attorney in his prohibition fight,

to aid the grand jury's deliberations.

but so far as blind pigs are concern-
ed there is no loop-hole in the pro-
hibitory law here.

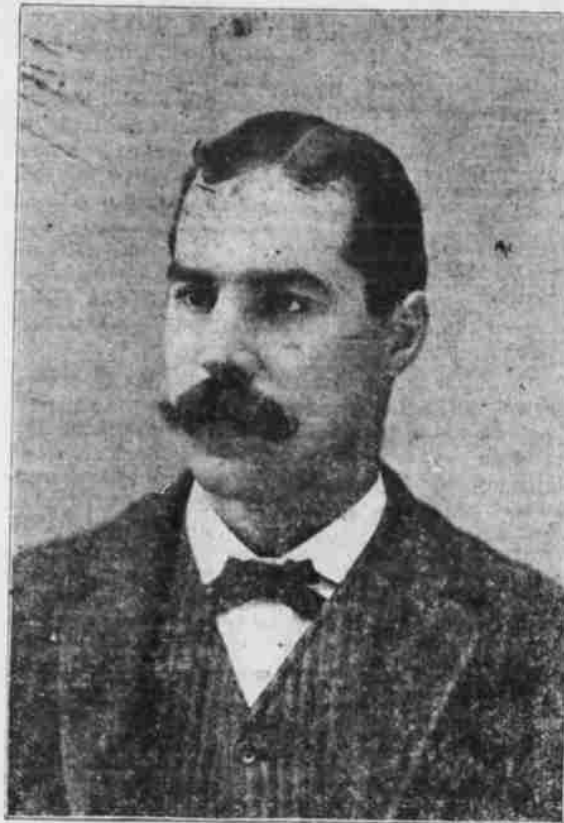
