BAKER ATHLETE ASKS
FOR PENDLETON FRIENDS

Olympic Hero is Unchanged by
Praises of Nation—Was Anxious
to See Pendleton Boys Who Were
Old Friends and Acquaintances—
Going Back to Help Father in the
Blacksmith Shop at Baker City.

Unspolled by all his hobnobbing
with the great, unchanged by the lau-
rels he has won, just as unassuming,
just as glad to meet a friend, Dan J.
Kelly, eastern Oregon's representative
among the world-beating trio of ath-
letes from this state, passed through
Pendleton last evening.

After having been congratulated,
praised and fêted by lovers of sport
from President Roosevelt and the
representatives to British royalty to
the newsboys on Portland's streets,
after royal entertainment by the lead-
ing athletic associations and patrons of
the United States from Oyster Bay
to Portland, Dan Kelly is going back
to Baker City—back to the black-
smith shop.

For the present the fleet Baker City
boy is out of athletics—possibly for-
ever. He has been having great trou-
ble with his leg, during the past year,
and he will get out of athletics for a
year upon the prediction of eastern
authorities that by so doing he will be
able to equal if not excel his former
records.

Dan was raised in a blacksmith
shop, where during vacations he used
to help his father out—now he is go-
ing back to do it again. He will spend
at least a couple of months in the
shop.

Kelly stepped off No. 2 yesterday
and spied a friend at the depot. His
greeting was a rapid fire of questions
as to the whereabouts of half a doz-
en old friends. When the Baker boy
found the fair was in session he was
almost persuaded to stop, but decided
to go on to Baker and return to Pen-
dleton before the celebration is
over. He will spend several days
then, visiting on a ranch in the
neighborhood.

CAN'T LEARN VERDICT FOR THE THIRD TIME.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 26.—For
the third time George Walkem, a
prominent civil engineer of Vancou-
ver, who is charged with having coun-
celled an illegal operation on Blanche
Bond, of Seattle, will not hear the
judge's verdict. Judge Cane, who died
suddenly last night, had promised to
render a verdict at 10 o'clock this
morning. At his last trial Walkem
was found guilty and Judge Cane re-
served his decision pending an appeal
to a higher court, which confirmed
the previous decision. Again the case
was appealed and a new trial ordered
upon new evidence, among which was
the alleged confession from the girl
that her testimony was untrue on the
last trial. She took the stand and
pointed out the woman detective who
wrote the confession. Now the case
must be retried.

TUBERCULOSIS DISCUSSED AT INTERNATIONAL MEET.

Washington, Sept. 28.—Delegates
from 39 foreign countries and nearly
every state in the Union, met today at
the opening of the sixth international
tuberculosis congress to discuss the
proposed world wide warfare on the
white plague. Secretary of the Treas-
urer George B. Cortelyou welcomed the
delegates on behalf of the nation.
Dr. Robert Koch, the great German
bacteriologist, during the afternoon
addressed the meeting, saying: "We
require a great campaign of education
to check consumption, and this is the
chief duty of this congress. Isolation
is necessary to the proper treatment
of the disease."

MURDER EXPERT SLAYS AN INVADING BURGLAR.

Chicago, Sept. 28.—Dr. Adolph
Gehermann, the poison expert who
testified in the Hoch and Vrazal mur-
der cases, early today shot and killed
a burglar who was entering his home.

Dr. Gehermann heard the man out-
side and arming himself with his rifle
stood at the head of the stairs and
waited for him to enter. When the
burglar did so the doctor fired three
shots, all of which took effect. He
then rushed to the burglar and offered
medical attention, summoning a nurse.
The burglar was armed with a knife.

REVOLTING DETAILS SHOCK OMAHA COURT.

Omaha, Sept. 28.—Mrs. Abbie Rice
under a rapid-fire cross-examination
in the Rustin murder case, today told
such revolting details regarding her
relations with Dr. Rustin that the
court ordered all 16-year-old girls to
leave the room. The society women
kept their seats throughout. The at-
torneys for Charles Davis, who is ac-
cused of murdering Rustin, according
to an alleged plot, failed to shake her
story. The defense began the intro-
duction of evidence this afternoon.

Many Homes Built.

lem, aside from the great number
which were enlarged and remodelled,
and still there are not enough houses
to supply the demand. This is learn-
ed from one of Salem's most promi-
