GOOD ROADS MEET FOR PENDLETON

COMMERCIAL ASSOCIATION PLANS FOR GATHERING

Walter McCormach, Leader of the Movement, Guarantees Necessary Expenses of Holding the Gathering—Committee Appointed to Make Arrangements for Enthusiastic Meeting on October 20—Association Approves Decoration Plan.

A good roads convention for Pendleton on October 20, is now assured. At a called meeting of the Commercial Association held last evening, Walter McCormach, of the Pendleton Auto company, and one of the most enthusiastic good roads men in the county, assured the association that he would assume the responsibility of raising the \$200 necessary to bring the big meeting to this city. When this announcement was

made, Secretary Marsh was instructed to notify Judge John H. Scott of Salem, the president of the state good roads association, that the money necessary for the expenses of the meeting would be forthcoming and that a hearty welcome would be extended to the officers of the association and the delegates from all portions of the state.

A committee on arrangements, consisting of T. J. Tweedy, Monte Gwinn and Tom Thompson, was appointed to make arrangements for the convention. This is to be an eastern Oregon meeting, but other parts of the state will no doubt be represented.

Umatilla county residents have always been interested in good roads movements and since the introduction of so many automobiles into the county the number of devotees and the amount of enthusiasm on the subject has been increased many fold. The action of the executive committee in employing the professional decorator to decorate the streets of the city for fair week was also endorsed last evening.

INTERESTS OLD PENDLETONIANS

ELL'S FIRE BOOTH IS ATTRACTIVE FEATURE.

Pictures of Pendleton's Fires and Floods on Display at Fair—Panorama of Town in Years Gone By—Photographs of Historic Conflagrations—Mementoes of Past Fire Fighters and Pictures of Veterans Shown in Booth.

A booth which probably has more interest to the old residents of Pendleton than any other at the district fair is the fire booth of Joe Ell, the city's only exempt fire chief. There is a crowd about this booth at all times of the afternoon and evening.

A very enjoyable meeting of exempt firemen was held there yesterday morning for the purpose of having their pictures taken in a group with their exempt certificates which are there on exhibit. To secure an exempt certificate it is necessary to serve seven years in the department.

Those present were Joe Ell, exempt chief, who occupies the center of the group. On his right are John Vaughan, present chief; Charles Greulich, ex-chief; Jesse Felling, Ed Money, Tom Swearingen, Frank Duprat, Frank O'Gara and Arthur Gibson.

On his left are T. E. Howard, ex-chief; W. R. Withee, ex-chief; and L. G. Frazier, ex-chief, and Darr Phelps, Peter Anderson, C. C. Hendrix, Doss Swearingen, John Russell and E. J. Murphy.

Others who have exempt certificates are Sam Christensen, James Lehman, Ed Thompson, Tom Millar, Peter De Young, W. S. Wells, Peter Medernach, L. Larone, J. H. Henning, John Greulich, Derwood Waffie, Max Baer, Joseph Basler, J. L. Sharron, Walter Bowman, W. N. Wells, Henry Schwartz, Frank Light, H. O. Mossu, John Russell, L. D. Drake, Al Despain, Ralph Folsom, Leo Eggerth.

Among the most notable views in the exhibit are two large colored panoramic views of the Chicago fire of 1871, and the San Francisco fire of 1906. Others are the Weston fire of 1883, Seattle conflagration of 1889 and one of Spokane in the same year.

There is also a picture of the burning of the Robbins House on Garden Street in 1888, and in which William Roper last an eye.

In the center of the views is a large photograph, 18x12 inches, of the great Baltimore fire of 1904, while above this hangs a banner entirely covered with badges of the different firemen's tournaments, and programs of firemen's balls, collected by Mr. Ell during a period extending over a number of years.

In the exhibit are also two views of fire drills taken in 1885 and in which appear the old steam fire engine, now on exhibition beside the booth.

Among the Pendleton early day views is a picture of the little red school house block, taken in 1872. Theo Howard and Gus Burgie in their boat "Nob Hill," in January, 1883, cutting their way through the ice as they were crossing the river.

There is also a picture of the great flood of December 14 and 16, 1882. The view is looking north at the intersection of Alta and Garden street, and a picture of the boy band. This was taken July 4, 1885, when W. D. Fletcher was leader. Still other views are one looking south on Main street from the bridge, taken in 1882; one looking north from the intersection of Main and Alta, taken on presidential election day when Cleveland and Harrison were running in 1888; one looking east from the intersection of Main and Court streets and showing the Fourth of July parade of 1889.

There is also a picture of the baseball team of 1888. At that time the interest in baseball ran so high that Captain Martin and John Bentley hugged each other in the grand stand at Baker City, when the game was won.

Panoramic views of Pendleton as it appeared in 1864, 1869 and 1884 are also on display.

There are also two large colored pictures representing the western spirit of the two counties holding their fair together. The suit displayed on the figure is one which was used in Pendleton July 4, and Walla Walla, July 5, 1888. It was worn by the Clipper hose team of which Joe Ell was a member.

The large red bell hanging in the center of the booth represents a fire bell, while fire hose decorates the front of the booth. A toy fire engine, drawn by three horses, and a chief's lantern used by Mr. Ell during the time he was in the service, are also to be seen on display.

The space in the middle of the booth and separated by a railing represents an insurance office, the business in which Mr. Ell is now engaged.

The collection comprises photos of nearly all the fires which have occurred in Pendleton and the principal fires of the United States, besides some views of fires in other countries. Mr. Ell has printed a brief account which appears below each picture so that everyone may fully understand the scene represented. He also has a scrap book containing newspaper clippings of the Pendleton fires.

The booth represents an immense amount of work, but Mr. Ell feels amply repaid for his labors since the public has shown so much appreciation.

Milton's Fine Fruit.

In the Milton exhibit is to be found one of the finest collections of fruit ever displayed in eastern Oregon. Among other things to be found there is a collection of 16 apples which laid in a row, one touching another, measure six feet and a quarter of an inch. Another feature of the Milton exhibit is a peach limb, less than a foot in length, containing eight peaches and weighing five pounds, while still another is corn as high as was ever seen in Iowa.

Pilot Rock.

While the Pilot Rock exhibit is not nearly so extensive as that to be found in the Milton booth it is an excellent showing nevertheless and compares very favorably with that from the other end of the county. It demonstrates the fact that with care the Pilot Rock vicinity can be developed into a famous fruit section. The display of vegetables in the Pilot Rock booth is also good, the potato specimen being especially attractive.

Hermiston Is There.

While Hermiston does not have a separate booth this year, she is represented in the county exhibits. Some of her products are to be found there as well as an interesting set of pictures, showing different views of the government project and especially of the big reservoir and dam. One of the features of the county exhibit are the pots of growing celery. Another is the great variety of exhibits, showing the diversity of its resources and products.

Irrigon Fruit and Melons.

Prominent in the Morrow county booth are the several exhibits of fine grapes as were ever produced in California or sunny Italy and the mammoth watermelons. Most of these were grown in the Irrigon country and show the wonderful fertility of the soil in that section of the state when water can be added to sunshine and other natural advantages.

Will Stamp for Taft.

Judge Stephen A. Lowell has accepted the invitation of the state central committee to take the stump in this state on behalf of the republican presidential ticket. His itinerary has not yet been announced, but it will probably include dates in western Oregon almost exclusively.
