HEAVY ARRIVALS AT STOCKYARDS

MANY HOGS BROUGHT
TO PORTLAND MARKETS

Steers Bring Good Prices—Best Hogs
Run High—Provision Advance In-
dicates Good Tone to Market—
Sheep Market Is Firm—Wheat Un-
changed in Western Centers.

Portland Union Stockyards, Sept. 28.—There were very heavy arrivals of hogs in the local market over Sunday, but the tone of the trade continued firm and prices are unchanged. The local hog market has been so good of late that shippers from other sections are beginning to be attracted and it will not be long before the Portland market will be considered one of the best in the country. In fact, the high prices in effect here are causing all of these extra shipments. Today seven loads came in from California.

Th stock from the south was of very heavy weight, just what packers of the Pacific northwest are looking for.

The great strength of the hog situation was shown today when local packers advanced their quotations on provisions. There was a rise of one-half cent a pound in both grades of lard. Dry salt meats were moved up the same figure and for the same reason. There was a fractional change in bacon values.

Good Prices for Steers.
Present prices in the cattle market are very high considering the quality. There is little top stuff coming and yet there are few sales of steers below \$4 and from that figure the market still rules up as high as \$4.25. Select steers are still very scarce and the trade still expresses the opinion that prices would reach higher if the quality could be secured.

For two days the run of sheep was small in the yards; over Sunday the arrivals in the yards totaling but 250 head. The market is very firm at former prices.

While there was a firm tone in all lines of livestock today, trade was small; buyers not seemingly caring to purchase on the first day of the week.

A year ago today hogs were easy, cattle easier and sheep very firm. Following is the general range of values on stock ruling in the yards for late shipment:

Hogs—Best, east of mountains, \$7.25; ordinary, \$6.75; blockers, and China fats, \$6; stockers and feeders, \$5.

Cattle—Select, east of mountains, \$14.25; medium steers, \$12.50; \$3.75; ordinary, \$3.25; best cows, \$2.75; and heifers, \$2.75; medium cows, \$2.25; stags, \$2.50; bulls, \$2.

Sheep—Best wethers, \$2.50; ordinary wethers, \$2.25; lambs, \$4; straight ewes, \$2.50; mixed lots, \$2.50; \$2.75.

FINE YIELDS IN ALBERTA.

Peter Embysk Returns from the North and Is Enthusiastic Over Canadian Wheat Lands.

Peter Embysk, the well known wheat raiser of this county has just returned from Alberta, where he has harvested a half section of wheat this season. His half section in Alberta yielded 3000 bushels more than a half section belonging to him near Adams in this county, and consequently he is enthusiastic over Alberta wheat land.

While his half section near Adams is worth from \$60 to \$75 per acre, yet it yielded 10 bushels per acre less than the Alberta land, which can be bought yet in large quantities east of Calgary for \$12 and \$15 per acre on eight year's time, at a low rate of interest.

Mr. Embysk believes that the Alberta country is the coming wheat district of the world. Land is rich and productive and transportation facilities are on the ground ahead of the settlers, a rare condition in new countries.

PUBLICITY FOR UMATILLA.

Sunset Magazine Contains Three Pages of Excellent Advertising for October.

Sunset Magazine for October contains a large amount of publicity for Umatilla county and is one of the best numbers issued during the year.

The page advertisement for the publicity organization of the county last spring is run this month for the first time, and a two page poem, "Sage Brush," by Bert Huffman of this city accompanied by appropriate illustrations, appears in the October number.

Umatilla county is thus given considerable publicity through the October number which is being read in large numbers in this city. Already scores of answers to the advertising have been received by Secretary James H. Gwinn of the publicity committee.

Bought Land in Alberta.

F. G. Huber of Hardman, Morrow county, was in the city last night on his way home from Alberta, where he purchased a section of wheat land east of Calgary for \$12 per acre. A brother living east of Calgary who has been in that country eight years, says that the weather has averaged more mild in that time than at Oskaloosa, Iowa, where they formerly lived. Mr. Huber will move to Alberta with his family next spring and farm his land.

Here From Kansas.

Mr. and Mrs. C. G. Porter of Winfield, Kansas, arrived in the city last night and left today for Pilot Rock, where Mr. Porter will be employed on L. L. Mann's farm permanently. They have come to Oregon to make a home and so far like the country very well. Mr. Porter is a brother of W. T. Porter and Mrs. N. E. Green of this city.

Freewater, Sept. 28.—As the two little daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Price of this city were returning to their homes from a neighbors on Saturday evening Royal Nelson, riding a horse going at breakneck speed, ran over one of the children cutting her about the head and neck very seriously. The poor little child lay unconscious all day yesterday and this morning she seems a little easier. The lad will probably be arrested.
