GREWSOME TALE OF DEATH PACT

MRS. RICE TELLS OF
RUSTIN'S PLAN TO KILL

Tells of Calm Plans for Suicide and
Murder Made by Doctor—Fatal
Doses of Aconite Distributed—
Widow "Affinity" of Dead Man
Identifies Davis as Being Third
Party in Ghastly Arrangement for
Death.

Omaha, Sept. 28.—The grewsome details of the triple death-pact which the state seeks to prove was the cause of the death of Dr. Rustin, were given out Saturday in Judge Crawford's court when Mrs. Rice took the stand. The court was thronged with a crowd which even rain could not deter.

Mrs. Rice was the first witness called. She took up the narrative where it was left off Saturday when counsel for the defense attempted to prevent her giving testimony before the court on account of alleged hearsay.

The nervousness that Friday characterized her actions was not apparent and her replies were given in a free and easy manner.

Friday her story stopped at a point where she began to relate to be court what Dr. Rustin had told her of the proposed shooting and how he was to give Davis a suicide dose in exchange for his gruesome service.

Counsel for the defense gave evidence of an intention to fight every point in the testimony where he found an opening, by objecting freely.

Mrs. Rice, however, was permitted to say that Rustin told her he had arranged with a man to kill him, and later she was permitted to identify this man as Davis, the defendant.

"The doctor told me he had arranged to have this man do the shooting on condition that the physician give him enough poison to take his own life. He said Davis was to come to the office at 8 o'clock that evening. I then left with the understanding that Dr. Rustin would meet me shortly on the corner near his office. I waited for him on the corner, and when Dr. Rustin came got on a street car going past his home. He got off near the house, and I went to the end of the line and then back to town."

"By appointment, I went to Rustin's office at 8 o'clock, and found Davis there. I stayed only a short time, doctor sent to the drugstore for a bottle of aconite. He poured half of it into another bottle giving me one portion and putting the other in his pocket. He told me to go to the street corner where he would meet me shortly. I did so and he came down the street with Charles E. Davis. They waited until the first car came, when the doctor put Davis on the car going west toward his home and then joined me. We walked west to within a block of his home, the doctor stopping once to purchase some whiskey. We talked of his plans."

"I shuddered at every mention of them, but the doctor talked freely. When within two blocks of Dr. Rustin's home, he bade me good bye, saying to me to wait awhile. He told me if his plans did not work he would soon join me again. I waited quite awhile, and then went downtown to my room at Clara Gleason's place. I called up Dr. Rustin's home repeatedly after I got back, but was told the doctor was not there."

Mrs. Rice, during her testimony, identified Davis as the man she saw get on the streetcar after he came out of Rustin's office, and said she saw him standing at Fortieth and Farnum streets when she walked to that point with the doctor.

MUST KEEP CARS CLEAN.

Railroad Commission Requires That
All Passenger Coaches Must Leave
Terminals in Clean Condition.

In answer to the article in the Morning Tribune censuring the O. R. & N. company for keeping the coach doors of the Spokane train closed until an hour before the departure of the train, the railroad company says that the railroad commission has required of them that all coaches leaving this point on trains starting from here, must be absolutely clean.

The doors are kept closed on the Spokane train until half an hour before the departure of the train, to prevent passengers from going in and turning the seats over, musing the floor with peanut hulls, lunches, orange and banana skins and otherwise littering up the cars starting out of here, where passengers transferring here expect to find a fresh, clean train.

If the doors of the coaches were opened during the forenoon large numbers of idle men and loafers would simply live in the cars and the railroad commission would soon be after the company for starting dirty and filthy cars out of a terminal station.

The coaches are opened half an hour before the departure of the train, in plenty of time for passengers to get on the train and get a seat.

HOVER AT SALT LAKE.

Kenewick Man Touring the World in
a Motor Car.

Mr. and Mrs. H. A. Hover, the Spokane people who are making a tour of the world in their 20-horse power Maxwell car, arrived in Salt Lake Friday, according to a Salt Lake report. The report states that Mr. Hoover carries the colors of the Spokane Motor club on his car and will do so throughout his trip.

The itinerary as given out by Mr. Hoover is an extensive one and before he completes his tour figures he will have traveled 75,000 miles. He left Spokane April 17 and worked south through the coast cities and down into old Mexico, thence back to Los Angeles and over to Salt Lake.

Now they are going back through California to San Francisco, says a report, and then by way of Portland, Spokane, La Grande, Boise, Pocatello back to Salt Lake, then to Cheyenne, Omaha, Chicago, Niagara Falls and into Canada, where they will tour as long as they wish, the intention being to see everything of interest in the great British colony to the north.

They will return by way of Buffalo and from there to New York, where they will take steamer to Algiers in North Africa. Next winter they will tour Algiers, Tunis and Egypt and in spring, Palestine.

They will go to Europe, where they will spend two years visiting every nation and spending all the time they think necessary in each of them. They will take steamer to India the winter of 1911, and tour as much of that as is possible; then to China, Japan, the Philippines, Hawaii and home in 1912.

TUBERCULOSIS CONGRESS FIGHTS INFECTED MILK

Philadelphia, Sept. 28.—The danger of tuberculosis infection from milk and how to prevent it was one of the principal subjects taken up Saturday at the closing session of the International Conference on Tuberculosis. Reports of what other countries are doing in demonstrating the presence of bovine bacilli in milk sold for human consumption were made. It was suggested by Professor J. F. Sayman, of Belgium, that with a view

of ascertaining precisely the danger of spreading tuberculosis infection by the medium of milk and of unifying in all countries the prophylactic measures to preclude against this contamination, the conference appoint an international commission charged with studying the question and elaborate on the prophylactic measures it may recommend.

What the Red Cross society is doing in the crusade against tuberculosis was presented by delegates of that body. Aid for the tuberculosis poor in their homes was also discussed.
