GROW WALNUTS, PIONEER SAYS

MEEKER ADVISES ORCHARD
POSSIBLE IN UMATILLA.

Man Who Marked Old Oregon Trail Talks of State's Opportunities for the Young—Regards a Walnut Ranch as the Most Profitable Kind of Oregon Farming—Less Trouble Than Fruit.

Particularly applicable to conditions in the irrigated sections of the county is the advice given by Ezra Meeker of "Old Oregon Trail" fame, to young men recently, in an interview in the Oregon Journal.

"If I were a young man I'd go right out and get me some Oregon land and plant walnut trees on it," said Mr. Meeker. The man who retraced the Oregon trail has just come back from visiting the walnut orchards and is full of advice for the young man who wants to become independent by tilling Oregon soil.

"It's the best thing this country affords for a young fellow," said Mr. Meeker. "I visited a walnut orchard the other day and it was a wonder to me. I've become an enthusiast over walnuts. The man whose place I visited is taking out his prune trees and other fruit trees and planting walnuts. He finds them less trouble and less expensive than prunes, the chances of damage are less and he's got more when the crop is harvested. He told me he shipped a carload of walnuts to New York last year and got 18 cents a pound for them. It costs one cent a pound to harvest them. He expects to get nearly as good a crop this year.

"Of course you can't stick the trees helter-skelter in the ground and let them grow, but they are less

trouble than other orchard trees and the time is coming when they will be grown over all of Oregon. The demand will increase as the supply increases. They are a staple product."

TRAVELERS WANT SHEETS TO BE NINE FEET LONG.

At the third quarterly meeting and smoker of the Oregon and Washington branch of the Travelers' Protective association, held in Portland, the legislative committee was instructed to frame a bill to be presented at the next legislature in both states to compel hotel proprietors to provide proper fire escapes, also to furnish beds with nine-foot sheets. This last measure is one which the association deems of vital importance to its members. Much complaint has been reported from time to time of the inadequacy of this portion of the bedding, tall members frequently being subjected to bodily discomfort, to say nothing of mental distress, thereby.

Ordinarily, sheets in the hotels are about seven feet in length. The traveling men want them longer for various reasons. Principally, however, to keep their feet from slipping out from under the covers.

In adopting the resolution calling for nine-foot sheets the traveling men also put in several paragraphs relative to ropes in all hotel rooms where the buildings are more than one story. This is for their own protection in case of fire. The same resolution is to be presented to the legislatures of both Oregon and Washington.
