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FIRST EPISCOPAL CONVOCATION

THE JURISDICTION'S DELEGATES ARRIVING.

Divine Service at Church of Redeemer Opens Session Tomorrow—Program Devoted to Phases of Christian Work and Its Extension—Bishop Paddock Arrived Last Evening—Delegates Come in Today.

With the beautiful and impressive divine services of the Episcopal church, conducted by the Right Rev. Bishop R. L. Paddock and the clergy of the jurisdiction, the first convocation of the missionary jurisdiction of eastern Oregon will be opened in this city tomorrow at 10 o'clock a. m. at the Church of the Redeemer. The clergy will all be fully robed, and the service will include that of holy communion.

The sermon will be delivered by Dr. R. D. Nevins, the old pioneer missionary. After the service the convocation will be called to order by the bishop for organization and business. A lunch will be served in

the parish house at 1 p. m. by the ladies of the church to the clergy and lay delegates.

Bishop's Address Tomorrow. The bishop's convocation address will be given at 2 p. m. sharp. A meeting of the woman's auxiliary will take place at 3 o'clock in the church. After the woman's meeting, business will be resumed until 5 p. m.

There will be divine services in the church at 7:30 p. m. at which a paper will be read by Rev. Upton H. Gibbs of La Grande, on "The Church's Attitude Towards Amusements." Dr. R. D. Nevins will give reminiscences of missionary experiences in eastern Oregon. An offering will be taken for missions in eastern Oregon. A cordial invitation is extended to all to attend any or all of these meetings and services.

Tonight's Services.

There will also be a divine service this evening at 7:30. The bishop and clergy of eastern Oregon taking part. A paper will be read by the Rev. J. Nelson Barry, rector of Baker City, on "The Church in Eastern Oregon." Rev. Charles Quinney will read a paper on "Tithing."

After the service the congregation will receive the bishop, clerical and lay delegates informally.

Right Rev. Bishop R. L. Paddock arrived last night from Hood River and is the guest of the Rev. and Mrs. Quinney at the old rectory, corner of Alta and Thompson streets. He held a confirmation service last evening at the Church of the Redeemer. The clergy and lay delegates will arrive today.

Nine-foot Sage Brush.

HUSBAND SEEKS PROTECTION

LOCAL DIVORCE CASE HAS UNUSUAL FEATURE

W. P. Card Seeks Separation from Helpmeet and Says He Is Afraid of Her and Her Children—Also Asks for One Third of Real Property Now in Her Name.

An unusual divorce suit is that which has just been brought in the circuit court by W. P. Card of McKay creek. In the complaint which was filed last evening for Card by Messrs. Raley, Richards & Raley, the husband demands a share of his wife's property and furthermore asks that the court issue an order restraining her from using physical violence upon his person or from otherwise interfering with him in his pursuit of happiness.

It is a daily occurrence for a wife to sue for divorce and to ask for a property division and a restraining order. But the Card case is one of the few on record where such appeals are made by a husband.

In explanation of the plea that is made in behalf of Card the complaint sets forth that he is 60 years of age and is physically slight in stature. It further sets forth that the defendant has large children by a former husband and for these and his wife the husband and father has fear. The restraining order is asked for with regards the step children as well as the wife.

Cruel and inhuman treatment consisting of such things as the use of abusive and indecent language towards the plaintiff and physical mistreatment towards the plaintiff and physical mistreatment are charged against the defendant in the Card case.

The husband sues for a one-third interest in a quarter section of land now owned by his wife.
