TOO MUCH POOR STOCK ARRIVING

PRICES DROP ON CATTLE
EXCEPT THE VERY BEST.

Short Range and High Feed Contrib-
ute to Poor Class of Stock, Which
Makes Up Portland Arrivals—Only
Best Stock Wanted—Lively De-
mand for Best Grade Cows and
Heifers—Hogs Continue Firm.

Portland Union Stockyards, Sept.
30.—Shippers have been repeatedly
warned regarding the sending of poor
supplies to market, but the warning
seems to have been of no avail what-
ever, for a greater run of poor quality
has been shown of late than ever
before. While the generally short
range and high cost of feed has some-
thing to do with the sending of sup-
plies of poor quality to market, most
of the trouble is caused by shippers
who believe that anything is good
enough for the big city markets,
which view they now find a badly
mistaken one, for the big city mar-
kets demand nothing but the best
and buyers are inclined to pay the
price whenever the quality is good.

Hitting the Cattle Market.
The cattle market was hit today to
the tune of 25c in anything but good
stock. Most of the arrivals of cattle
at this time are of the second or third
grade and packers' pens are so filled
up with this kind of stuff that they
cannot be sold above \$3.50 and it is
hard to get this price today. For se-
lect stock the market is very good
with quotations ruling from \$4 to
\$4.25. Best grade of cows and heifers
find the liveliest call of all and prices
in this line are very well maintained.

Hogs and sheep are quoted firm
and unchanged for quality, but gen-
eral grade stuff continues slow with
generally sacrificed quotations.

Today 20 horses were among the
arrivals in the yards.

**EXPERTS EXPERIMENT
IN TUBERCULOSIS CASES**

Washington, Oct. 1.—Delegates to
the international tuberculosis con-
gress are watching with keen inter-
est the result of an experiment in
which 10 children, all charity patients
from children's hospitals here, have
been inoculated with the germs of
both human and bovine tuberculosis.
The children range from three and a
half to 10 years of age. They were
affected with incipient tuberculosis
before being inoculated. The experi-
ment is being conducted by Dr. Las-
zlo Detre, professor of bacteriology
in the University of Budapest. Its ob-
ject being to determine the value of
the new method of diagnosis advanced
by Dr. Detre. A committee of six
delegates has been appointed to pass
on the result. The experiment will
determine whether original infection
in children from bovine or human ba-
cilli, demonstrates all the biological
properties of the tuberculosis organs
enabling physicians to determine in
the future whether the infection is
from bovine or human sources.
