

MUCH STOCK GOES THROUGH ALBEE

BIG BUNCHES OF CATTLE FOR THE COAST MARKETS.

Jim Jones Will Winter Steers at Walla Walla — Zoeth Houser Is Handling John Day Cattle — Government Trail Opens Up Very Rough Country — Rich Gold Ledge in Susanville District — Albee Loses Old Pioneer.

Albee, Sept. 30.—The large numbers of cattle brought through here for shipment and the dry season are playing havoc with pasture in this neighborhood, and the cattlemen are complaining that it is very difficult to get hay or pasture over night at most any price.

An idea of the immense amount of stock passing over the trail at this time can be gathered from the fact that over 1600 head of beef cattle and feeders have passed through, some of them laying over one day for rest. James Jones, who has just sent one bunch of 400 cattle through, left the bunch here, sending it on with his men, while he returned to the Isee country for another band of 400 head, his last shipment this year. He has just made arrangements to feed a big herd of steers for the winter and spring market, securing feeding grounds over near Walla Walla.

Zoeth Houser is here with 300 head of cattle which he is now pasturing and resting for a few days. He will ship these animals from Pendleton to the sound country. The cattle were nearly all bought in the John Day country. Mr. Houser expects to handle another herd this fall.

A large number of people are leaving this morning to attend the district fair at Pendleton. Among others, Helm Connell is taking down a yearling colt that weighs 1400 pounds.

The Gibbs brothers, who own and operate the sawmill at Ukiah, are now shipping large quantities of lumber, freighting by team to the outside country.

Dan Combs, who has lived here for 25 years, has sold out and will leave with a four-horse team for Williamette valley where he expects to find a new location.

Miss Ollie Smith, who has been visiting here for the past two weeks, has returned to her home at Pilot Rock. While here Miss Smith rode to Hildaway and Lehman springs and spent a few days out at those popular resorts, being escorted by her friend, Miss Pearl Connell, who is an expert horsewoman.

Rush Work on Trail.
The government trail across the mountains south of here and into the wildest portion of the John Day country is now being rushed by two crews of men in order to accomplish as much as possible before the heavy winter sets in. The trail was started near Hildaway springs last fall and the men are now working about 25 miles south of here. The trail crosses canyons and streams, traversing the North Fork about four miles above Texas Bar. It is considered one of the best passways for pack animals in the Blue mountains.

Rich Ledge Found.
The Chattanooga Mining company, of Susanville, in Grant county, has just discovered a very rich ledge of ore in the property it is developing, but the management says that it will be forced to stop work for the present on account of the expense of hauling the concentrates to the railroad.

These people are very anxious to get the Sumpter Valley railroad to tap their camp with a spur from that line. They claim to have considerable tonnage in concentrates, but no way to get them to market. A few years ago some concentrates were hauled to Pendleton and from there shipped to Seattle, but the long haul of 75 miles ate up all the profits and the plan was abandoned.

TWO CENTS CARRY LETTER TO FAR ENGLAND'S ISLE

Washington, Sept. 30.—After midnight tonight a letter may be deposited at any postoffice in the United States for delivery at any point in Great Britain or Ireland at the domestic rate of two cents an ounce. The rate now prevailing is five cents for a letter weighing an ounce or less and three cents for each additional ounce. The reduction in rates was reached after long negotiations between the postal authorities of this country and the British government.

Postmaster General Meyers believes that this reduction in the rate of postage to the United Kingdom ultimately will result in an increase in receipts, because it has always been found that a reduction of the letter rate resulted finally in increasing the revenue. He is also of the opinion that a lower postage will lead to freer commercial intercourse. Our manufacturers, he says, are increasing their sales in England, and must rely to a great extent upon the mails for orders and increase of trade. "Further," he said, "this will be a great boon to our adopted English speaking citizens particularly those of limited means, as it will enable them to keep up correspondence with their relations and friends in the old country at domestic rates."

general session of the American Bankers association was opened today. The Brown Palace Hotel, the scene of the sectional meetings of the last two days, housed the convention. Financiers representing institutions with an aggregate capital of billions were in attendance.

The session this morning was principally devoted to reports of the officials and committees, including the committees on uniform laws, bills of lading, express companies and federal banking legislation. The association will probably decide on a plan of active opposition to the money order and banking business of the express companies, declaring that they should not be allowed to carry on such business without complying with the laws governing banking operations.

The feature of the day will be the address this afternoon of President Woodrow Wilson, of Princeton University, whose topic will be "The Banker and the Nation." B. E. Walker, president of the Canadian Bank of Commerce at Toronto, is also slated to speak on "American Features of American Banking."

TUBERCULOSIS CARRIED BY GERMS IN AIR NEAR COWS.

Washington, Sept. 30.—The much-mooted question of whether tuberculosis in cattle can be transmitted to man and the prevention of the disease in cattle were the subjects of discussion at the "Section" of the international congress Tuesday afternoon. Prof. N. P. Tendejoo of Leyden, Holland, one of the foremost bacteriologists of the world, advocated stamping out the disease in cattle, and said it had been proved that man can be infected by the inhalation of bovine bacilli floating in the air near the diseased cow, apart from the possibility of transmission of the disease through the milk.

The great white plague costs the people of the civilized world over \$1,600,000,000 yearly, according to a statement made yesterday by Prof. Irving Fisher of Yale university, in a paper read before the international tuberculosis congress. Prof. Fisher estimates that consumption kills 135,000 people each year in America alone. He declared that five million persons in America are doomed to fill consumptives' graves and that 20,000,000 are rendered miserable by deaths.

ANTI-MORMON ISSUE DEAD IN IDAHO'S CAMPAIGN.

Boise, Sept. 29.—The anti-Mormon agitation was made a dead issue in Idaho for the present campaign by a decision of the supreme court yesterday in sustaining the anti-Dubois faction in the contest to determine which of the two tickets nominated at the Wallace convention, was entitled to a writ of mandamus to compel the secretary of state to certify the Dubois ticket to county clerks of the state, was denied. The successful ticket is headed by Moses Alexander for governor and its platform denounces the war against the Mormons.

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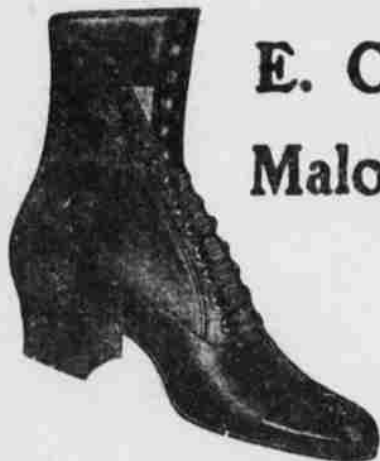
