

TUBERCULOSIS CONGRESS OPENS TODAY

Albuquerque, N. M., Sept. 29.—"To save the forests, store the floods, reclaim the deserts and make homes in the land" is the comprehensive ambition of the National Irrigation congress, which began its sixteenth annual session in this city today. Already scores of men interested in projects to make the semi-arid west bloom as the rose are arriving in the city and the hotels are rapidly filling with guests. Many Albuquerque homes will be opened to entertain the overflow of guests that cannot be entertained at the hotels and the citizens and business interests of the town have combined to make the congress the most notable gathering in the history of Albuquerque.

Vice President Fairbanks, Gifford Pinchot, F. H. Newell, director of the reclamation service, and many other prominent government officials will attend the congress and deliver addresses.

The National Irrigation congress, from a small beginning in 1891, when it was instituted at Salt Lake City, Utah, has grown into an organization of national importance and a recognized force in directing legislation by the congress of the United States for the reclamation of the arid and semi-arid lands of the west. Yearly the attendance of delegates and spectators has been increasing. Last year at Sacramento, Cal., many thousands attended, and the whole country read with interest the daily reports of the proceedings. This year, at Albuquerque, the national government, by cabinet and bureau officers, will participate in the discussions, and the board of control, in charge of the local arrangements, is preparing for a larger attendance than ever before.

There is to be an industrial exhibition at Albuquerque at the same time. Among those who have offered prizes are Senator Boise Penrose, \$500 for the best exhibits of minerals, and W. H. Anderson, who offers \$100 for the best cotton.

In the past, tribes of Pueblo Indians will appear, coming for a stay throughout the congress and exposition and fair, from Laguna, Cochiti, San Felipe, San Domingo, and other pueblos. The chiefs will carry in the parades the famous sticks presented to their predecessors by President Abraham Lincoln during the civil war more than 40 years ago. Representatives of the Pima tribes of Arizona will attend also and participate in the parades.

All of the Indians will wear the fantastic costumes of their race. Indian women, riding in floats and making pottery and Navajo blankets, will be in the pageant. It will be a notable picture of the "vanishing race." Two bands of music from Old Mexico will participate in the parades, and in addition bands will come from all over the mountains west and from the cities of the plains eastward, filling the air with music.

The irrigation congress will have before it the lesson of 11 reclamation projects completed, or to be completed, this year. These projects will cost \$18,740,000, and will reclaim one-half million acres of land.

The 11 projects and 17 others to be completed in 1911, are the direct result of the National Irrigation congress. Altogether, the 28 projects will reclaim and subject to the uses of man 1,919,000 acres, and will cost in some cases \$70,000,000. The sum of \$1,919,000 already has been expended to perform the work thus far. A permanent has been employed in the field and registered service, to lead the office force at Washington 14,333 men and women upon the job. The contractors have employed 16,483 laborers. This is a total of 30,816 persons. The expenditures are nearly \$1,000,000 a month.

Mr. Blanchard, statistician of the reclamation service, says these operations have resulted in the establishment of eight towns, the construction of 1,000 miles of branch railroad, the settlement of 14,000 persons in the west. These settlers have made homes where it was impossible to do so before the water came. In 1907 the reclamation service dug

1881 miles of canals, some of which carry whole rivers. The service excavated during the year 13½ miles of tunnels and erected 281 large structures, including dams. It completed 1000 headworks and flumes.

It built 611 miles of wagon road in mountainous regions. It made and used 80,000 barrels of cement and purchased 403,000 barrels. It strung 830 miles of telephone wires. Its own sawmills cut 3,026,000 feet of lumber, and it purchased 23,695 feet.

In March, 1908, the service owned and had at work 1500 horses and mules. It operated 9 locomotives, 611 cars, and 23 miles of railroad, 84 gasoline engines and 70 steam engines. It has constructed and is operating five electric light plants.

Such is the work and usefulness of the United States reclamation service, indisputably the child of the national irrigation congress.

By private corporations over 15,000,000 acres have been reclaimed at a cost of \$160,000,000.

An investigation by the government reclamation service into the feasibility of a project for irrigating the high plateau lands in Crook county was confirmed by the presence last week of H. J. Doolittle, an engineer in the reclamation service, who is making the investigation, according to press dispatches. Mr. Doolittle spent several days in this locality, going then through the county south and southwest of this place, and then on to Prineville. He spent some time on the Matoles last month, walking all the way from its source to its mouth, and following that jaunt he walked from the Warm Springs agency down the west bank of the Deschutes to Sherars Bridge, returning then to

Madras. His presence in this immediate locality was for the purpose of investigating the amount of land which could be brought under irrigation if the project is feasible, for upon the size of the irrigable area largely depends the practicability of the undertaking.

The project under investigation now has in view the storage of the flood waters of Crooked river in reservoirs above Prineville. This would be released as required and brought down the channel of the river to a point near Prineville, where it would be taken out in a canal high enough to get it across the divide between this place and Prineville, and to eventually distribute it over the irrigable land in this locality.
