Episcopal church in this part of the state, will meet in Pendleton next Wednesday and organize the first Convocation of the Episcopal jurisdiction of eastern Oregon.

The organization will be preceded on Tuesday evening by a short service at the Church of the Redeemer, following which a couple of papers dealing with matters of Christian work will be read.

The official program of the convocation as announced is given here-with:

The program for Wednesday will be divine service and holy communion at 10 a. m., with an address by the bishop, after which the convocation will proceed to organization and business.

At 12 noon, there will be noonday prayers for missions.

At 1 p. m. a lunch will be served by the ladies of the church for the clerical and lay delegates in the old parish house.

At 2 p. m. Dr. Devins will give reminiscences of his work and expe-

riences as a missionary in eastern Oregon. At 3 p. m. there will be a meeting of the ladies' auxiliary, led by Miss Alice Knight, the deaconess, after which the business session will be resumed.

Papers are to be given by the only three rectors of eastern Oregon, viz., Rev. Upton H. Gibbs, La Grande, "The Church's Attitude Towards Amusements."
