

SPELLBINDERS TAKE TO WOODS

CAMPAIGN WORKERS IN FIGHT FOR DOUBTFUL

Each Party Gets Representatives In- to Field in Debatable Districts— Speakers Bureaus of National Organizations are Busy Quarters Today—Many States Considered as Doubtful in Coming Election.

New York, Oct. 1.—The first day of October always marks the beginning of the hottest period of a presidential campaign, and this year is no exception. Many prominent men in both parties, whose services as speakers have not heretofore been available, reported for duty today. The speakers bureaus of both parties have completed the itineraries of most of the orators and every spell-binder will be urged to push the campaign with all vigor during October. Governor Hughes will deliver two speeches here today, prior to beginning a tour of the middle west.

A comparison of the claims of both parties shows that an even dozen states are included in the doubtful column by the forecasters at the headquarters of one or both parties. These commonwealths are New York, New Jersey, Indiana, Minnesota, Colorado, Maryland, Montana, Nebraska, West Virginia, Utah, South Dakota and Wisconsin. Some of these states are claimed as certainly republican by the leaders in that party, while others are just as certainly placed in the democratic column by the supporters of Bryan. The principal battles of the campaign will be fought in these 12 states, with New York and Indiana the most important scenes of contention.

The 12 states which are placed by one party or the other in the doubtful column have a total electoral vote of 128. In other states which are considered as reasonably certain to give decisive majorities, the republicans can depend upon 134 electoral votes and the democrats 161. If the republicans can gain 46 electoral votes from the doubtful territory, according to this showing, Mr. Taft will be the next president of the United States. On the other hand, if the democrats carry the doubtful territory to the extent of winning 81 electoral votes, Mr. Bryan will be the next occupant of the White House.

If the Republicans can carry New York and Indiana, Taft and Sherman will almost certainly have a safe margin in the electoral college. Unless the unexpected happens and some of the states normally republican should go for Bryan, the democrats will have to secure 27 electoral votes from the other doubtful states, in addition to carrying New York and Indiana, in order to elect Bryan and Kern. California is placed in the doubtful column by the democrats, while Wisconsin and New Jersey, considered doubtful by democratic prophets, are listed as certainly republican by the Taft men. Admission of these claims would change but slightly the results as here given, and the great fight for supremacy will be in the states mentioned.

INTERSTATE WRANGLE HELPS SALMON INCREASE

Despite the wrangle between the two states over salmon fishing in the Columbia river, which to date has resulted in an injunction by the federal court restraining the Oregon authorities from attempting to enforce Oregon law for the time, immense good has been done the salmon fishing industry of the entire river, says a dispatch from Portland, as a result of Oregon's attempt to keep the upper stretch of the stream closed for a season.

Since August 25, the date when the new Oregon law placed a ban on fishing east of the Sandy, some fish have of course been caught in the upper river, for the most part by men who deliberately ignored the Oregon statute with a view to having the matter adjudicated by the courts, but the operations were desultory and the catch east of the Sandy to date has been but a fraction of what it would have been had the law not interfered. The result is that not for many years have so many of the fish been allowed to go to the spawning grounds of the upper reaches of the stream and its tributaries, which will mean a decided increase in the supply of the fish for next season. A local dealer said of the situation today:

"Not for many years has the outlook for the coming season been so favorable as now, and it is wholly due to the fact that through the half-successful operation of the new Oregon law fishing in the upper river has been all but stopped for the past month. Reports now coming in indicate that the run of the fish in all parts of the river is exceptionally large, and there are now more fish accessible to the spawning grounds than has been known in years."

"I have been told by the manager of the Ontario fish hatchery that in all probability that institution will this season hatch out 10,000,000 salmon eggs. If half the young fry reach maturity it will be a big thing for the salmon industry. Whatever may be the outcome of the tangle between the two states, great good has been done by Oregon's efforts to regulate fishing in the upper part of the river."
