CONVOCAION IS BROUGHT TO END

PRIMARY MEETING IS MOST HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL

Episcopal Churchmen Choose Officers for Eastern Oregon Jurisdiction--Meeting Is Prolific in Reminiscences of Pioneer Days in This District--Baker Wants Next Gathering.

The first annual convocation of the missionary jurisdiction of the Episcopal church in eastern Oregon came to a close last evening at the Church of the Redeemer. The convocation was highly successful in every way and was of unusual interest to those of that faith in being so interwoven with memories of pioneer days of the in this state.

Exceptional interest attaches to the fact that Right Rev. R. L. Paddock, the first bishop of eastern Oregon, spent his boyhood within the vicinity of Pendleton at a time when his honored father was bishop of the jurisdiction of Oregon, some 30 years ago, and again in the presence of Dr. Nevius of Seattle, the pioneer church builder and missionary of this jurisdiction.

The services last evening were of devotional character and were followed by a paper on the development of the jurisdiction read by James Henderson, and by Rev. Gibbs' discussion of the attitude of the church on amusements, an able presentation of the necessity of harmless pleasure.

Much Business Accomplished.

The convocation closed its business session at 6 o'clock Wednesday evening, having chosen officers and committees as follows:

President--Rt. Rev. Robert L. Paddock, bishop.

Secretary--Rev. J. Neilson Barry of Baker City.

Committee on elections--Rev. Upton H. Gibbs, La Grande, R. J. Slater, Pendleton.

Treasurer--J. T. Lambirth, Pendleton.

Council of Advice--Revs. Charles Quinney, Pendleton, Upton H. Gibbs and Joseph T. Peters of La Grande.

Chancellor or legal advisor--Judge Wm. Ramsey of La Grande.

Board of missions--Revs. Quinney, Barry and Gibbs, G. N. Proebstel of Weston, Murray Kay of The Dalles and H. C. Eastham, Vale.

Finance committee--Rev. Quinney, Frederick Warner of Baker City, Jom. T. Peters of The Dalles.

Examining chaplains--Revs. Quinney, Barry and Gibbs.

During the business session the convocation exchanged greetings with the primary convocation of the jurisdiction of Nevada, which was also in session at this time. It endorsed the plan for a \$5,000,000 fund for the relief of the clergy and for old age pensions; it directed a committee to engross resolutions anent the work of Dr. Nevius in the eastern Oregon field and have a copy sent to the doctor at his home in Seattle; it directed a letter to Presiding Bishop Tuttle of the church in America, who in a greeting to the convocation had recalled a visit to Pendleton in 1873 which he vividly and pleasantly remembered, together with messages to Mrs. Morris, widow of the late bishop, Rev. Portwine, Bishop Wells of Spokane, and Bishop Scadding of Oregon. It also expressed its great appreciation of Pendleton hospitality. Baker City asked for the annual conference next year.

Delegates were selected to the annual convocation of the Eighth department of the church organization in America, consisting of the states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Nevada, California, New Mexico and Arizona, which meets in Spokane next May. The delegates chosen were: Revs. Quinney, Barry, Gibbs and Henderson, J. D. Slater of La Grande, R. J. Slater of Pendleton, H. C. Eastham of Vale, and Charles Breck of Baker City. Alternates will be selected by Bishop Paddock later.

Bishop Paddock's convocation address was a strong urge to better church work and at the same time was pleasantly reminiscent of his youthful experiences in the west. During the afternoon the woman's auxiliary met with Mrs. K. Frazier, presiding and Mrs. Parmelee Halley as secretary. The out of town delegates who took a prominent part in the deliberations were: Deaconess Knight, Mrs. J. A. Churchill and Mrs. Barry of Baker City, the latter the director of Baker's choir of 49 voices; Mrs. Gibbs of La Grande, Mrs. Proebstel of Weston, Miss Lang of The Dalles and Miss A. E. Plympton of Walla Walla, Bishop Paddock having appointed Mrs. Halley secretary of the woman's auxiliary in eastern Oregon.

Bishop Paddock and the delegates left today the bishop going to Walla Walla, the only county seat in his jurisdiction he has not yet visited. The delegates were all enthusiastic over their treatment in Pendleton. Rev. Barry declared this morning that it could not be praised too greatly and that Baker City only hoped to equal the entertainment and enthusiasm shown here and could not expect to surpass it.

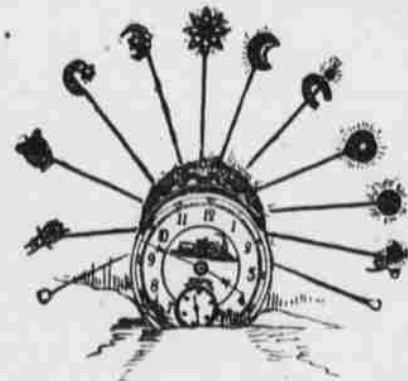
