worth, Wash., to supply power for operating its trains by electricity through the tunnel in the Cascade mountains, near Stevens peak, says the Spokane Spokesman-Review.

The power plant consists of a cylindrical flume nine feet in diameter and running from a point 15 miles above Leavenworth. The flume is completed and turbines and transformers are assembled at the site of the plant ready for installation. Poles and wires are in place for the transmission of the high tension current to the tunnel. The Great Northern has ordered eight electric locomotives which will be delivered within a few weeks, and it is announced that the electrical operation of trains through the three-mile tunnel will be begun by January 1, 1909. The plant now being completed will develop 12,000 horsepower, but plans have been made for the construction of a second power plant of equal capacity between the site of the present one and Leavenworth.

In the propulsion of trains by electric locomotives the huge motors are attached to the rear of the train and the cars are shoved through the tunnel. The steam engines do not detach from the train but steam is shut off, obviating the discomforts arising from the smoke of the locomotives in the big tunnel.

The Great Northern railroad will be the first transcontinental road to use electricity to so large an extent in the transmission of trains. But the plant which is planned by the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul railroad for operating its trains through the tunnel near Taft, Mont., will be fully as large, if not larger, than the Great Northern plant.

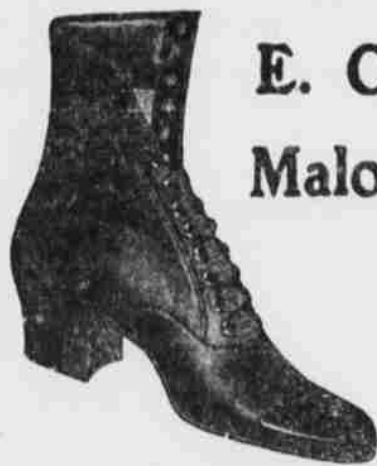
