BASEBALL SCORES.

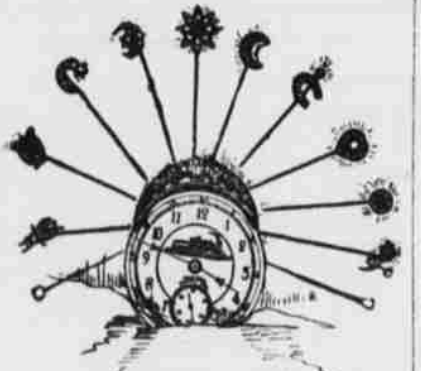

while all exhibitors did not get their entries made in time for them to be placed prior to the opening, the work was far enough advanced this afternoon to show that Pendleton is the home of artists with both the brush and the needle.

County and Town Exhibits.

Aside from the exhibits of the two counties, Umatilla and Morrow, Milton and Pilot Rock both have especially fine displays of the products of their vicinities. The feature of the Umatilla county exhibit, as was to be expected, is the large display of grains while perhaps the most attractive features of the Morrow county booth are the exceptionally large watermelons. Milton and Pilot Rock both have attractive displays of fruits and vegetables, apples being the predominant features in the former and the large potatoes demanding attention in the latter.

Livestock and Poultry.

Only a comparative few of the livestock exhibitors had their animals in the stalls when the gates were opened this afternoon, but it is believed they will all be on hand before tomorrow afternoon. The poultry exhibit, however, is far ahead of anything in that line ever shown here before. From present indications it looks like Morrow county exhibitors would carry off a large share of the premiums in this department. There are chickens on display that would take prizes at any fair.

Taking everything into consideration the fair is far ahead of either the former ones.
