DISTRICT SCHOOLS IN LINE IN BIG EDUCATIONAL PARADE

Pretty Procession of Children at Opening of Program for Umatilla-Morrow Fair This Afternoon.

Several Hundred Little Ones in Spectacular Showing—State's Big Men Discuss School Questions—Governor Chamberlain in Attendance at Fair—Big Livestock Parade to Be Feature of Farmer's Day Tomorrow—Elks Make Splendid Showing in Parade Last Evening—Automobiles and Red Fire Feature of Oncoming March of Antlered Herd.

Between solid ranks of people on either side of the street several hundred school children marched down Main street this afternoon, forming an imposing spectacle and a fitting compliment to the feature parade of the week, conducted last night by the Elks. Though yesterday and last night were record breakers in point of attendance, they were far exceeded by the crowds this afternoon and evening.

The parade of the school children this afternoon was one of the most beautiful sights ever witnessed in this city. The large crowds along the walks could not refrain from bursting into spontaneous applause as one after another the special features passed in review.

President Roosevelt and DeCaprio's band marched in the lead and immediately following were the pupils from the Umatilla agency. At the head marched a young Indian brave, decked out in his war paint and other regalia, while at the head of the brigade of girls marched one robed in flaming colors. The others were the regulation school uniforms.

Preceded by the school board the Field school next appeared and by many was voted to have carried off the honors. The other schools then followed, each seemingly trying to make the best showing. The Washington school had some spectacular features which were good, among them being the representation of George and Martha Washington. Following the high school students was a large number from the different schools of the county.

The streets were well filled early this morning and the sidewalks have been crowded ever since the trains began to arrive shortly before noon. The Walla Walla train came in first, bringing more than 200 people from Adams, Athena, Weston, Milton and Walla Walla. This was soon followed by the Pilot Rock special, bringing 200 more from the southern part of the county and when the Northern Pacific pulled in with even the aisles crowded the streets immediately took on a Fourth of July appearance.

This afternoon the big pavilion is filled with a whirling, jostling, good natured mass of humanity. This is educational day and the school children are the predominating features of the crowd. The program both as to the speakers and the music was one of the best of the fair.

Big Stock Parade Tomorrow.
Though tomorrow is baby show day and though the traveling men are to be in command in the evening, the

big feature of the day promises to be the stock parade at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. This will be the first occasion the people will have had to view the prize winners in parade.

It is also proposed to have a much larger number of driving horses in the parade. Teams and single drivers from other parts of the county as well as from Pendleton and in addition to those which were entered for prizes, will be seen tomorrow.

At the opening of the program this afternoon, the band played the three national airs, Yankee Doodle, Star Spangled Banner and America. This was followed by a cornet solo and then Governor Chamberlain delivered a short address very appropriate to the occasion. He was loudly cheered at the close.

After a number by the quartet, President W. J. Kerr of the Oregon Agricultural college addressed a Pendleton audience for the first time. He created a very favorable impression and can feel assured that he will always be warmly greeted in this city, not alone because of the large number of friends of the Agricultural college, but on his own account.

Superintendent R. M. Robinson of Multnomah county, one of the best known educators in the state, was the next speaker.

Hofer Praises Chamberlain.

The closing address of the day was by Col. E. Hofer, editor of the Capital Journal and president of the state board of regents for all the normal schools. He is one of the most advanced and enthusiastic supporters of the state's educational institutions and he took occasion to warmly defend Governor Chamberlain from recent attacks made upon him in the Portland Oregonian. He declared that in his appointments to positions in connection with the state's educational institutions the Governor had always put ability and worth above friendship and politics and in more than one instance had deliberately turned down political friends to appoint other strangers who he felt to be better qualified for the positions.

Big Baby Show Tomorrow.

There will be no special speakers for tomorrow afternoon, though the same excellent musical numbers by the band and quartets will be rendered. C. E. Roosevelt, president of the fair association, will preside.

Last Night's Parade.
The big spectacular feature of the fair week occurred last night when the Elks-auto parade was held.

Though the evening was cold and damp thousands of people gathered along the curbs on Main and Court streets shortly after 7 o'clock.

At the opening of the parade the autos alone participated and they made a stirring sight as they drove through the city at a brisk clip with the two bands playing lively airs.

Coming down Main street the autos were in double column and the De

Caprio band was in the two leading autos, playing "In My Merry Oldsmobile." The other band was towards the rear of the procession and between the two musical organizations "music swelled the breeze."

At the conclusion of the first part of the parade the autos stopped on East Court street just east of the Eagles' hall.

Praise for Elks.

The members of the local lodge of Elks, 200 strong and decked in faultless white duck military uniforms, took the lead. They made a good sight as the long line swung through the business section. C. E. Roosevelt served as grand marshal and led the parade on foot. Following him came the DeCaprio band and then the Elks. The autos brought up the rear. Though the Elks' parade was not the elaborate feature it was made last year, yet the showing last night was a splendid one and the parade brought forth strong praise for the antlered herd.

Though the number of addresses yesterday afternoon were fewer than had been anticipated, the two principal ones were among the most interesting delivered at the fair. Congressman Ellis took occasion to congratulate the fair management upon its success and spoke words of praise for the pioneer spirits who had dared to cross the plains and carve this marvelous country out of the wilderness.

Attorney General Crawford expressed himself as being heartily in favor of the fair appropriations and paid many compliments to the city of Pendleton and the two counties which are participating in the fair.

"I'M SURPRISED," SAYS MR. BRYAN

COMMONER TALKS ON TAFT'S ENDORSEMENT.

Says He Cannot Understand How Judge Can Take Same Position as Roosevelt on Pre-election Publicity—Alleges Attempt to Confuse Issue in Discussion of Campaign Expenditures.

Lincoln, Neb., Oct. 2.—Declaring that "every disinterested voter knows that large contributions have been used to secure mortgages upon official," W. J. Bryan tonight issued at Fairview a statement criticizing the adoption by William H. Taft, his republican opponent for president, of President Roosevelt's announced view on the subject of publicity of campaign contributions.

"Mr. Taft," says Mr. Bryan, "now makes the same charge the president does, the astounding charge—that the voters are so liable to be misled that the knowledge (as to the amounts and sources of campaign contributions) must be kept from them."

Mr. Bryan then adds: "I insist that this is an insult to the intelligence of the voter and it does little credit to Mr. Taft's judgment of the men to whom he is making his appeal."

Bryan Is Surprised.

In his statement, Mr. Bryan says: "I am surprised to find that Mr. Taft endorses the president's view on the subject of publicity as to campaign contributions, but since he holds these views I am glad that he makes them known now."

Bryan says that Taft fails to see the difference between the publication of contributions before election and the publication of expenditures before election. That the publication of expenditures is required to show whether corrupt methods have been employed in the election and as the expenditures continue up to the close of the polls it would be impossible to make a complete publication until after election.

He quotes Judge Taft as saying that the purpose of the publicity is to prevent contributions for improper purposes and to guard against improper expenditures of the same and he says that the former could not be accomplished except through pre-election publicity, implying that by dragging the latter clause into the controversy Judge Taft is dodging the real issues.

Rescue Marooned Passengers.

Suva, Fiji Island, Oct. 2.—The Canadian-Australian liner Banuka arrived here today with the crew and passengers of the wrecked steamer Acon, which went ashore off Christ Mas Island, on July 18. She will soon leave for Auckland. None of the party seems to be worse for their experience on the island.

FLEET ENDS ITS LONG JOURNEY

Admiral Sperry and His Command Reach Manila at Noon Today.

THOUSANDS WELCOME FROM ALL MANNER OF CRAFT.

Shores of Bay Black With Thousands in Welcome to Vessels—Hundreds of Craft Maye Way to Visitors to Shout Greetings—Men Cannot Land Until Cholera Is Controlled—Sailors Feel Keen Regret at Refusal of Shore Leave.

Manila, Oct. 2.—The Atlantic fleet arrived in Manila Bay at 3 o'clock this afternoon. The sailors for the present will not be allowed ashore, according to the announcement made by the health officers of the fleet, although the health of the men is perfect.

Craft of every description met the fleet at the bay and the shores are black with thousands of people who are welcoming the ships, although the formal welcome has been postponed on account of the cholera situation.

Barges, launches, and all manner of pleasure craft were pressed into service in order that the people might welcome. Thousands of people came out as soon as the searchlights first flashed the news that the vessels were within sight of port. At a little after noon the fleet, steamed by Corregidor island and was accompanied to anchorage by hundreds of boats.

The men of the fleet are keenly disappointed at not being allowed ashore until the danger is over, but orders to that effect were received by Admiral Sperry and the fleet will remain off the breakwater until October 10, when it will go to Yokohama.

Business men here regret the epidemic of cholera as a very serious blow to business interests.

Japanese Entertain.

Tokio, Oct. 2.—Baron Saito, minister of naval affairs and his wife, gave a dinner tonight in honor of the wives and daughters of the officers of the American fleet who are awaiting the arrival of the fleet at Yokohama, which is expected October 17.

SLIPPERY RAILS CAUSE DEATHS OF SIX MEN.

Portland, Ore., Oct. 2.—Six men are dead and six are badly injured as the result of a gravel car which plunged backward down the slippery rails of the Portland Southwestern logging railway near Seapoo yesterday. The wreck was due to heavy rains.

Twelve men were in the car as it plunged down the hill, and not one man escaped, while in the locomotive which carried five men none was hurt. The victims clung to the cars as it flew down the track and when it jumped the rails at a curve three were killed outright. Two more died while being taken to Seapoo while the sixth succumbed in a hospital in this city. The train which was operated by the Chapman Lumber company, was within 100 yards of the top of the grade when rain fell, making the rails so slippery that the brakes refused to work and the load of gravel became the motive power.

TRUE BILLS BROUGHT IN REVERED BLUE LAWS

Portland, Oct. 2.—Five true bills were returned against proprietors of local cigar stores charging them with unlawfully remaining open on last Sunday, September 27, for the purpose of carrying on their business against the provisions of the Sunday closing law.

The cigar dealers indicted are C. D. Lister, who conducts a cigar store at 151 Sixth street; W. J. Curtis, 434 1/2 Washington; E. C. Johnson, 1 East Twentieth North; Sam Elliott, 314 Washington; and Dan Good, 381 East Burnside street.

District Attorney Cameron intends to hurry these cases to trial in order to get the vexed question settled, so far as the circuit court is concerned, as soon as possible. He stated that the men indicted would be arraigned today.

TUBERCULOSIS CONGRESS IS DIVIDED ON THEORY.

Washington, Oct. 2.—An attempt will be made to force the International Tuberculosis congress to go on record as to the transmissibility of bovine tuberculosis to humans.

Two factions, one headed by Dr. Koch, who holds the theory yet unproven, the other by Prof. Detre, who declares that not even milk drinking is necessary for the transmission of the germs are much in evidence in

all the discussions of the gathering.

This morning the delegates opposed to the Koch theory called a caucus for the purpose of forcing a direct expression of the congress on that point. They are elated today over the announcement that 11 persons inoculated with tuberculosis in the Washington hospital are affected with human tuberculosis bacilli and but one with the bovine type. According to Dr. Detre these experiments absolutely demonstrate the truth of his claim. The final general session will be held tomorrow.

Wealth as Life Saver.

"Today the nations having the highest rate of wages and shortest hours of work have the lowest death rate," said Dr. Woods Hutchinson, of New York, in speaking on the relation between income and tuberculosis. "Consumption," he said, "is the price of civilization and is paid by the lower two-thirds for the benefit of the upper third. There is a sound biologic basis for our modern determination to acquire wealth, since those who obtain it reduce their chances of dying from tuberculosis by 50 per cent."

HUBBY WON'T PAY RENT SO WIFE GETS DIVORCE

North Yakima, Oct. 2.—Because her husband preferred to move rather than pay rent and has changed from house to house eight times in eight weeks, Mrs. Agnes Merriman has decided not to live with him any longer. Judge Preble not only legally separated her from her husband but awarded her \$50 attorney fees, costs of the suit, \$15 a month alimony and the custody of her 2-year-old daughter.

Harrison Monument.

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 2.—The 27th of this month has been definitely decided upon by the Harrison Monument commission for the unveiling of the memorial to the former president. A program of an elaborate nature is now being prepared. It is expected that Vice President Fairbanks will deliver the principal address.

PRAIRIE OIL IS IN LIGHT AGAIN

MAY ENTER AS ISSUE IN NATIONAL CAMPAIGN.

Trouble Bounty to Follow Efforts of Standard Oil Corporation to Cross Highways of Rodgers County—Was Matter Which Caused Rupture Between Governor Haskell and Oklahoma's Attorney General.

Guthrie, Okla., Oct. 2.—Further trouble is bound to follow the efforts of the Prairie Oil company to lay pipe lines along the highways of Rodgers county, which caused the rupture between Governor Haskell and Attorney General West.

This effort may take on the phase of a national issue in the present campaign, following the appeal of the board of commissioners today to the attorney general, asking if, under the law they had the power to grant the company the right to construct lines.

The attorney general immediately wired back that they had no such power.

It is certain that a determined effort will be made to stop all pipe laying by that company.

Bryan Won't Visit Coast.

Lincoln, Neb., Oct. 2.—Bryan today is considering a tour for the closing weeks of his campaign. The proposed Pacific coast trip will be abandoned. Fairview was hit by a storm last night and the reporter's tent was demolished. Bryan will reply to Hughes soon.

Prohibitionists Withdraw.

Dallas, Tex., Oct. 2.—It was announced today that the prohibitionists would withdraw their state ticket in favor of the democratic ticket, which favors state wide prohibition.

INDICTED MEN PLEAD NOT GUILTY

Seemingly Prepared to Fight Cases, But May Change Their Minds.

CANNOT ESCAPE JAIL SAYS DISTRICT ATTORNEY

Further Indictments Returned Last Evening—Henry Kopitke Accused of Breaking Liquor Law—Weston Swamper Indicted—John Bloom Gets 60 Days—Grand Jury Finishes Today.

Pleas of not guilty were entered in the circuit court last evening by the attorneys for all the men indicted for selling liquor in violation of the prohibition law. Seemingly the cases are to be tried out. The cases against Murrell et al, who are represented by Attorney Will M. Peterson, have been set for trial Monday morning.

But it is easily possible that before Monday rolls around an understanding will be reached whereby the indicted men will plead guilty to some of the charges against them in order to secure immunity upon the remaining counts.

However, District Attorney Phelps declared this morning that if the ex-saloonmen wish to take that course they will have to plead guilty to more than a single indictment each. This will mean that jail sentences will await them if they throw themselves on the mercy of the court.

Further Indictments.

Last evening the grand jury returned several indictments. Henry Kopitke of this city, and Charles Newcomb of Pilot Rock, were both indicted for illicit liquor selling.

John Behrenson, who was arrested in June for an attempted assault upon the little Saling girl at Weston, was indicted for his offense.

W. P. Card, the McKay creek rancher, who recently brought suit against his wife for divorce and asked for a restraining order, was himself indicted for assaulting his wife.

This morning young John Bloom of Pilot Rock, pleaded guilty to simple larceny and was sentenced by Judge Bean to serve 60 days in jail. He was arrested for passing a \$5.50 check upon a Chinese restaurant keeper for \$55.

Finish Work Tonight.

This afternoon it was announced that the grand jury is now practically through with its work and will probably adjourn this evening.

Gamblers Deny Guilt.

At 1:30 this afternoon Mansfield and Bradburn, indicted for gambling, both pleaded not guilty. Each man is indicted upon four separate counts.

MYSTERY IN MURDER AT PACIFIC GROVE.

Pacific Grove, Ore., Oct. 2.—J. H. Knoeker was arrested today on a charge of having murdered Mrs. Grace I. White, who was found dead at Knoeker's home in Delmonte grove last night with a bullet hole in her head.

The discovery was made by a neighbor, Antonio Alves, who was told of the death by Knoeker, who is said to have told him "Something has happened at my home. The wife shot herself." Knoeker held a revolver at the time, which he dropped. Alves found the woman sprawled on a stairway leading to the upper floor. It is believed that the couple quarreled over property, although Knoeker says the woman killed herself.

It was learned today that Mrs. White, who has been seeking a divorce from her husband, who is an Alaskan miner, has been living with Knoeker whom she intended to marry as soon as the divorce was granted.

Not Japanese Spies.

Camp Atascadero, Cal., Oct. 2.—The presence of several Japanese who were watching the maneuvers of troops here, led to the rumor that they were spies seeking information regarding American military activity. The story is regarded as silly by the officers stationed here.

TELL SCHOOLS OF POSTAL SERVICE

Postmaster J. T. Brown has just received an order from Postmaster General Meyer which promises beneficial results. He has been directed to confer with the local school authorities as to the practicability and desirability of delivering to the school children short talks on the postal service.

The design is to inform the pupils of the scope of its operations, the methods of delivering the mails, classification of mail matter and registry and money order systems. Incidentally they are to make known plans for the betterment, such as the establishment of postal savings banks

and the extension of the parcels post. Whenever it may be impracticable for postmasters to deliver the lectures they are to furnish the necessary information to the school supervisors, so as to equip the regular teachers. It is the postmaster general's expectation that the school children will be useful to the postal service in seeing that letters are properly and plainly addressed.

That there is necessity for action of the kind is shown by the business transacted by the dead letter office. During the last year 13,145,172 pieces of mail matter were sent there because the postoffices were unable to read them.
